Notice of Election

The State of Texas:
County of Donley:
City of Hedley:

To the resident, qualified electors of the City of Hedley, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

Take Notice that an election will be held in the City of Hedley, Texas, on the 30th day of October, 1950, on the propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the City Council on the 9th day of October, 1950, calling said election, which is as follows:

"Resolution

By the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$40,000.00 sewer revenue bonds and on the question of the issuance of \$17,000.00 sewer tax bonds.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas:

1. That an election be held in said City of Hedley, Texas, on the 30th day of October, 1950, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

Proposition No. 1

"Shall the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars, maturing in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing a Sewer System in and for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's Water and Sewer Systems."

Proposition No. 2

"Shall the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of Seventeen Thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity date being not more than Thirty (30) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five (5%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds for the purpose of constructing a Sewer System for said City as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election, to-wit:

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and only legally qualified elec-

Proposition No. 1

"For the issuance of Sewer Revenue Bonds"

Proposition No. 2

"For the Issuance of Sewer Tax Bonds"

"Against the issuance of Sewer Tax Bonds"

Concerning each of the above propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the others indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the day fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general laws governing general elections.
