Weekly Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ADMINISTRATION U. S. D. A.

Most southwest farm products sold steady to lower Monday through Monday although occasional strong spots appeared, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

Milo lost 2 cents a hundred pounds for the and barley 2 or 3 cents a bushel and white corn a penny. Other grains showed little or no change. No. 2 yellow milo closed Monday at \$2.30 to \$2.35 per hundredweight in bulk carlots at Texas common points. No. 1 wheat ranged from \$2.38½ to \$2.44½.

Eggs continued to weaken in the southwest as demand failed to absorb the increased offerings. Most poultry, including turkeys, showed little change from last week. Current receipt eggs brought 38 to 40 cents a dozen at Dallas and Fort Worth, 33 to 36 cents at Denver, and 33 to 38 cents at Little Rock.

A few less livestock came to southwest yards last week than the week before or the same week last year. Hog numbers increased sharply at midwest terminals.

Most hogs found steady markets last week, although prices were 50 cents lower at San Antonio. Sows sold 50 cents lower at most yards. Good and choice medium weight butcher hogs bulked at \$15.50 at San Antonio, and from \$15.50 to \$15.75 elsewhere in the southwest. Some sales reached up to \$15.85 at Denver.

Southwest cattle markets were steady to \$1 higher for the week. Cows and calves showed the full advance. However, some cows and few steers registered weakness at Denver. Most beef cows sold from \$14 to \$16 in the southwest.

Dressed meats sold mostly unchanged for the week at eastern wholesale markets.

Cotton gained 25 cents a bale since last Monday at Houston, but lost 50 to 75 cents at most other southwest markets. Spot middling 15-16 inch closed at 29.25 cents a pound at Dallas, 29.60 at Houston, and 29.70 at New Orleans.

In the first round of games of the boys division, Wellington won over Hedley by 3 points, Clarendon over Goodnight, Lelia Lake over Shamrock by 1 point, and Carey over Silvertown. Second round winners were Clarendon over Wellington and Carey over Lelia Lake in another close one, 4 points. Clarendon defeated Carey in the finals by 6 points, giving Clarendon the first place trophy and Carey second. In the consolation side of the bracket, Hedley won over Goodnight while Shamrock drew a bye, then Shamrock defeated Hedley for the consolation trophy.

In the girls division, first round results included Hedley over Clarendon by only 2 points, Lelia Lake over Carey, Shamrock drew a bye, and Wellington won over Goodnight. In the second round, Hedley won over Lelia Lake, Shamrock over Wellington, putting Shamrock and Hedley in the finals, which Shamrock won in a very thrilling game, 14 to 13. The Hedley girls were highly praised for the battle they gave their larger opponents. On the consolation side, Clarendon won over Carey while Goodnight drew a bye, then Clarendon won over Goodnight to win the consolation trophy.

Cotton Report

Census report shows that 15,431 bales of cotton were ginned in Donley County from the crop of 1949 prior to Dec. 1st as compared with 8,346 bales for the crop of 1948.

Texas Almanac

Texas' growth and change in the last ten years dwarf all previous periods in the state's history. The Texas Almanac, just published by The Dallas Morning News, reports the new Almanac-672 pages-is the largest ever published. It contains more than 650,000 words and word-equivalents in statistics, scores of maps and illustrations.

Texas' population is predominantly urban, for the first time in history. The net value of manufactured products has more than quadrupled since the prewar period. The number of industrial wage earners has doubled, the Almanac reports.

With farm population down, agricultural production is up. Mechanization may be the answer, the number of tractors in the state jumped from 98,923 in 1940 to 236,390 this year.

The Bureau of the Census hurried compilation of its new post-war count of manufacturers to make it available for this Texas Almanac, editors report. All figures, including data on individual industries, counties and cities are included in the book. There is a 15,000 word history of the Texas cattle industry. All developments in mineral exploration and development are shown.

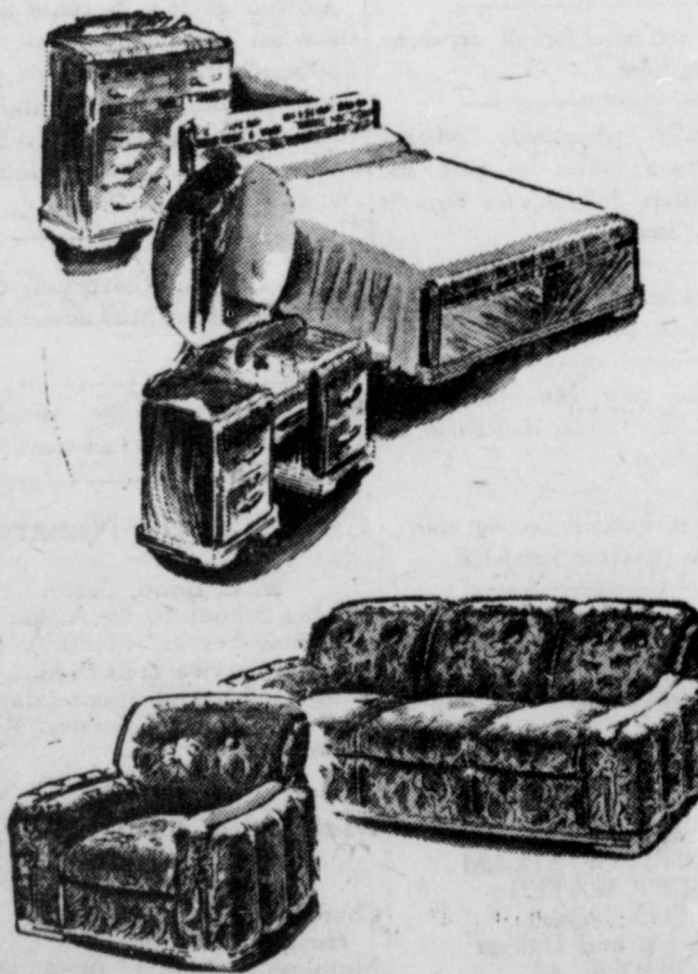

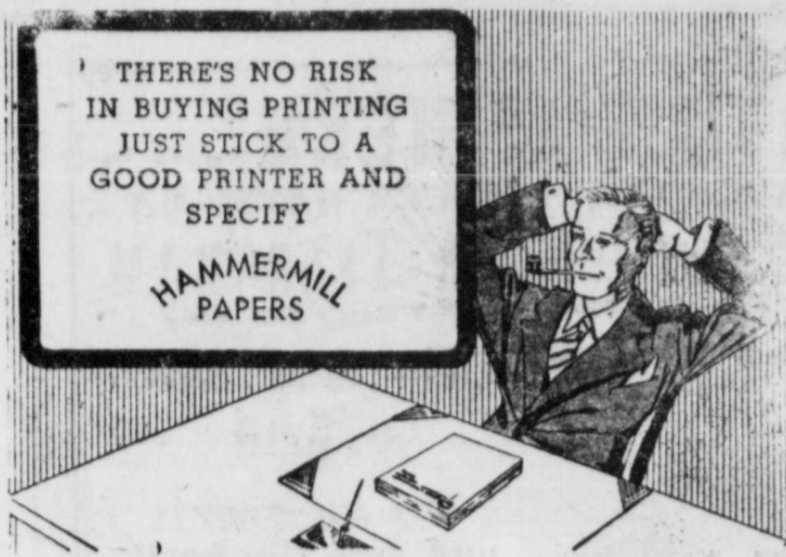

It's easy enough to be a professor
 on the subject of some far distant
 land like the moon.

A friend of mine once said "I like
 Henry Wallace because he's 20 years
 ahead of his time."

I replied that it's the easiest thing
 on earth to be 20 years ahead of
 one's time.

The hard thing is to get something
 practical and useful and beneficial
 TODAY.

Socialists are always talking about

next year or a "five year plan" or
 the moon or the millennium all
 very remote.

But we don't have to wait to see
 what Socialism will do to England.
 Even now England has made a flop
 of it.

The Socialist record of accomplish-
 ment in England is already an all
 around sorry story. Take coal. In
 1948, 26,000 more miners, helped by
 more modern equipment, produced
 9 million tons of coal less than that
 produced by miners in 1941, the last

year of investor owned mines in
 England. By raising prices, the Eng-
 lish coal industry made a small profit
 in 1948 but its loss since it became

socialized has been 90 million dollars.

The Electric power industry in
 England has been socialized for about
 a year and a half. It takes many
 more workers to operate it than it
 took when the industry was investor-

owned. Last winter the "planners"
 decided to increase income by hav-
 ing a higher rate in winter (when
 people want more electricity) than
 in summer. Yet industry under gov-
 ernment ownership is barely making
 profit.

John Bull isn't any too happy
 about being shot to the moon. Yet
 many fuzzy-wuzzies here want us to
 take a similar ride. What do you
 say we wait and see?

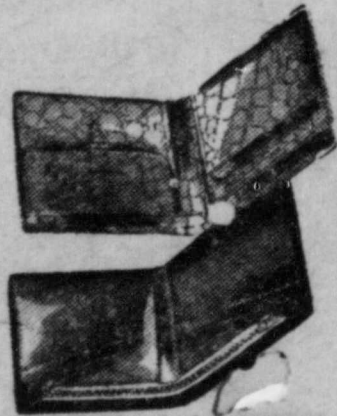

TONGUE AND PEAS Scalloped



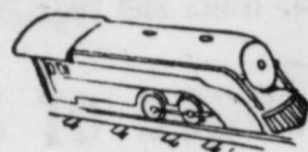
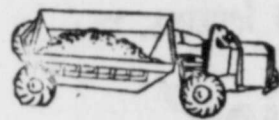

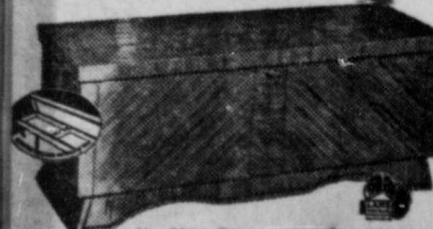
