





The army already is making plans for selection of an unidentified body to be placed there. The ceremony robably will be similar to that folved in selecting the Unknown Soler of World War I.

It is likely that it will involve the selection of the remains of one unknown soldier from those of nine unidentified men who fell in combat in the nine major combat areas. Selection of the Unknown Soldier still is a long way off, however. It will not be done until the program for returning 250,000 World War II dead from overseas is completed in about three years.

It is a delicate situation for both commercial and political interests of this country. American oil inter-ests in the middle east are uneasy over the Arab-Jew clashes, and from the political point of view there is the danger that Russia might move troops to Palestine, ostensibly to keep order, hut actually to grab a strategic foothold there.

### LANDON:

**Big Medicine** Alf M. Landon, the Kansas budget-balancer who might have been president of the United States if Franklin D. Roosevelt hadn't de-feated him by a landslide in 1936, has come out publicly in favor of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower for President in 1948.

Landon was known to have joined forces with Roy Roberts of the Kansas City Star to push the Eisen-hower bandwagon. In Chicago to address a Kiwanis meeting, Landon said, "The Kansas delegation to the Republican national convention will be for Eisenhower." That, coming from the shrewd former governor of Kansas, was strong political medicine.

"I don't think any of the politicians in my state will get out of line on that. I think I know what the general's social, economic and po-litical views are. He hasn't said anything to me about the presidency directly or indirectly but it's my guess he will make his views known when he leaves the army and they will be all right." Meanwhile, it was announced that

Eisenhower was scheduled to take over his scheduled position as president of Columbia university next June 7-just about two weeks before the Republican national convention is supposed to convene.





Have meat cut in one-inch cubes. Dredge with flour and brown in hot lard. Season with salt and pepper and place in casserole. Also pile vegetables into casserole. Add 4 tablespoons flour to fat in pan where meat was browned, and stir until thickened. Add 2 cups meat stock and let cook until thick. Pour this over the meat and vegetables and cook in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 20 minutes. Remove from oven and top with a biscuit crust. Return to a hot oven (400 degrees) for another 20 minutes and bake until crust is well browned. If you want a nice glaze on the crust, brush with beaten egg before baking.

Peach Gelatin. (Serves 6)

4 or 5 canned cling peach halves 1 package raspberry-flavored gelatin

1 cup hot water 1 cup peach syrup

Arrange peach halves, smooth side down, in bottern of a large round mold or pan. Dissolve gelatin in hot water; add peach syrup and stir to blend. Pour sufficient gelatin mixture over peaches to cover. Chill. Chill remaining gelatin until con-gealed but not firm. Whip until very light and thick. Pour over plain gel-atin. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with table cream, soft custard or whipped cream.




