





Skiing Growing Swiftly as the Popular Pastime.

BOSTON .- The winter sports "industry" in the skiing areas of northern New England is in full blast. Usually the winter-time activities reach a peak over Washington's birthday or in March, but this year skiing began in northern Vermont as early as mid-November, and practically every important area is reporting "good" to "excellent" conditions, an unheard of phenomenon for so early in the season.

Hotels are packed in all but the more remote areas. At North Conway's Eastern Slope inn. 6,000 people fought for the 260 accommoda tions available. A record-breaking season is reported for the entire area.

The White mountains of New Hampshire, Green mountains of Vermont and the Berkshire hills in western Massachusetts comprise the most intensively developed winter sports region in the country, all within easy reach of populous New York City and southern New England.

This year 253 ski tows and lifts-25 per cent more than were in operation last yearare dragging people uphill to risk life and limb on 1,500 miles of down hill ski trails. 

The United States is experiencing a steady increase in population. From a range of 2.1 million to 2.3 million in the 1930s, births rose to 2.9 million in 1943. They totaled 2.7 million in 1945 and then sharply rose again to about 3.9 million in 1947. Indians Has Rubber Balls When Columbus landed on the island of Santo Domingo on his first voyage he found the young Indians playing with balls made of elastic resin. 


A committee of Conservative speers is considering a proposal to limit membership to about 300 lords with outstanding public service records.

Sewing Circle ratterns EDU SANIOL. And Religion "Gown and Jacket In a ruling that, for good or ill,

could stand to affect the moral stature of this and succeeding generations of Americans, the U.S. supreme court declared unconstitutional the use of public school systems to help any religious group spread its faith.

Religion and government, the de-cision said, "can best work to achieve their lofty aims if each is left free from the other within its respective sphere."

The ruling upheld a protest by selfprofessed atheist mother, Mrs. Vashti McCollum, that a system of religious teaching in Champaign, Ill., schools breaks down the wall between church and state.

Delivering the main opinion, Justice Black held that under the facts shown the compulsory education system in Illinois "assists and is integrated with the program of religious instruction carried on by separate religious sects." He said pupils legally required to go to school for secular education are re-leased from some of that legal duty on condition that they attend religious classes.

"This is beyond all question a utilization of the tax-established and taxsupported public school system to aid religious groups to spread their faith." It was an issue that parents as well as all other U. S. citizens would do well to consider.

There were two facets which would bear reflection:

The supreme court's decision confirmed a long-standing and honorable theory in the U.S. that there should be no interference between church and state and no influence exerted by one on the other. The ruling would seem to safeguard the nation against the two extremes of a state-controlled church or a church-controlled state.

But at the same time, the broad language of the decision failed to recognize the historical importance of religion in creating civilizations and forming and molding nations. Western civilization grew out of the Christian church. Divorcement of the cause and effect now could be dangerous.

FINNISH:

Aid to Russia

It was with no clapping of hands that the government of Finland decided to accept the proposal of Prime Minister Josef Stalin of Russia to discuss a treaty of mutual military aid.

Russia, which needs military help from Finland about as much as the U. S. needs a five-year plan, put the proposal of a discussion to Finland's President Jugo K. Paasikivi within a week after it had swept Czechoslovakia into the Soviet orbit.

Having no alternative, Paasikivi accepted the "invitation" and appointed a negotiating delegation of seven members, including one military expert, government officials and parliament

Soviets say they want a binding treaty of mutual military assistance against future German aggression." Talks presumably were being held on that basis, but it was the task of the Finnish negotiators to do all they could to prevent Finland from being chained

There was little doubt in the minds of Finnish leaders that this was Russia's first step in a campaign to gain as complete control over that little northern nation as it now holds over the Balkans. And in the final analysis the Finns would capitulate in the stark interests of self-preservation.

Goodrich com pany, told members of Midwest Im plement Dealers association. He cited the fact that the nation's tractor "population" had doubled, from one million to two million, just since

1940.

Praising "the way America's farmers and other food producers had come through to ease tragic conditions in many lands," Hoban cited the following estimates on the nation's 1947 exports of foodstuffs? 392 million bushels of wheat, five times the amount exported in 1939; 88 million bushels of corn, compared to 32 million in 1939, and 328 million pounds of meat products, against 193 million in 1939.

The farm market offered "the biggest sales opportunity" for industry in 1947, Hoban said, adding that "there is no question that this market is going forward at as great or even greater pace in 1948."

Hoban said that all tractors now made are rubber-tired, and that changing all a farm's rolling stock from steel to rubber tires produced an average saving of 24 working days and 675 gallons of gasoline per year, for each 150 acres worked.




