RECORD BUDGET:

Asked of Congress President Truman, presenting a proposal for the largest peacetime budget in U. S. history to the congress, was greeted with the expected reaction. Dem. crats ap-plauded, Republicans instantly demanded deep slashes in recommended outlay. It became evident quickly that the fight on adoption of the budget would be carried out

strictly along party lines.

THE PRESIDENT declared it would take 41 billion, 858 million dollars to run the government right for the next year. And the punch line was that half of every American tax dollar would be spent to hold back the Communist tide in the world.

On a party line basis, approval of the budget was assured, assuming, of course, that the Democrats hold fast. The President had a comfortable majority in both houses and there should be no difficulty in getting his proposal adopted.

But 'the 41 billion-plus figure wasn't all. Mr. Truman served notice he will ask more funds later to supply arms to non-Communist nations, a step which would push the budget even higher.

THE ONLY possible bar to approval of the Truman budget was public reaction to the plan to finance with 50 cents of every American dollar anti-Red activities abroad. Would the people go along with American foreign policy and the theories of policy-makers that such a step was the only answer to Communist menace? Apparently the President is confident, because of his victory at the polls, that the people will support him in such a move and thus showed no hesitancy in his budget proposals nor in making his declaration that he plans to call upon the American people for even more money to stem the Communist tide.

Already thoughts are turning to the 1950 congressional elections and congressmen whose senses were not completely lulled by the 1948 Democratic sweep, may want to sound out the public sentiment on the hugh expenditure program. If that is the case, public opinion may be the final factor in adoption of the budget.

Meanwhile, the critics of British policy in the Middle East prepared to demand that Secretary Bevin explain how it happened that five RAF planes were shot down by the Israelis near the Palestine border. Britain's air ministry asserted all five planes were shot down while

flying over Egypt.

IT COULD NOT be denied that the situation was difficult. Broken down to its basic essentials, it is a condition where one people must, or have been told they must, give way to the infiltration of another people-the Jews moving into Palestine and the Holy Land area, the Arabs moving out. It has never been a secret that British sympathies, for whatever reason, lie with the Arabs and John Bull looks with jaundiced eye on the partition action and the influx of the Jews. But the United States and some other nations have sided with the movement to return the Jews to their homeland, and thus the stalemate.

It may yet require organization of and action by a United Nations police force to settle the affair.



Restyling Helps Add Interest When You Grow Tired of Clothes

Dramatic buttons on a weary suit guarantee new interest. Some clip-on jewelry for your hand bag makes it almost new! These are all simple restyling tricks, but they will lift any wardrobe out of the doldrums until you can don lighter, gayer things of the new season.

Do Cleaning, Repairs

Refore Restyling You will be both surprised and delighted at how much life you can bring to clothing with proper cleaning. Much of the original texture and shape of the garment can be restored to dresses, sweaters, hats and coats when dirt and grime are displaced. Wash those pieces which are guaranteed washable, and clean or have cleaned those which re-

Repair buttons, snaps, zippers and other parts of the garment which need it. If the garment still



does not create more of an interest, embark on a bit of restyling. Buy or Make

Your Patterns Yokes, plastrons, collars and cuffs as well as puffy peplums which are now being used may be cut from tissue paper at home, or purchased if you don't feel clever about de-

Check your own sources of materials before purchasing any. A bit of precious lace from an old dress



Or ruffie to restyle dress. yoke for a dress or collars and cuffs. It's possible to sew imitation rhinestones into the lace to add glitter and new life to the lace.

Old evening apparel often yields a piece of taffeta or net that can be utilized into yokes, collars or cuffs. Hem interest is still high, and a ruffled or gathered hem may be added to a full, flaring skirt, or a softly gathered one. If you are working with the skirt alone, and adding restyling in the form of a new hem to it, carry out the same motif in the pockets, too.

If you're adding the hem to a dress, it's wise to make a collar and cuffs of the same material as the hem. This forestalls an appearance of face-lifting, and makes the garment look as though just purchased.

In cases where you have gained or lost weight during the season, the restyling will consist of letting out or taking in a garment. The latter is an easy matter; the former slightly more difficult since material may have to be added.

For the too tight basic dress, add an inverted panel of trimming and use the same trim on the cuffs. For dresses that have become shorter because you've gained weight, a or trimming may give you a new new hem plus collar and cuffs may be added.

> How to Restyle Torn Blouses

There's a lot of under-arm strain on blouses resulting in tears beyond repair. For the short-sleeved blouse which has torn, full, new sleeves may be added.

For sleeves which have torn at the armhole, it's best to cut down the blouse and make a dickey out of it.

For lace which is frayed and shabby at the front of the blouse, carefully rip out the old, and insert some new lace which will match closely that which has been re-

moved. Blouses which button down the back, frequently tear at the button holes, or where the buttons are sewed. This is easily mended by placing a long strip of matching mending tape on either side, preferably on the button side. Place the tape inside where the fabric will cover it and then sev the buttons on that. It means a good reinforcing

Change Your Shabby Accessories

It's a simple matter to buy a new belt or change a tarnished buckle on the old one in preferance to wearing a shabby one. Besides that, a frezh new belt or a reconditioned me will do more for both waistline enc dress.
