Turkey Steak Demonstration

County Agent H. M. Breedlove announced this morning that a demonstration would be held on the twenty-fourth of January at the Veterans vocational building at Hedley on the making of turkey steaks. Five turkeys will be worked into steaks during the day. The exact time for the start of the demonstration will be given next week in this newspaper and everyone is invited to attend. Mr. F. Z. Beanblossom, poultry specialist for the Texas A&M College Extension service will give the actual working of turkeys into steaks.

Breedlove says that farmers in the Hedley community have requested the information as quite a few of them plan to market some of their turkeys in the form of prepared steaks. Mr. Beanblossom will have all necessary equipment with him and lecture on growing and feuing of turkeys in advance of the turkey steak demonstration. Turkey steaks are fast becoming a very important factor in the marketing of turkeys and give the local turkey producer a much higher price for his turkeys than selling them on foot.

Don't forget the date of the demonstration and the exact time of the beginning of the demonstration will be given next week after Mr. Beanblossom advises Breedlove on the hour of his arrival at Donley County. Everyone is invited who is growing turkeys now or interested in the growing of turkeys in the future.

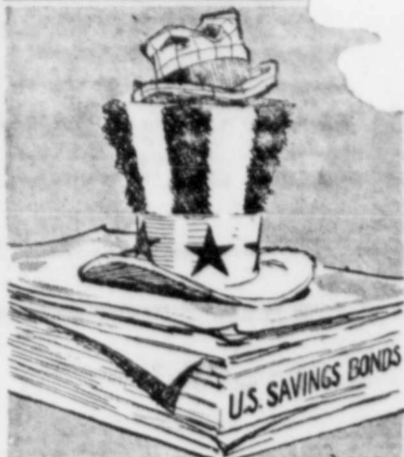

TESTED MEAT RECIPES

TONGUE AND PEAS Scalloped

Preparation: Fresh Tongue. Cover with cold water; add 1½ teaspoons salt to each quart of water; bring to a boil. Simmer slowly until tender. Allow 1 to 1½ hours. Keep tongue in the liquid until cool enough to handle, then remove outer skin.

2 cups cooked tongue
1 cup cooked peas
2 cups medium white sauce
Grated cheese

Slice tongue, then cut into small pieces. Combine with cooked peas and white sauce. Place in buttered casserole. Top with grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 30 minutes.

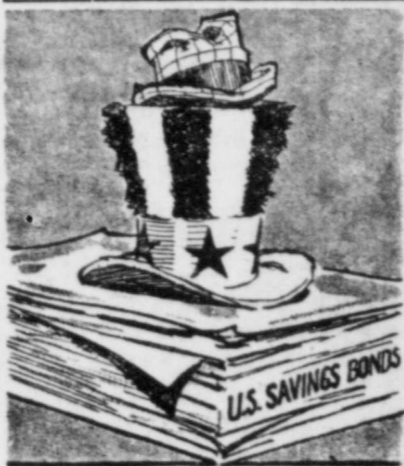

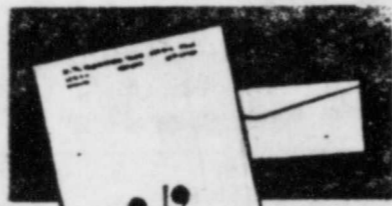
