

YUGOSLAVIA:

War Clouds

Was the United States ready to go to war on behalf of Yugoslavia? That was a paramount question as the hard-boiled struggle between Yugoslavia and Russia reached the threat-of-war stage. Diplomats pondered the question: What would the United States do if Stalin sent the Soviet army to overthrow Marshal Tito's regime in Yugoslavia?

BRITISH and American diplomats, however, ruled out the likelihood of a shooting war. They regarded Moscow's threat to "take more effective measures" in Yugoslavia as only a part of the war of nerves. British newspapers took a different view. They regarded the Soviet note as the "worst threat of war

No one outside the Kremlin could know for sure what was coming next. But the threat that began 14 months ago to upset Tito when the Cominform read him out of the Communists party developed long ago into frequent shootings along the satellite borders.

Diplomats in Belgrade frankly were worried. As an example of the jittery situation, one embassy thought it had an inside tip on an "invasion" date.

THE QUESTION of American involvement was not quite as academic as it might appear. With the issue squarely joined between Communism and the west, and with the U.S. serving as the arsenal of the west, involvement as a result of any warlike Kremlin move was an ever-present possibility.

EXCISE TAX:

Not This Year

All hope for any reduction this year of federal excise taxes appeared doomed as congress shut the door on the issue. Excise taxes are collected on such items as furs, jewelry, luggage, cosmetics, transportation and telephone bills.

CHAIRMAN DOUGHTON (D., N.C.) of the tax-writing house ways and means committee issued a statement saying that he sees no prospect for a reduction in these taxes now. He gave as a reason the federal deficit threat of more than five billion dollars in the current fiscal year.

To clarify the subject for consumers, he added:

"I believe it is important to make this clear so that consumers will not postpone the purchase of goods subject to tax in the hope of an immediate reduction."

BUT HE HELD out hope of tax reliefs in the future. He said he had requested the congressional staff of tax experts to begin now a study of possible tax revisions and reductions for the consideration of congress next year. There was a hint, however, that if present excises are lowered, some other taxes may be increased-unless federal expenditures are reduced. There remained a middle course

Doughton went on, which might provide a reasonable reduction in government expenditures, to require some increase in taxes where the increase can be borne without disturbing the economy, and to provide for a reduction in those taxes which are crippling enterprise and interfering with business expansion.

Fails For Granny

The gambling grandmother of Gardena, Calif., had a relapse MRS. SULA BELL STIMSON,

49, had been stricken with a compelling urge to gamble. She reached the stage where she forged checks with which to obtain funds for poker playing. She just couldn't resist the yen to see what that next card would be.

Last November she was brought into court for her weakness and was placed on probation for three years. Last April she was arrested again and a physician testified she had undergone a personality change from a normal housewife to a person afflicted with a craving for gambling.

HE SAID doses of glutamic acid had been used with some success in similar cases, recommended such treatment for Mrs. Stimson. The court agreed, and she was released to the custody of her family with court orders to continue the treatment.

It didn't work. The gambling grandmother had succumbed again to the fascination of the poker deck. The acid test had failed.





jams for your favorite winter meals. Then, too, some may still have space on cannin upboard of the arrivals. Peaches, pears,

grapes, plums and apples are now reaching markets to be available for preserving

All these fruits have a definite canning appeal whether you're past master at the art of preserving or a new bride about to embark on her first jelly-making adventure. . . .

HERE ARE SOME colorful and delicious jam combinations which are guaranteed to please because the flavors of fruits used compliment each other

Peach-Plum Jam (Makes 12 6-ounce glasses) 41/2 cups prepared fruit 71/2 cups sugar 1 bottle fruit pectin

Prepare fruit by peeling and pitting 11/2 pounds soft ripe peaches, chop or grind fine. Pit but do not peel 1 pound fully ripe plums. Cut in small pieces or chop. Combine fruits and measure 41/2 cups into a large saucepan.

Add sugar to fruit and mix well. Using high heat, bring to a full boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add pectin, stirring. Stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes, ladle quickly into glasses and paraffin at once.

Pear-Peach Jam (Makes 6 8-ounce glasses) 2 cups finely chopped pears 11/2 cups finely chopped peaches 1 box powdered fruit pectin



Mix well and heat to the boilring constantly When a full, rolling boil reached, boil for 1 minute. Re-

move from heat and skim. Seal in hot sterilized glasses. Pear-Plum Jam

(Makes 8 6-ounce glasses) 11/2 pounds peeled, ripe pears, chopped 11/2 pounds ripe plums, chopped

41/2 cups sugar 1 bex powdered fruit pectin Mix fruits, stir in pectin and sugar and heat to a full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from heat and skim. Ladle into sterile glasses and seal at once with paraffin.

Crabapple-Grape Jelly 3/4 peck crabapples 4 pounds Concord grapes



Many delicious combinations of jam may be made from two favorite fruits in place of one. A good example of colorful and appetizing jam is the use of peaches and plums, as illustrated here.

Pour into sterile glasses and seal with paraffin at once.

6 cups sugar 3 teaspoons turmerie seed Few whole cloves

Place layers of cucumber slices, onions and green pepper in a crock or large vessel and cover with salt water. made by using 1/4 cup salt to 1

quart water. Let stand for 3 hours. Drain. Mix together

vinegar, sugar and spices; heat thoroughly but do not boil. Pour over the vegetables and seal in sterile jars.

Raw Tomate Relish

(Makes 6 pints) 1 peck ripe tomatoes 2 cups chopped celery

6 large onions, chopped 2 cups sugar

1/2 cup salt 2 ounces white mustard seed 1 quart vinegar

Peel tomatoes and chop fine. Drain in a bag overnight. Add celery and onions and remaining ingredients to tomatoes. Mix thoroughly and seal in sterile jars. This may be served just as it comes from the jar with sandwiches, or it may be warmed slightly to serve with leftover meats.

WASHINGTON, D. C .- It was 25 years ago that John E Hoover, a librarian turned lawyer, took command of a run down police force whose officers could neither make arrests nor carry guns.

In a quarter century, much has happened.

America's criminal glossary has been swelled by such terms as "G-man," "G-heat" and "public enemy." The era of gang warfare as a national characteristic and kidnaping as a big time source of racket money have flowered and faded. The careers of "Machine Gun" Kelly, Dillinger and Karpis have boomed in the news headlines and ended at morgue and prison gates.

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
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
