Play the QUIET game!

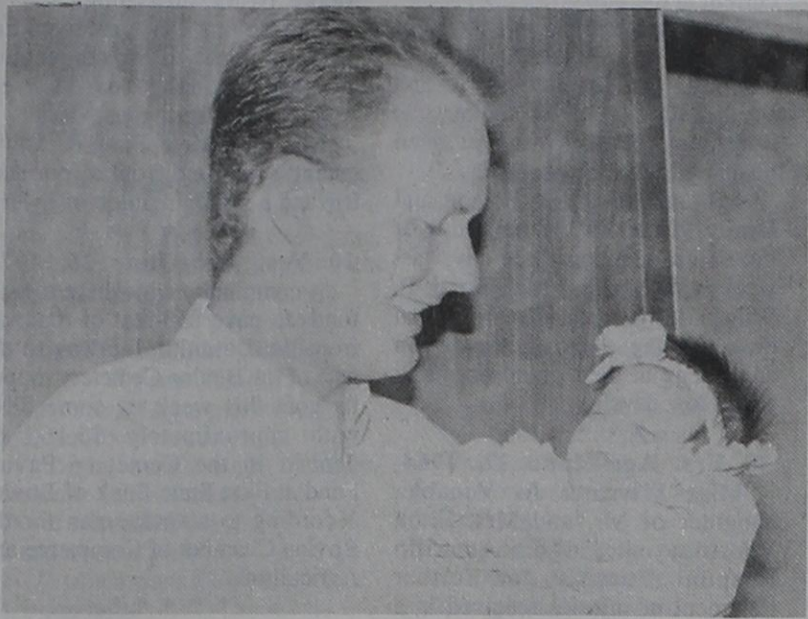
Quit whining! We can't stop to eat supper for another hour.

All monies received last year were allocated as follows: 38% cancer research program and grants; 26% public and professional education; 21% local patient services and community projects; 13% fund-raising costs; and 2% management and general.

"We are asking the community to help fight cancer by either purchasing a ticket and 'Tee Off For Cancer' or by making a contribution, and we would like to thank you for supporting our local effort," said a spokesperson for the local unit.

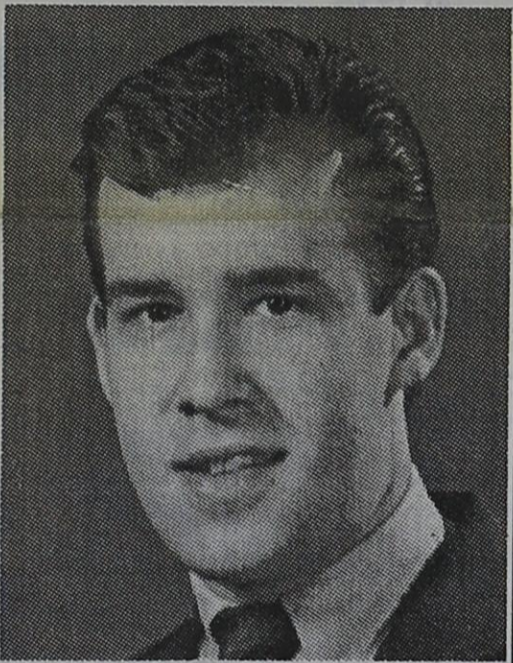

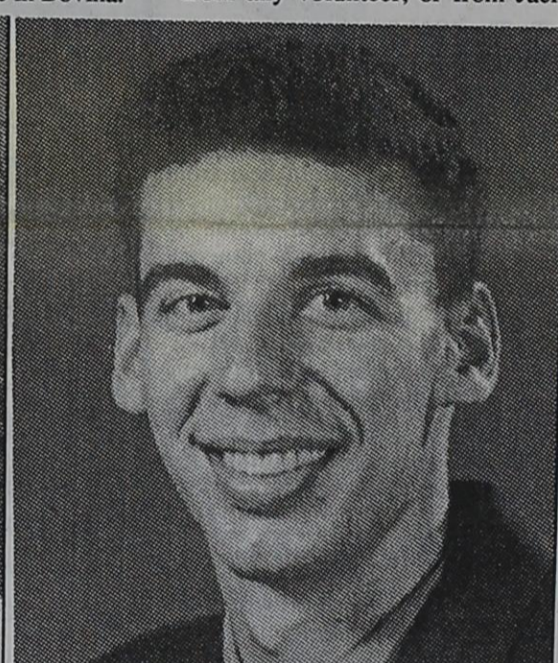
Heidi said there is a fund set up at the Citizen's Bank for any one who would like to help out with expenses for the reunion.

Baptist Church Sets Mammogram Unit To Be Youth-Led Revival In Friona

A youth revival team will be leading out in revival services at First Baptist Church, beginning Sunday, June 19, and going through Wednesday, June 22. The revival team will consist of three students from Texas Baptist universities.

Eric Evans from Dallas Baptist University is team leader and will be the preacher for each service. Eric is majoring in Biblical Studies and is from San Antonio. Eric says, "My passion, because of my love for Jesus and others, is to 'Preach the Word' soundly. If anyone repents or grows closer to Jesus this summer, it is because of God's all surpassing power."

Eric and the other team members will be leading summer revival services at eight other area Baptist churches besides here at Bovina. All three team members were chosen and trained by the Evangelism Department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Julie Nance will be leading revival music and be the children's leader for the week. She is a music major at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, but grew up in Odessa. She will be leading out in a morning Sports Camp for children, K-5th grade. The Sports Camp will be each morning, Monday through Wednesday, from 9:15 to 11 a.m., at the football practice field at Bovina schools.

The emphasis of the children's Sports Camp will be to teach children good sportmanship and to have fun. Refreshments will be served and ribbons awarded. Every child will be a winner. Julie says, worship service.

On Wednesday, July 20, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method know to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

(1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month. (2) Have a physical examination every year. (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: Age 40, one baseline mammogram; 40 to 49, a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; 50 and over, yearly mammograms.

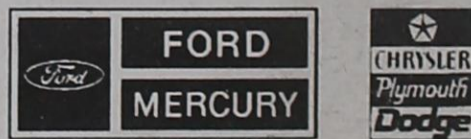

Last week's vegetable recipes seemed to please a lot of homemakers. The most enthusiastic comments we've had were generated by that column. One out-of-town respondent wrote, "Keep up the good works and keep 'em coming."

So, here goes another session of vegetable cooking.

COPPER PENNY CARROTS

Lucy Beth Hinkle

- 2 pounds carrots
- 1 medium onion
- 1 small green pepper
- 1 cup tomato soup
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 3/4 cup vinegar
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Salt and pepper to taste
Cook sliced carrots in salted water until tender. Alternate layers of carrot slices, onion slices and green pepper rings in casserole.

Combine tomato soup, salad oil, vinegar, sugar, prepared mustard and Worcestershire sauce with salt and pepper and blend well.

Pour over vegetables and refrigerate overnight or until time to serve.

COUNTRY STYLE BLACK-EYE PEAS AND OKRA

Jan Turner

(I have used this one many times. In my file, it is named "Texas Gumbo." It is one of my favorites.)

Boil large pot of blackeyed peas with bacon drippings and about one dozen pods of fresh okra. Season with salt and pepper and boil until tender.

PATIO POTATOES

Nedra Cash

- 4 cups sliced cooked potatoes
- 1 cup sliced onions
- 1/3 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 stick margarine
- Salt and pepper
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
- 4 slices bacon-chopped sausage may be substituted for this



Melt margarine in skillet. Add potatoes, onion and pepper. Cook until brown. Top with bacon and cheese. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

HOT GREEN BEANS

Wyona Clark

- 2 cans French style green beans
- 1/2 can Ro-tel tomatoes

Drain beans well. Put in casserole and add tomatoes. Cover with sauce made of:

- 2 tablespoons oleo
- 1-1/2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 pound Velveeta
- Salt and pepper to taste

Bake 20-30 minutes at 375 degrees.

CALICO BAKED BEANS

Judy Benson,

Forest Lake, Minnesota

- Partially cook:
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 pound bacon--cut in small bits
- 1 pound ground beef

Mix together and add:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons vinegar

1-No. 2 can kidney beans
1-No. 2 can pork and beans
1-No. 2 can baby lima beans
1-No. 2 can lima beans

Don't drain. Bake 1-1/2 hours at 350 degrees covered. Remove cover and bake awhile longer.

PHILAFULA

Soak 1 package of dry garbanza beans overnight with water to cover.
Boil five medium potatoes with

skins on until well cooked. Remove skins.

- 1 or 2 jalapeno peppers
- 1 bunch fresh parsley
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 large onions

Grind beans, potatoes, peppers, parsley and onions. Season with desired amount of salt and pepper. Shape into patties and fry in hot oil. Serve as a vegetable or as hors d'oeuvres.

BUCKAROO BEANS

Lunell Horton

- 1 pound dried red beans or pinto beans
- 1/2 pound smoked ham, bacon or salt pork, cut in pieces
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 large onion, coarsely chopped
- 1 small bay leaf
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed oregano leaves
- 2 cans canned tomatoes
- Salt to taste

Wash beans thoroughly in several changes of water. Put beans in a 3 quart Dutch oven and cover with water. Let soak overnight. The next day, add ham, garlic, onion and bay leaf; bring to boiling point. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 1 to 1-1/2 hours or until beans are almost tender. Add remaining ingredients except salt. Allow to simmer, covered, for 2 hours; stir once or twice. Add salt, if needed. Yields 8-10 servings.

FRIED CAULIFLOWER

Wanda Hart

- 1 medium cauliflower
- 1 cup seasoned bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Hot cooking oil

Break cauliflower into flowerettes. Cook in a small amount of salted water about 10 minutes; drain. Combine bread crumbs, flour, salt and pepper. Coat cauliflower with flour mixture. Fry in hot oil until golden brown. Yields 4 servings.

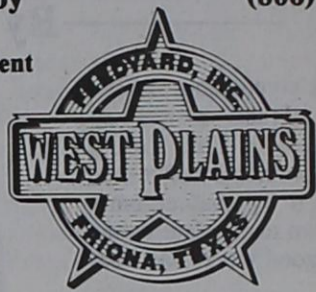

This activity is being sponsored by the Parmer County Extension Home Economics Committee.

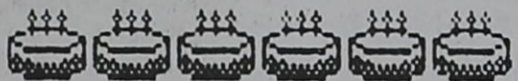

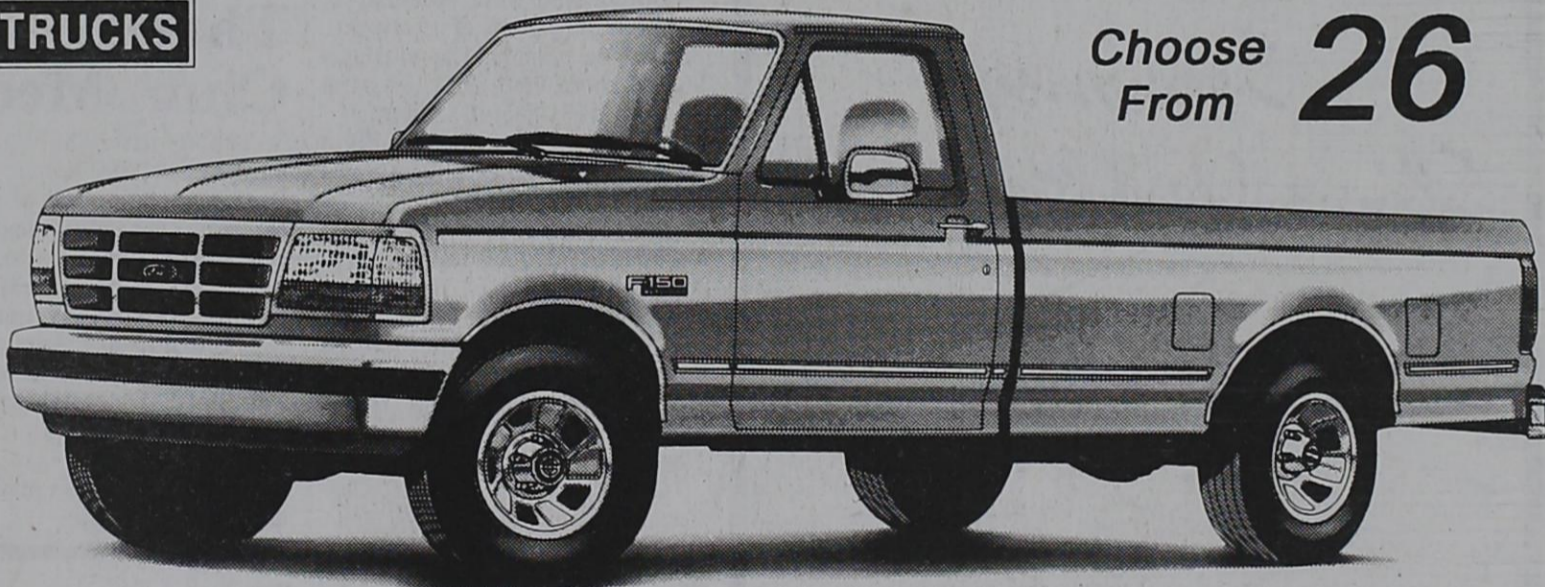

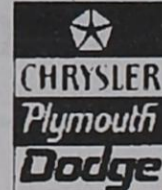

Paul and Ola Lee Jones flew to Lakeland, Florida recently and visited with son Randy, his wife,

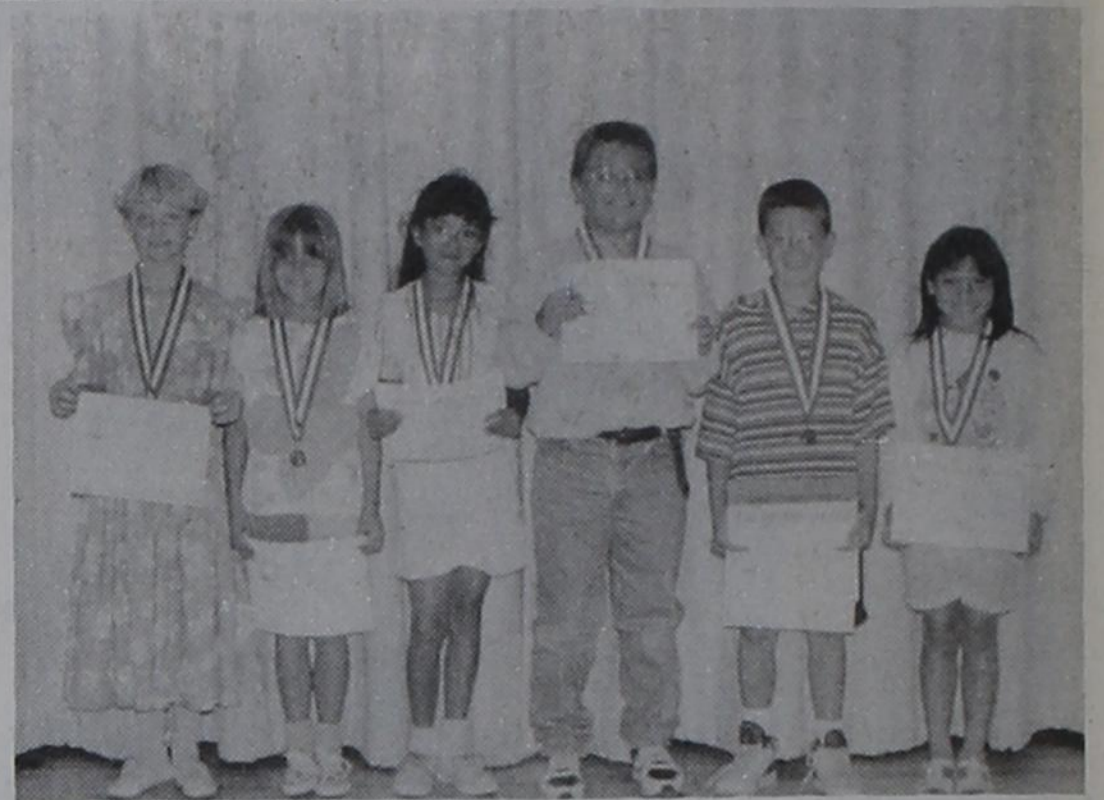
Funnula and son Austin. Ola Lee said they had a good visit and it wasn't too hot yet.
