Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Most farm prices followed rising trends last week but sharp declines in Monday on some products erased much of the gains, according to the Extension and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Cattle scored gains mostly 50 cents to \$1 during the seven days ending Monday, and calves sold as much as \$1.50 higher at Texas markets. Houston bought good calves at \$25 to \$27, San Antonio and Fort Worth paid from \$24 to \$27 for good and choice grades. Oklahoma City took good and choice calves at \$27 to \$28.50, as heavy lots brought \$21 to \$25 at Wichita and below \$26 at Denver. Good and choice steers cleared Wichita from \$24 to \$27 and Denver up to \$30.

Hogs advanced sharply early last week, but steady losses on succeeding days more than erased the gains. Good and choice medium weight butcher hogs sold Monday at \$22 at San Antonio, \$22.25 to \$22.50 at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City, and \$22.7 to \$23.25 at Wichita and Kansas City. Pigs sold from \$16 to \$18.

Egg prices dropped off a couple of cents per dozen last week as spring supplies increased rapidly. Dallas paid around 8 cents a dozen for current receipts Monday at Fort Worth gave 39 to 40 cents. Poultry had firm. Heavy hens brought 24 to 26 cents a pound at Dallas and Fort Worth, light hens 20 to 22, and fryers 32 to 34.

Monday's cotton losses more than erased gains of late last week. Spot middling 15-16 inch closed Monday 33.10 cents a pound at Dallas, 33.00 at Houston, and 32.90 at New Orleans.

Course For Veterans

A cabinet making and carpenters' course will be offered to veterans of World War II by the Donley County Vocational School, according to J. R. Gillham, coordinator of the county school program. Tentative plans are to start the course on April 6th if a sufficient number of veterans are interested in enrolling in the course. Any veteran of World War II is eligible to enroll in the course.

Twenty-five hours per week will be required for the course. This time will probably be held in two full days and two night sessions per week, but this time will be set to accommodate the majority of the members in the class. The course will follow a course of study outlined by the State Vocational Board and will include the use of all important power and hand tools in cabinet making and carpentering. The course will be set up for two full years.

The veterans enrolled in the course will be eligible for full monthly subsistence which is \$75.00 for single veterans, \$105.00 for married veterans or veterans with one dependent, and \$120.00 for veterans with two or more dependents. The course will be held in the new shop building to be moved to the foundations west of the High School building as soon as the weather will permit.

A meeting of all veterans interested in this course is scheduled for 8:00 p. m., Monday, March 15, at the grade school building in the Veterans Vocational Agricultural class room.

CONQUEST

Curtain Time

There were six days of crisis in
Czechoslovakia and then it was all
over—the Communists were in com-
plete control of that nation of 13 mil-
lion population.

The iron curtain came down with a
muffled clang as President Eduard
Benes accepted the resignation of 14
of his cabinet ministers after he had
refused for a week to do so.

Into power strode Communist
Premier Klement Gottwald who had
led his party upward from a minority
status in Czechoslovakia until now
its members dominated every phase
of the nation's life and were pre-
pared to swing it directly into the
orbit of other Soviet satellites.

Wielding the club to keep the
Czechs in line was Gottwald's good
right hand, Vaclav Nosek, minister
of the interior, who controls all
Czechoslovakian police forces. In
that powerful position in a Commu-
nist-dominated state Nosek was
analogous to the mailed glove on the
dictator's fist.

For what it was worth—and that
was very little—aging President
Benes had managed to keep at least
a superficial appearance of repre-
sentative government by insisting
that the government be composed of
members of other parties of the
national front which reinstated the
Czechoslovak republic in 1945 when
the Germans were being driven out.
But it was a hollow, tasteless vic-
tory—meaningless in any practical
application.

The new government consists of
12 Communists (there were seven
before), four Social Democrats, two
Czech National Socialists, two Catho-
lic Peoples party members, one
Slovak Democrat and two non-party
men, Jan Masaryk as foreign min-
ister and Gen. Ludwig Svoboda as
minister of defense.

Bewildered Czechs finally knew
their cherished republic had come
to a grim end when loud speakers
in Prague blared this announce-
ment into the night:

"Reaction has been beaten. Go
back to work and let us complete
our tasks on the two year plan."

In Czechoslovakia's ironic chro-
nology the surging wall of the Red
tide engulfed their country just 10
years after the western Allies had
told the nation to Hitler at Munich
in a tragically selfish and futile
effort to avoid war and save their
own skins at the price of just one
small Central European state.

Reaction

With the Balkans all tied up with
a red ribbon the world began to
wonder which small nation the
Communist tide would engulf next.
Some thought Finland might be
the top name on the list, others
wondered whether Austria, France
and Italy might not be clamped
soon in the Communist vise.

There was general agreement on
one fact, at least: That the Com-
munist coup in Czechoslovakia had
forged perhaps the most vital link
in the Russian chain intended to
shackle the Marshall plan.

In Finland and Italy, as in Czech-
oslovakia, elections were coming
up soon and the Communists were
out for victory. Finland, like Czech-
oslovakia, is ruled by a coalition
government which has acknowl-
edged that the country must re-
main friendly with Russia.

DOWNWARD:

Factory Wages

Life, as it is reflected in the weekly
pay check, is no longer as lush
as it was last year. To be exact, it
was 47 cents less in January than
in December, according to the bu-
reau of labor statistics.

The bureau disclosed that weekly
earnings of factory workers declined
in January to an average of \$52.27.
Average weekly hours of the 12.8
million production workers in manu-
facturing establishments fell from
41.2 to 40.6 between December and
January, and weekly earnings fell
from \$52.74 to \$52.27.

However, average hourly earnings
increased from \$1.279 in December
to \$1.289 in mid-January.

The average number of hours
worked each week is exactly the
same as in January, 1947, the bu-
reau said, but gross hourly earnings
were about 13 cents higher.

In the durable goods lines the
weekly earnings for production
workers slid off from the Decem-
ber peak of \$56.52 to \$55.71. In the
non-durable goods industries aver-
age weekly earnings were \$52.27.

RENT CONTROL:

Extension

The tenants got another reprieve.
Legislation extending federal rent
controls for a month beyond the
February 29 deadline—through
March 31—was passed by the house
and senate and sent to the White
House for signature.

The bill was approved while the
senate was considering legislation to
continue rent controls for 14 months,
and it will operate to give the house
and senate time to agree on long
range extension measures.

In evolving rent control extension
during the interim provided by the
stop-gap bill the house was expected
to devote considerable time to
wondering whether congress should
not wait and see whether prices
will be stabilized at a lower figure
following the recent market break
before it acts in the matter.

It was probable, however, that the
house would go along with the sen-
ate's 14-month rent control exten-
sion, but would attempt to make a
"good many" revisions.

House backers of rent control
legislation are determined to pro-
tect tenants who have agreed to in-
crease up to 15 per cent against
further hikes in their rent. The sen-
ate bill now under consideration
would freeze rents at the increased
level from December 31, 1948, when
the 15 per cent leases expire, until
April 30, 1949.

COLD CHICKEN:

No Fuel Oil

Campaigning politicians this year
may have to eliminate "a chicken
in every pot" from their lists of
promises because there might not
be enough chickens to go around.

Reports from the poultry belt in
the Midwest say that the severity of
the fuel oil shortage is cutting into
the 1948 baby chick hatch to threat-
en poultry and egg production this
year.

Thousands of farmers canceled
chick orders for early March deliv-
ery because they couldn't get oil for
their brooder stoves. Iowa and the
Northwest were suffering most
from the situation, but it also was
bad in Illinois and Indiana. The
kerosene shortage has been severe
enough to cause hardship in most
of the poultry producing area.

Some poultrymen were deferring
chick deliveries until later dates,
hoping that warmer weather would
ease the tight oil supply.

Officials of one large hybrid chick
hatchery in Iowa claimed they
needed six tank cars of fuel oil to



get their 1948 production under way.
One of the most vociferous com-
plaints generally being made among
farmers was that city consumers
were using up all the fuel oil.

FEARFUL:

Hoof and Mouth

Cattle, hog and sheep growers of
the U. S. continue to live in the
shadow of a fear that the hoof and
mouth disease which has been decim-
ating livestock in Mexico for
many months will spread across
the border and affect U. S. herds.

At a recent session in Chicago a
joint committee of the cattle, hog
and sheep raisers forwarded a plea
to Secretary of Agriculture Clinton
Anderson to renew efforts to erad-
icate the disease.

Among other things, the stock-
men requested that these actions
be taken:

1. Renegotiate with high Mexican
officials on plans for resuming
the interrupted slaughter and burial
program.
2. Immediate construction of a
fence along the present quaran-
tine line about 250 miles south of
the U. S. border.
3. Build new beef canning plants
in the "clean" states of north-
ern Mexico and continue to run
those now operating.

BULL'S-EYE:

V-2 Rockets

Army scientists are saying now
that improved control devices on
German V-2 rockets eventually will
be able to steer them to within
yards—instead of miles—of their
targets.

During World War II, German
V-2s missed their mark by an aver-
age of 10 miles.

LYNCH BAN:

Pending Bill

Apparently determined to go
along at least part way with Pres-
ident Truman's civil rights program,
congress is preparing to consider a
bill to make lynching a federal of-
fense.

Such a measure has been ap-
proved by a house sub-committee,
and congressional leaders generally
feel it will pass the house with ease
and possibly even clear the senate
this year.

Action on the bill sponsored by
Rep. Clifford Case (Rep., N. J.)
came just before the release of a
list of 74 southern Democratic house
members who had signed a resolu-
tion bitterly assailing the Presi-
dent's civil rights program and
urging him to drop it.

The forthcoming argument—and
it undoubtedly will be a fierce one—
over the anti-lynching bill will not
be the first of its kind in congress.
The house in 1940 passed such a
measure by a vote of 252 to 131 over
the shouted protests of Dixie Demo-
crats, but it died in the senate in the
face of a dogged southern filibuster.

Main features of the present bill
include a maximum penalty of 20
years' imprisonment and a \$10,000
fine for persons inciting or taking
part in a lynching, as well as a
maximum penalty of five years and
\$5,000 fine for law officers who fail
to "make all diligent efforts" to
protect persons from lynch mobs.

LOUISIANA:

Long Trail

Louisiana was back on the Long
Long political trail again.

In a Democratic runoff primary,
voters of the state called Earl Long,
brother of the assassinated Huey,
to be their governor once more.
After he had remained in a state of
political eclipse for eight years
Long won a wallowing victory over
Sam Houston Jones, the man who
beat him for office in 1940 and
brought an end to the regime set up
by Huey Long 12 years before.

In Louisiana, winning the Demo-
cratic runoff primary was the
equivalent of being elected, since
the Democratic party is in absolute
power throughout the state.

It was a triumphant comeback for
Earl Long personally and for the
Long family in general after Earl's
political fortunes had sunk to such
a low ebb in 1944 that he couldn't
even get himself on the head of a
ticket.

This election, as a matter of fact,
was Long's only statewide victory
except for 1935, when he was
elected lieutenant-governor. He
became governor in 1939 when Rich-
ard W. Leche resigned the post in
the midst of "Louisiana scandals."

Leche and other political leaders
went to prison for various misuses
of state funds and property.

COWBOY:

(Dem., Ida.)

It looked like political suicide
when Sen. Glen H. Taylor (Dem.,
Ida.) came out formally as vice-
presidential candidate on Henry
Wallace's third party ticket, but the
"crooning cowboy" from Idaho
didn't see it that way.

He did it, he said, to support Wal-
lace in his "gallant fight for peace"
and because the Democratic party
has surrendered to "Wall street and
the military."

"I am not leaving the Democratic
party; it left me," Taylor declared
dramatically.

Taylor accused the Democrats of
having "betrayed the principles in
which I believe," and gloried ver-
bally in the wonderful freedom that
now would be his to campaign with
Wallace against "this bi-partisan
coalition and all its works; Taft-
Hartley—universal military train-
ing—this drive toward war—high
prices and racial discrimination
and suppression of civil liberties."

Fashion Slump

Foreign fashion buyers have been
giving the Paris "new look" a dirty
look and the result has been a bad
slump in the French fashion indus-
try.

Most of the buyers who came to
Paris to examine the 1948 models
got an eyeful of the latest French
styles and then apparently decided
they could do just as well at home
with money. Not even the new fa-

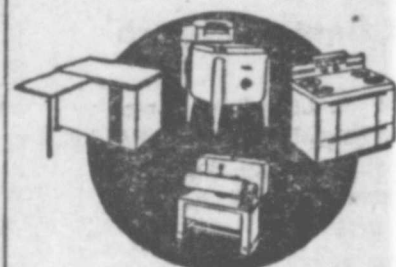

ASKS CONGRESS FOR DOG STAMP

Legislation in Honor of "Man's Best Friend" Sought by Dog-Lovers

The United States may soon issue a postage stamp honoring "Man's Best Friend," if the efforts being put forth by dog-lovers throughout the country prove fruitful.

Spearheading the movement is Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York, who has appealed to Congressman John Phillips of Calif.

Miller, himself a long-time champion of the dog, to introduce the necessary legislation providing for the issuance of such a stamp.

In a letter to Congressman Phillips, Mr. Miller points out that the United States at the present time has more dogs than any country is ever known to have owned before—one in every three American families owns one or more dogs—and that certainly the dog's contributions of heroism, loyalty and intelligence are worthy of honoring in this manner. He further states that to date 13 countries have issued postage stamps which either show dogs as the principal point of their designs, or have included dogs as an incidental to the composition. The only U. S. stamp which shows the likeness of a dog is one of 30-cent value issued in connection with the Columbian Exposition of 1893. This stamp shows Columbus with a globe demonstrating to a group of listeners his theories of geography and navigation, while a dog, which appears to be of a large Mastiff type, is shown lying on the floor in the foreground. Mr. Miller feels very strongly that with the country's dog population at the 20,000,000 mark, "Man's Best Friend" is now deserving of a postage stamp of his own and merits more than the incidental recognition given him on a stamp issued 55 years ago.

There are several well-known breeds of American dogs, which would be eligible to represent the dog family in United States postage," Mr. Miller wrote. "The Chesapeake Bay Retriever, the American Cocker Spaniel, the American Water Spaniel, the Alaskan Malamute, the Boston Terrier and the Black and Tan Coonhound are all pure-breds of undeniably American origin which have been brought to their present per-

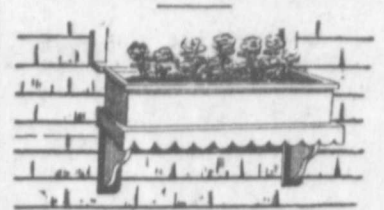

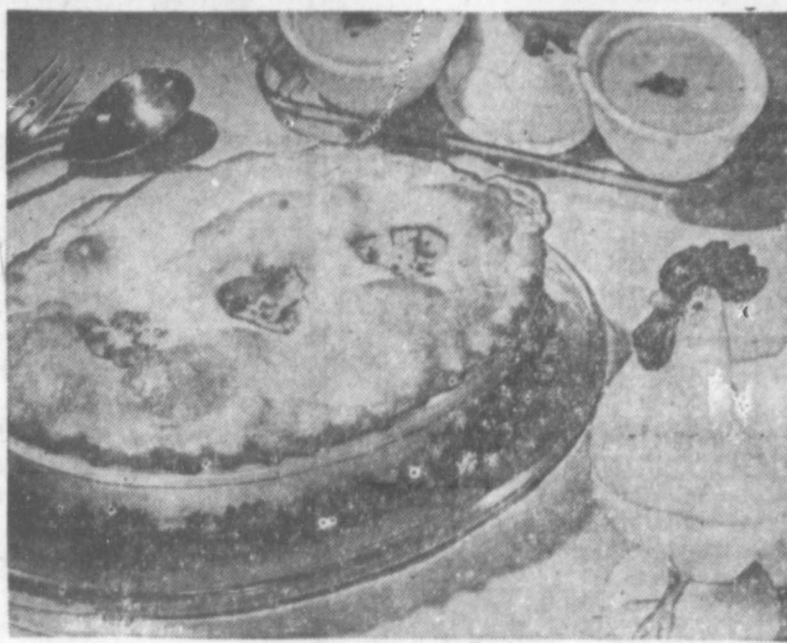

Pass the Savory Chicken Pie. (See recipes below.)

Chicken Favorites

When you want to put variety in the menu, or combine interesting flavors or stretch the meat nicely, the thing to do is to serve chicken. You'll find chicken prices doing a favor to your budgets these days, and what's even nicer, chicken can be combined with so many foods that give you nice substantial meals so ideal for cooler weather.

Why not try chicken with dumplings for an old-fashioned savory favorite? Or, a tender crusty pie with pieces of chicken and vegetables in nice rich gravy.

You'll find the bits of leftover chicken go nicely into tarts, chow mein or tetrazzini chicken. All these will keep menu interest at a high pitch and help supply valuable protein, minerals and vitamins to the diet.

Chicken Pie. (Serves 6)

- 1 chicken for stewing
- 1 onion
- 4 carrots
- 3 or 4 celery leaves
- 3 or 4 sprigs parsley
- 1/4 cup sliced, cooked mushrooms
- 1 1/2 cups peas, cooked
- 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
- 6 boiled potatoes, cut into quarters
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 2 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons shortening

Cut up chicken and stew in enough salted water to cover, with the onion, carrots, celery leaves and parsley. When tender, remove skin from pieces of chicken and place in a baking dish with cut-up carrots, peas, mushrooms, pimiento and potato. Strain and thicken the gravy, using all the stock. Cover ingredients in the casserole with it. Sift flour with baking powder and salt, and cut in the shortening. Combine egg yolks with the stock and add to dry ingredients. Mix lightly with a fork. Knead gently for a few seconds, then roll out to fit top of casserole. Cut vents in crust. Wet edges of casserole and attach crust to it. Brush top with milk. Bake in a hot (400 degree) oven 30 to 35 minutes.

*Chicken Chow Mein (Serves 6)

- 1 cup diced celery
 - 1 small onion, sliced
 - 1 medium green pepper, sliced
 - 2 cups chicken stock
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons soy sauce
 - 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
 - 2 cups shredded, cooked chicken
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 - Steamed white rice
 - 1 No. 2 1/2 can Chinese Noodles
- Combine celery, onion and green pepper with stock in sauce pan. Cook until the mixture steams, then simmer for 20 minutes. Add salt, soy sauce, mushrooms and chicken. Combine water with cornstarch; add to mixture, stirring until thickened. Serve on mounds of rice, sprinkled with Chinese noodles.

Yesterday's roast makes a welcome casserole, quick stew or hash stuffed into green peppers.

Don't let your bacon drippings get rancid. Refrigerate them and use in place of butter for seasoning vegetables.

Chicken Tetrazzini. (Serves 6)

- 4 tablespoons fat
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon fat
- 2 cups cooked, diced chicken
- 1 cup cooked spaghetti, cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 1/4 cup crumbs

Prepare white sauce from first six ingredients. Remove from heat. Saute mushrooms in one tablespoon of fat. Add with chicken and spaghetti to white sauce. Pour into a greased casserole and sprinkle top with cheese, melted butter and crumbs. Bake in a hot oven for 25 minutes.

Chicken Stew with Dumplings. (Serves 6)

- 3 to 4 pound stewing hen
 - 2 cups boiling water
 - 2 teaspoons salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 2 cups sliced carrots
 - 1 cup peas
 - 1/2 cup flour
 - 1 cup water
 - 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- Place disjointed chicken in saucepan with water, salt and pepper. Cover and cook slowly until tender, from 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Remove chicken and skim fat from stock. Add carrots and peas and cook for 10 minutes. Mix flour with water to a smooth paste and stir into broth. Cook until clear and thickened. Add chicken, parsley and dumplings.

Dumplings. (Serves 6)

- 1 cup flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 tablespoon chicken fat, melted
 - 1 egg, beaten
 - 1/4 cup milk
- Sift together dry ingredients, then combine with melted fat, egg and milk. Drop by spoonfuls on top of chicken. Cover closely. Cook for 15 minutes without lifting the cover.

Chicken Turnovers. (Serves 6)

- Pastry
 - 3 cups chopped, cooked chicken
 - 1 1/2 cups gravy
 - 1 1/2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 3 tablespoons chopped stuffed olives
 - 1 teaspoon salt
- Make pastry from three cups flour, one cup lard and 1/4 teaspoon salt with enough water to hold together. Combine remaining ingredients to a smooth paste. Roll pastry into six 8-inch squares and place 1/4 cup filling on each square. Turn up corners and pinch pastry together. Bake on cookie sheet in hot (425 degree) oven 30 minutes.

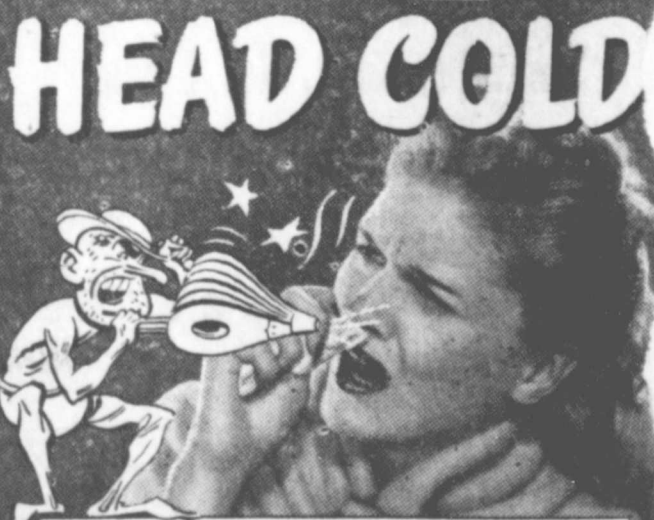
'Columbus Clocks' Found To Be but Fair Souvenirs
