Marvin Hickey Writes Close of School Of Olney Storm

Following is a portion of a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. D. L Hickey from their son Marvin of The Olney Enterprise.

May 20, 1951 Dear Mother and Dad,

I just want to let you know we came through the big blow all in good shape.

I guess you have heard about it Her husband, J. R. Boston, passed by radio and newspapers till you know more about it than we do. those first reports were pretty widely exagerated about the casand as of this morning there was 18 still hospitalized and all but two or three of them is out of danger. You would have to see the situation to realize how remarkable that figure is.

We, I mean our house, was right in the edge of its path. We got one broken window, lost one tree all the fences down and about three big truck loads of scrap lumber and debris in the yard and stacked against the house. That was the extent of our real estate damage. We lost our car which was the most dollars and cents loss we had. I was up at highschool in 80.00 Ladies Night Lions Club it and it came out with most of a five room house sitting on top of it while I was in the school building.

> I keep thinking how lucky we are to have a roof over our heads and how much better off we are to have a roof over our heads and how much better off we are than hundreds right close by. 


Sixth Grade Picnic
