Six Layer Wedding Cake (Serves 16-18) 6 cups sifted cake flour

6 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt 11/4 cups shortening 4 cups sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla 1 teaspoon almond extract 2 eups milk 10 egg whites

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening with vanilla and almond extract until fluffy. Fold in sugar and blend until thoroughly mixed. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, in small amounts, beating after each addition, until smooth. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold in gently. Pour into greased, waxed-paper lined pans and bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 30 minutes. This recipe makes six nine-inch layers.

Lemon Filling (For 6 nine-inch layers)

214 cups sugar 1/2 cup cornstarch

1/4 teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons grated lemon rind

I cup lemon juice 11/2 cups water 3 eggs, beaten

3 tablespoons butter Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt thoroughly. Add remaining ingredients in order given and blend thoroughly. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until thickened. Cool.


