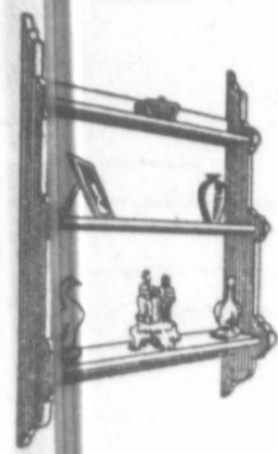

Pasture Rotation Controls Parasites

A few years ago parasites caused such heavy losses in sheep and lambs in the northwest that some ranchers were forced out of business. Research and investigation by veterinarians, sanitary experts, and sheep men pointed to overgrazing as the underlying cause of the trouble.

Rotation of pastures and reasonable growth of grass or sheep and lambs were vital to stop the heavy losses and avoid the devastating parasites. Some ranchers, who practiced frequent rotation and the feeding of adequate nerals the year around, were datively free from parasite sees.

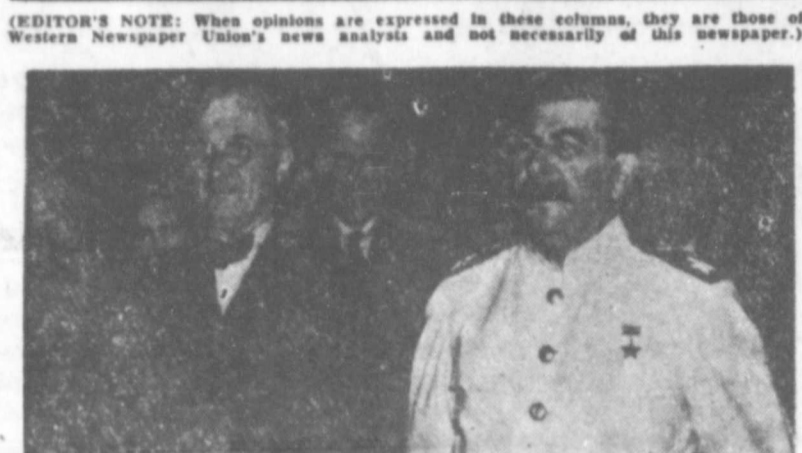

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS U.S. Rejects Stalin Peace Talks; Norway Prefers Western Alliance, Spurns Russian Council Suggestion

WANTS OPEN DISCUSSION Truman Won't Talk Behind Iron Curtain

It was beginning to look like "Uncle Joe" Stalin and Harry S. Truman never would get together for a talk looking toward settlement of U. S. and other western powers' differences with the Soviets.

"Meet Stalin behind the iron curtain?" Secretary of State Dean Acheson snorted in disdain, declared in effect that the idea was preposterous.

Acheson went further. He asserted indirectly that the Russian leader was playing politics with peace hopes of millions of people.

Anyway, Acheson went on, what might be gained? Hadn't the Russians consistently blocked all efforts in the United Nations looking toward disarmament, control of the atom bomb and creation of a U. N. police force?

BUT THE U. S. couldn't be put in the position of appearing disinclined even to talk about peace, so Acheson left the door open for a parley; but there were some American conditions this time. The White House, it appeared, would be willing to see Stalin—in Washington. Stalin had said he'd be willing to see Truman—behind the iron curtain, and there the matter stood.

Acheson made a further point. The U. S., in any event, would not discuss with Russia alone any points having a direct interest to other nations.

As for a "peace" declaration, Acheson declared he found this puzzling inasmuch as Russia, the U. S., and all other U. N. members are already pledged "by most solemn treaty commitments not to engage in war with one another."

HE ADDED that the hopes of the world's peoples for peace are considered by this nation to be fundamental, and that the United States would not play politics with these hopes.

While it might appear an oversimplification of the problem, many might raise the question that if Acheson is relying on Russia's U. N. pledge to keep the peace, why should there be any official U. S. concern over the entire Russian relations puzzle?

The fact there is grave concern over the puzzle indicates Mr. Acheson may have been talking when he should have been thinking.

NORWAY: Standing Pat

Norway was drawing no cards. Standing pat, she would play the ones she had.

IN OTHER WORDS, the Norwegians wanted nothing but friendship with the Soviets, but if it were all the same, they would rather depend upon security in regional pacts such as the proposed north Atlantic alliance, than upon an alignment with the Soviet union.

The position stated by Norway was in answer to a Soviet note asking the nation's clarification of its view on the proposed north Atlantic setup.

Norway said the United Nations had failed to provide the world with peace and security, and her own people's "serious concern" for their liberty had "convinced the government that it was necessary to seek increased security through regional cooperation in the defense field.

BUT THE NORWEGIAN government assured the Russians that it would never agree to foreign bases on its soil "as long as Norway is not attacked or the subject of threats of attack." And the government pledged itself to support a policy of non-aggression.

The decision could be interpreted no other way than as a definite setback for Soviet expansion-by-intimidation policies. Norway is a small country and vulnerable to Soviet attack. Nevertheless, it has

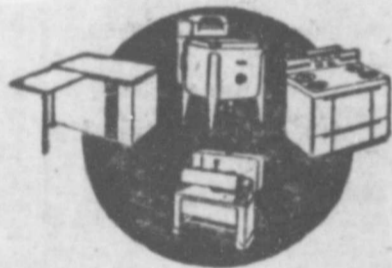

Many Different Trends, Styles Seen in Fabric Use for Spring

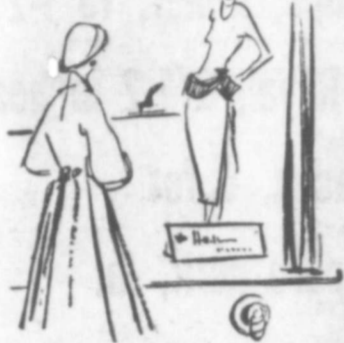

WHEN WOMEN choose their clothes this spring, they will have a wide variety of styles from which to select, but the main theme of the new clothes will be to have all those who wear them look prettier.

There are no really striking changes in fashion to report, but you'll be seeing more of what has already been in the process of coming out, such as stress on the empire silhouette, great collar and cuff interest, as well as a lavish display of quality fabrics.

The emphasis on quality fabrics is especially important in the Bang collection of new clothing for he uses everything in fine linens as well as everything from alpaca and silk to superlative wools with which to show his new designs.

What is to be known as the "close look" will be popular in coats, the majority of which follow fitted princess lines with variations in detail such as yoke girdle effects in back only or wool bands applied in

There's a needle point wool, the texture of which looks exactly like fine needlepoint that's especially handsome in a grey fitted coat with the aforementioned applique of self-fabric substituting for a collar.

The exception to the fitted coat in the collection is the travel coat which is boldly plaided and briskly belted, full skirted and easy sleeved.

No Single Silhouette Regarded Prominent

or suit as something a woman puts on as a becoming shell and then forgets.

Though many other silhouettes are represented, coats can be divided into two different classifications: There is the one already mentioned, the moulded coat, fitted through the bodice and midriff, and then there are bell coats, shaped out bell-like from deep raglan sleeves, set in far back from the armhole.

The moulded coats, made of either soft wool or crisp silk, are fitted to the figure by tucks and inserts and fall easily away from the body of the skirt.

For wear with those handsome suits of tweed, gabardine and "men's wear wools" (one of the forthcoming suit highlights of the new season), try a handsome multi-colored tweed coat. Casual in style, these coats take on much color and drama by a clever playing of stripes and other patterns throughout the cut. Among the details that give them a distinctive "Spring, 1943," look are standing collars, widely flared collars, raglan type sleeves, novelty pockets and flaps and unusual cuffs. These are the grandest coats for traveling, daily wear and family chauffuring.

Grape Print Dress



"Grapes" is the name Brooke Cadwallader gives to this new silk print design, an impressionistic treatment of blue grapes on a brown and cocoa background. Fox-brownie designed the dress with a deep V-pointed bertha collar, short sleeves and graceful, flowing skirt.

The small waistline is emphasized quite often by peg-shaped pockets set at the hip. Many of these coats have deep sleeves, sometimes gathered at the elbow, and show small, upstanding collars.

The bell-shaped coats most often have small or medium sized upstanding collars and large pockets. They vary in length from hip length to three-quarter, seven-eights or coats are made of horizontal and curved sections, in panel effect.

Some of the bell-shaped coats take on a different look when they're wrapped. Another variation of this coat is the belted bell cut like the loose coat, but pulled in at the waist by tucks, pleats and belt.

Shepherdess Theme Seen in Dresses
Dipping into old paintings for inspiration, Capri dresses will make girls look as though they had just stepped right out of a picture.

Some of these particular dresses feature the draped and shirred shepherdess neckline which seems to come from the French painter, Francois Boucher. This neckline is becoming low, adhering and off-the-shoulder. There's also another neckline called the Venus neckline which is deeper and varied, framed with fold drapery. Both of these appear in silk prints and after-five taffetas.

From the Eighteenth century artist comes inspiration, too, for the pannier-like shepherdess pleats and shepherdess apron fronts that give soft fullness to the skirts; and shepherdess-tied sleeves knotted just above the elbow.

The airlight bolero, a version of the season's flareback jacket that tops a slim skirt in many another collection is teamed here with fairly full-skirted one-piece dresses in matching wools. Several of the dresses are designed with Capri's wide-molded Empress waistline, curving up and under the bosom and defined with narrow braid.

Most of this collection looks slim, but there is the full, pinwheel skirt, stitch-pleated all around and sometimes horizontally tucked all over too.

Some of the full skirt look is achieved by using layers of material like lace over net or starched batiste, dotted silk or tissue faille over marquisette and chiffon over crepe.

Detail, Fine Fabrics Colors are Excellent

There's a wealth of fine tailoring now appearing in clothes which not only adds to their beauty, but also makes the most of the fine, luscious materials used. Linens used are heavy and crisp, and are popular not only for suits but dresses as well.

Brown, black and copper are favored materials in linen and alpaca suits, but all types of luscious pastels are featured in dresses, many of which have lace trimming, an interesting foil to the linen.

Fine wools, some with soft weaves, others with interesting textured effects are seen in the cooler weather suits. Here again black and brown are popular, but you'll also find that grey, beige and navy are often seen.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

QUESTION: "When we moved into our apartment, we purchased from the previous tenant the linoleum on the kitchen floor. The quality is excellent, but the color is a dirty gray-green in a marbled pattern. Is there any product which will stain or dye the linoleum (not paint) so that we can get a deep blue tone and still retain the marbled effect?"

ANSWER: I do not know of any stain or dye for that purpose. But you may be able to get the effect that you want by stippling in two colors, or else by applying a "spatter-dash" finish. For the stippling, first cut a large sponge in half. Apply an oil floor paint of the background color that you wish on the floor. When this has dried, paint a section of clean board with a second color that you will use for stippling, press the flat, cut side of the sponge on this fresh paint, and then press this on the linoleum. The pattern of the cut sponge thus will be transferred to the floor.

For a spatter-dash effect, use a stick and a brush with a rather long bristle. Dip the brush into the paint and wipe off the excess. Strike the brush ferrule against the stick so that the paint will come off in drops on the floor. (The floor should already be painted with the background color.) Try these methods first on pieces of boards to get the knack. See that the linoleum is absolutely clean and dry before you start to paint, no grease or wax.

Reducing Lamb Losses
