



ERP FUND:

5.75 Billions More

The European recovery program appeared set for another year. The senate, by a vote of 63 to 7, voted a 5.75 billion dollar appropriation to take care of European recovery needs and pay U.S. occupation costs abroad. Final action came after two weeks of debate.

THE SENATE voted a full 12month program, with no authority of the spending agency to expend the money in a shorter period. At the same time, it approved an outlay of \$344,000 for a congressional watchdog committee to keep a check on foreign spending.

The upper chamber of congress gave tacit approval to nationalization of industries-in England, that is-by knocking down an amendment which would have withheld recovery funds from any nation which in the future nationalized an industry. This was aimed directly at Great Britain.

The bill provided:

One hundred and fifty million dollars for ECA loans to Europe. A billion, 740 million dollars for ECA's May-June operations. NINE HUNDRED MILLION

for army occupation costs in Germany, Austria, Japan and the Ryuku islands.

Forty-five billion for Greece and Turkey.

In its struggle with the bill, the senate beat off efforts to earmark first half of boom-time 1948. 500 million dollars for a loan to Spain and to require the ECA and the army to earmark two billion dollars for surplus U. S. farm prod-

CHINA:

Lost Cause

Accusations, name-calling, recrimination did nothing to distort the picture-if the United States was winning the cold war in the West, she was losing it in the East.

The United State's "white paper" on what had happened in China and why charged vigorously that Communist victory over the Chinese and the disintegration of the Nationalist government were all the fault of Nationalist Generalissi-

mo Chiang Kai-Shek.
SAID DEAN ACHESON, U.S. secretary of state: "Full blame for the ominous result of the Chinese civil war accrues to Chiang Kaishek and other Nationalist leaders because they lost no battle as the result of a lack of American aid."

In obvious contrast to the firm policy in dealing with Russia on problems affecting the West, Acheson said of China's future and U.S. aims in that direction: "Future U. S. policy must concentrate on relieving China of the Moscow-inspired foreign yoke of Commu-

That appeared easier said than done, however. There was no pact and no arms program to warn off the Reds, and, anyway, the Communists were on the ground and in control. Even the most optimistic among the diplomats in Washington would realize that throwing the Communists out of China would be

a long, hard fight.

According to reliable reports. Moscow's jamming of radio programs has tuned down the "Voice of America" to a mere whisper of

its former self. THESE REPORTS declare that Russian interference with programs beamed to the Soviet has been so effective as to cut to 10 per cent the American broadcasts which now permeate the region around Moscow

Two official American protests against these jamming tactics were made last year, but in each case Moscow disclaimed any knowledge of such interference.

The Kremlin aim is obvious. Russian leaders are making every effort to isolate the Soviet people more completely from the west. Reception of American-originated broadcasts would have no place in that objective.

U.S. INCOMES:

Higher Than Ever

The status of consumer buying power in the nation was good. In fact, personal incomes, which are the mainspring of such buying, increased in June, according to reports of the federal department of

THE RISE helped push incomes for the first six months of 1949 to a level 2.6 per cent higher than the

The report estimated that the flow of personal income from all sources reached an annual rate of 213.5 billion dollars in June. The commerce department's study showed the upturn had been continuing for three months, April through June, and that the gain accelerated as it continued.

An increase in farm income was cited by the department as the main cause of the June increase in personal income, as compared with

THE DEPARTMENT regarded as more significant, however, the fact that factory payrolls were credited with a slight increase in June after having declined steadily since last September.

COMIC BOOKS:

New Approach

The impact of so-called "comic books" on juvenile minds and their influence for good or evil has recently been a subject of widespread controversy in these United States. Some municipalities banned sale of the more objectionable books, others contented themselves with talking; but San Diego, it appears, has come up with a most

sensible approach. That southern California city has started what it calls a "comic book of the month club." It's purpose is to "put the fun back into funny books," from whence it has been conspicuously absent all these years.

The movement was launched after many San Diego families became disturbed about the subject matter of many of the comic books.

THE project depends upon cooperation of the comic-book publishers. If that can be obtained, publishers would submit the books to a board of review in advance of publication. Books that were approved would be mailed to club subscribers, who would be divided into different age groups.







FIRESIDE CHAT:

"Selfish Interests"

President Truman charged in a 'fireside chat' to the nation that 'selfish interests' are making budget-cut requests which threaten to "blunder" the nation into depression.

In his economic report, Truman assured the nation that it is not in a depression, despite business decline. "Political reasons" lead some people to want depression, he said. He added that depression can be avoided.

He blamed "selfish interests" for the tax cut that congress passed over his veto and for the denial of anti-inflation curbs he requested

HE FEARED a third great blunder and warned that "to slash government expenditures now would add to the downward trend." He defended his \$42.000,000.000 budget for government spending the next 12 months.

He said, "If we follow the wrong budget policy at this time and slash our expenditures, we will decrease employment, cut down investment, weaken our defenses, and injure our efforts for peace."

His speech was seen as a movement to line up popular support for a showdown fight with the economy bloc in congress which is demanding that government spending be cut to income.

He criticized those who say we are in a depression.

"Many of these persons for political reasons would like to have a depression," he said. "Others are saying that there is nothing to worry about and an increase of the number looking for work is a good thing. This attitude ignores the human suffering . . .

Dr. Robert M. Hutchins, chancellor of the University of Chicago, demanded that mankind's expanding knowledge be turned toward achievement instead of "trivialication" and formation of a huge

He spoke at the Goethe Bicentennial Convocation at Aspen, Colo. He said that world catastrophe is inevitable if the "tribal selfadoration, which goes under the name of patriotism continues un-

checked. He asked for a world union of "men of good will," and said that world government is a step in the right direction to avert global suicide. He argued that "communication" with Russia is possible if other nations were sincerely willing to try.

A "moral, intellectual and spiritual revolution is the only thing that will turn the world from a downward course, he argued. He attacked the "purposeless-

ness" of contemporary living, made more so by technology, and declared that new-gained leisure has been used for meaningless recreations

Of atomic energy in peace and war he said, "If we have war, we shall be blown to bits; if we have peace we shall be bored to death."

Hutchins compared today's civilization with the fears and hopes expressed by the 18th century humanist, Goethe. The theme of his speech was "Goethe and world

Goethe's dream for the world was that it should be a "world of friends," Hutchins said. He advocated Goethe's "civilization of

Have your Meat Tender, Delicious, Juicy (See Recipes Below)

Meat Magic THERE DOES SEEM to be a magical quality about meats which are cooked to juicy, tender perfection. However, it's not a mystic magic

which all aspire to, and few achieve. there is secret, available to all.

It is no secret that you should have a good cut of meat with which to start, if you want to have a delicious cut to set on the table. But once you have a good cut, do cook it properly instead of ruining it.

This latter statement may sound a bit far-fetched, but every day there are thousands of women who go to a great deal of trouble finding a perfect roast, then cook it like a pot roast which is practically stewing it. Then, too, there are other thousands who lose pounds meat by using old-fashioned methods such as high temperature for "browning" the meat. This is necessary because meat cooked at constant low temperature will brown enough to be attractive to the most discerning eye, and will not shrink and lose juice as well as waste meat.

If you have a covered roaster, resolve right now to discard the cover and invest in a rack roast. A true roast is not, at any point during roasting, cooked with a cover. It should sit on a rack, fat side up, at low to moderate temperature in the oven, to roast per-

How long should a roast be cooked? The most accurate way of determining this is to insert a meat thermometer into the meat as you place it in the oven, and when the temperature has reached its proper point the roast is done. Insert the thermometer through the center, as deep into the meat as possible. You may figure out the time to roast by pounds, but this is not nearly so accurate, especially if you are cooking roast beef to medium rare.

WHEN PROPERLY PREPARED corned beef can be a real delicacy. The meat is muscular. and needs to be cooked long and slowly for real tenderness, without which it is not a delicacy by any manner of means. Here's a novel way to prepare it.

Glazed Corned Reef 6-7 pounds corned heef 34 cup canned fruit juice 14 cup brown sugar 10 whole cloves

Spiced peaches Wash corned beef under running water to remove all traces of brine. Cover with cold water and bring to a boil. Drain and replace water. Simmer, slowly, in a covered kettle for 41/2 to 5 hours or until meat can be pierced easily with a fork. Add more water if necessary.

Drain meat and place on a rack in a roaster. Pour fruit juice over meat and sprinkle with brown sugar. Stick with cloves. Bake in a moderate oven (350°) for 1/2 hour. Serve, garnished with spiced

HARD AS IT MAY BE for you to try roasting meat at low and constant temperature, if you've

Wipe meat with damp cloth. Do not remove fell, the thin, papery covering over the meat. Make four gashes in the roast and insert a piece of garlic clove in each of them, if desired. Rub ginger, salt and pepper into the meat. Place in roaster on rack, fat side up, and roast in a slow (300°) oven until thermometer registers 180° for well done lamb. During the last 20 minutes of cooking time, baste the meat with grape juice which has been melted in the hot water. Remove garlic before serving.

Veal shoulder or breast may be stuffed with the following to give a very tasty roast. In roasting veal, use a slow oven (300° to 325° and cook until the ther-

mometer registers 175°, which is about 40 minutes to the pound.

Raisin Stuffing (For about 5 pound roast)
4 cups soft bread crumbs 1/2 cup melted fat 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup seedless raisins


