5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 13, 1985

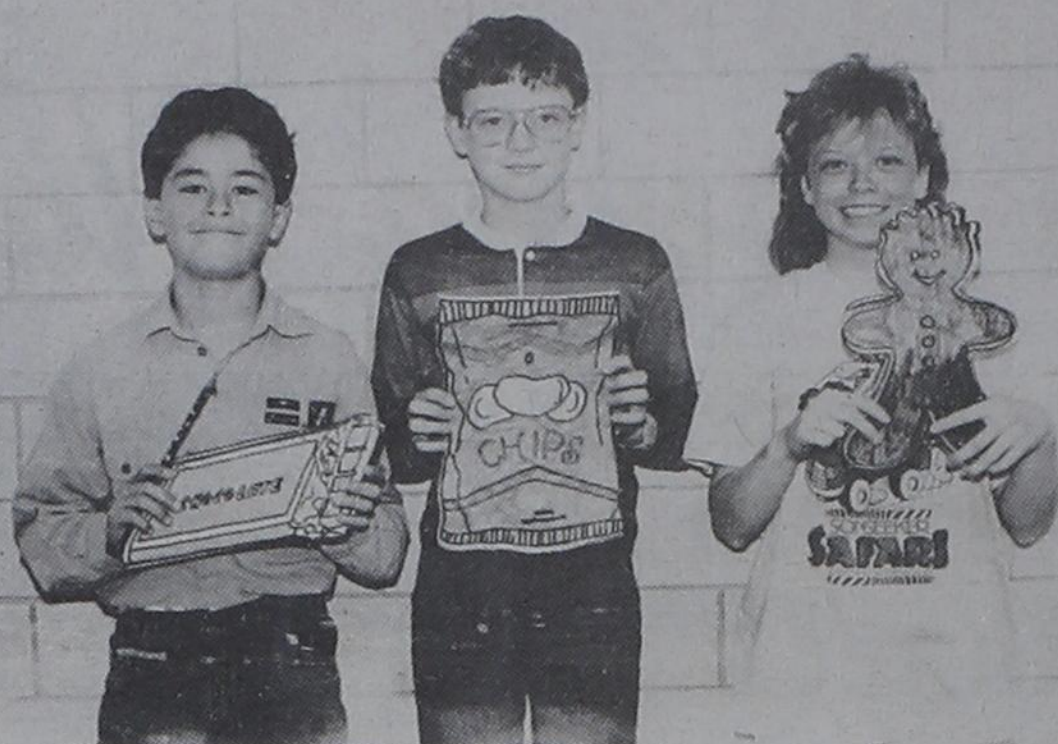
Dudley's Auto Store is in the process of being expanded about 2,000 square feet from the original size.

If you sell your main home, you may be able to postpone paying tax on some or all of the gain from the sale. If you buy a new home, and the purchase price of the new home is at least as much as the adjusted sales price of the old home, you may be able to postpone the tax on all the gain from the sale. If you do not buy a new home, or if the purchase price of the new home is less than the adjusted sales price of the old home, you will be subject to tax on some or all of the gain, unless you are age 55 or older and qualify to exclude the gain.

Use Form 2119, Sale of Your Home, to report the sale of your old home and any purchase of a new one, even if the tax is postponed on the entire gain.

You can choose to exclude from income \$125,000 of gain on the sale of your main home if you meet all the following requirements:

1. You were 55 or older on the date of the sale.
2. You owned and lived in your main home for at least 3 years out of the 5-year period ending on the date of the sale.
3. Neither you nor your spouse has excluded gain on the sale of a home since July 26, 1978.
