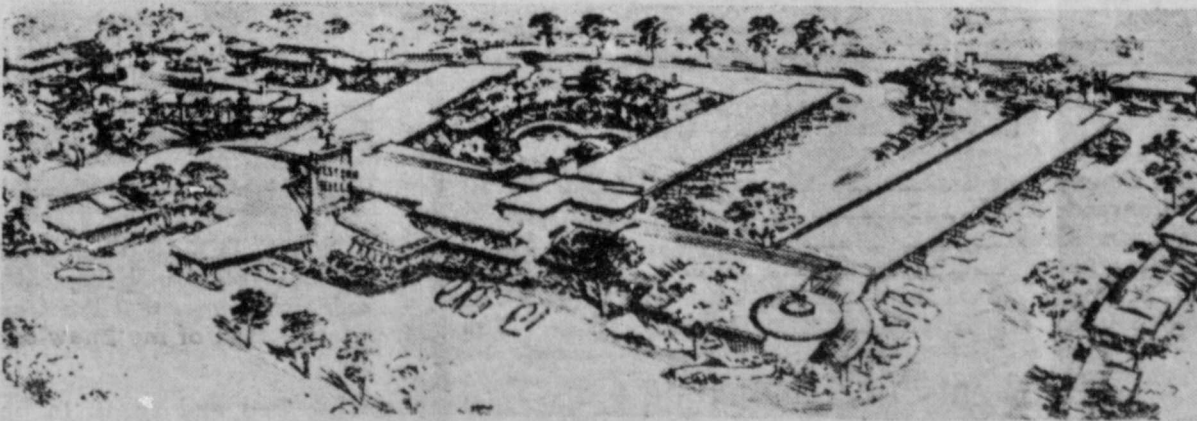

REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

By CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

Many people are wondering when the Congress will recess. From the present outlook it is difficult to see how we could recess prior to September and the chances are that it will not be before sometime in October.

There was some talk on the House Floor about a short recess the first week of July, since the 4th came on Wednesday. However the House stayed in continuous session all week, including the 4th of July.

The session on the Forth was devoted to a reading of the Declaration of Independence and paying tribute to those great patriots who were responsible for this great forward step in the freedom of man. Representative John Rankin of Mississippi suggested on the Floor that the Congress should re-adopt the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution and that the country should get back to the principles therein voiced.

One Washington columnist wrote at length about the statement. In doing so he made special mention about the "equality of man" and criticized Mr. Rankin insinuating that Mr. Rankin is a "white supremacy" advocate. The columnist's remarks brought to my mind a transaction that took place on the Floor the other day concerning an all-negro veteran's hospital.

The veterans' Affairs Committee of which Mr. Rankin is Chairman, had approved a bill creating an all-negro veterans' hospital at a cost of five million dollars to meet the needs of negro veterans that were not being adequately cared for. The hospital was to be staffed by negro doctors and negro nurses.

When this bill came to the floor it was openly attacked by the two negro congressmen on the grounds of racial segregation. These two negro congressmen were joined by a group of ultra-liberal Democrats, ultra-liberal Republicans and a majority of the old line Republicans from the North and East.

The bill was supported by a block of Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats. The coalition of old line Republicans from the North and East, the ultra-liberal Republicans, the ultra-liberal Democrats and the two negro congressmen was sufficient to defeat the bill.

It was openly admitted by all that there was a great need for the hospital and that the negro veterans were in sad circumstances unless adequate facilities could be supplied.

It was argued, however, by the coalition on both sides of the aisle that if the use of the hospital was to be limited to negro patients and negro doctors and nurses, it would be a segregated hospital and that they did not want it under those circumstances. The race issue flared openly on the Floor and was without doubt the sole reason that the bill was defeated.

I tell you people this so that you may have some idea of what could happen if the FEPC and the Civil Rights legislation should ever reach the Floor of the House.

Frankly, the Republicans would be afraid to vote against the FEPC and the civil rights legislation for political reasons, and don't let yourself think otherwise. If that type of legislation is to be stopped, it will be stopped by Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats.

DEFENSE DEPARTMENT: The fight for a complete cleansing of the State Department is continuing and is getting results, but it is not proceeding fast enough to suit me. Over a year ago I told the people that I thought Mr. Acheson should resign.

I have not changed that position nor my opinion. We hope that within the next several weeks Congress will have an opportunity to speed up this cleansing process when the bills on appropriations and other matters concerning the State Department are brought to the Floor.

DEFENSE PRODUCTION ACT
We have received much mail concerning controls and inflation. The big question is "What is the proper procedure to curtail inflation?" If economic controls are the answer, my position is that these should be on a temporary basis, should be fair and equitable to all, and should remain under the constant control and vigilance of Congress.

The controls themselves are not the great danger if they are handled in the above manner. The great danger in controls is the administration of the controls, and I am not willing to place the economy of this country in the hands of a few egotistical bureaucrats with the power to discriminate and to indulge in decisions based upon bias and prejudice.

We are at present in general debate on the Defense Production Act and will begin the discussion of amendments next week. It is my opinion that if a defense production act is passed it will retain in the Congress the powers that have heretofore been delegated to bureaucrats. Unless this is done, we would be better off without controls.

THE HOUSE: I had my first experience at changing a vote last

week. The vote was being taken on whether or not the House should consider a resolution concerning the continued payment of Government expenses between July 1st and July 31st. While the various appropriations bills are being debated and voted upon.

A move was started on the House Floor to cut out the funds necessary for General Dwight Eisenhower to continue to operate. Had such a move been successful, General Eisenhower's hands would have been tied and all of the work he has done so far would have been lost. I openly opposed such a move.

At the time the procedural matter was being voted upon I was called to the long-distance telephone and when I returned to the Floor it was my understanding that the move had been successful and that General Eisenhower had been tied hand and foot. Therefore when my name was called, I voted against the motion to consider the resolution.

Immediately thereafter I was approached by several of the Texas congressmen as well as several other Southern Democrats, and advised that such was not the case. I obtained a copy of the resolution and satisfied myself that such was not the case. I obtained a copy of the resolution and satisfied myself that such move had not been successful.

I then changed my vote from "nay" to "yea". This is the only vote that I have changed since I have been in Congress and had it not been for the long-distance telephone call, I would not have had the misunderstanding.

TAXES: The increase in Federal taxes was for defense purposes. Had this not been the case, the tax bill could not have passed. If this country is going to sustain a standing army and provide proper equipment, supplies and materials, it is going to cost money. I have a large number of letters in my office from men who are in the service.

They are complaining about the pay situation with which they are faced. Their allotments are not sufficient to take care of their wives and children and many of these boys are sending home the small amount that they are able to retain out of their pay. These boys do not get paid on an hourly basis and they don't get paid time and a half for overtime.

They are rendering a great service to mankind and humanity and it would be unfair and dishonest

Squandering Your Money
Anyone who has the slightest interest in honest, economical government should read an article by Charles Stevenson in the June 9 issue of the Saturday Evening Post, called "How Government Pressure Boys Squander Your Money." The point of it is well described by the Post's subtitle: "With expensive books, cocktail parties and thousands of paid press agents, government agencies beat the drum to glorify and perpetuate themselves. They try to teach you what to think—at your expense."

Mr. Stevenson's article deals with governmental publicity activities—paid for, of course, by all the taxpayers. Here is a small sample of what he has to say: "Budget Bureau statistics indicate that \$105,000,000 is spent annually from taxes to pay 3,400 Federal publicity employees and circulate their product. Much of this represents statistical reports, desirable promotion of good farming practices, information concerning social-security benefits, plus other services authorized by Congress. But much of it is also sheer propaganda of another order. In one week The New York Times received enough government news releases type, found 55,080 words of press-agency, 10,166 words to influence legislation, and 45,615 words to influence policy."

Mr. Stevenson names names. The Federal Security Administration has shot the works in promoting compulsory government health insurance. The Bureau of Reclamation has beaten the drums to the limit in trying to force socialization of the power industry and government power development, especially in the West, and government propaganda has entrenched the Army Engineers "as an all-powerful pork-barrel construction agency."

It is an amazing story—and a disheartening one. How much longer will the "government pressure boys" be permitted to squander the taxpayers' money in this manner?

"One of the most potentially destructive illusions harbored by millions of Americans nowadays is that their national economy renews itself automatically. They've (Continued from Page 2)

forgotten that private investment is what makes the system tick. You find this state of mind even in government where some men apparently believe that lack of private investment can be made up from the public Treasury."

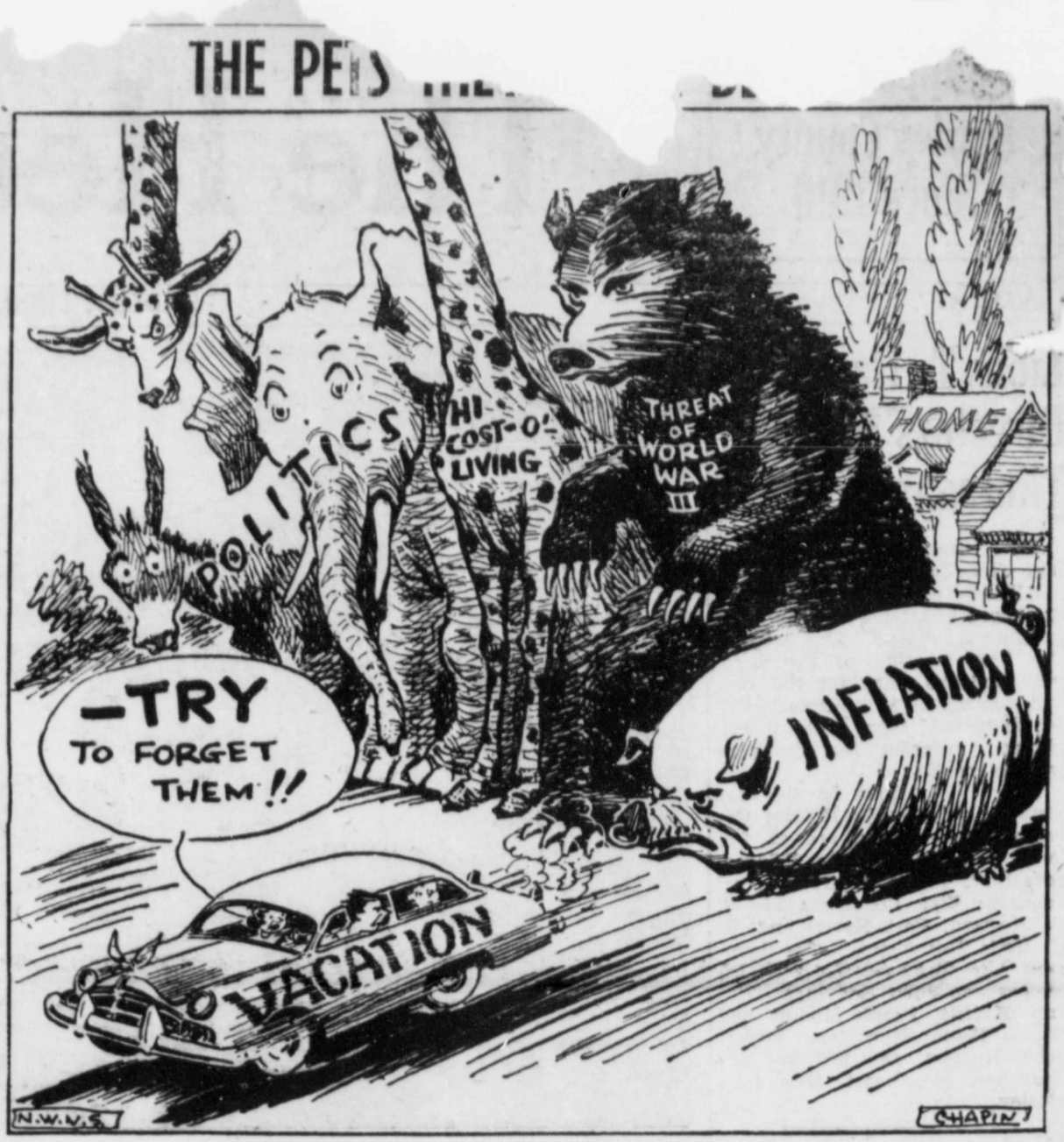

Cotton Insects Rob Farmerm

The boll weevil and other insects
 in 1950 robbed Texas cotton farm-
 ers of 948,712 bales of cot-
 tonseed, the National Cotton
 Council points out in commenting
 on the final 1950 crop report of
 the Bureau of Agriculture Econ-
 omics.
 The monetary value, the Coun-
 cil estimates these losses amount-
 ed to more than \$221,000,000 or
 an average of about \$1270 per
 Texas cotton farm.

Our national need for cotton is
 urgent, the Council reminds in
 calling on cotton farmers to do
 everything possible to meet the
 16-million-bale goal set for this
 season by the Department of Agri-
 culture. A 26.9 per cent reduc-
 tion from the full yield, such as
 occurred in the 1950-51 season due
 to insect damage, could seriously
 jeopardize this goal.

To realize the high yields neces-
 sary for maximum cotton produc-
 tion, farmers are urged to follow
 closely their state cotton insect
 control recommendations.

Farm Income More This Year Than 1950 Period

Texas farmers' cash revenue
 was 45 per cent greater the first
 five months this year than in the
 same 1950 period, the University
 of Texas Bureau of Business Re-
 search reports.

The Bureau estimates Texas
 farm cash income from major
 commodities through May -
 \$484,853,000, compared with
 \$334,184,000 during January-May
 last year.
 Cattle, the main farm-income
 producer for both periods, brought
 in \$165,046,000 42 per cent more
 than January-May, 1950. Only
 commodities bringing less money
 in the 1951 period were cotton,
 cottonseed, fruit, vegetables and
 wheat. Most income drops were
 caused by unfavorable weather.

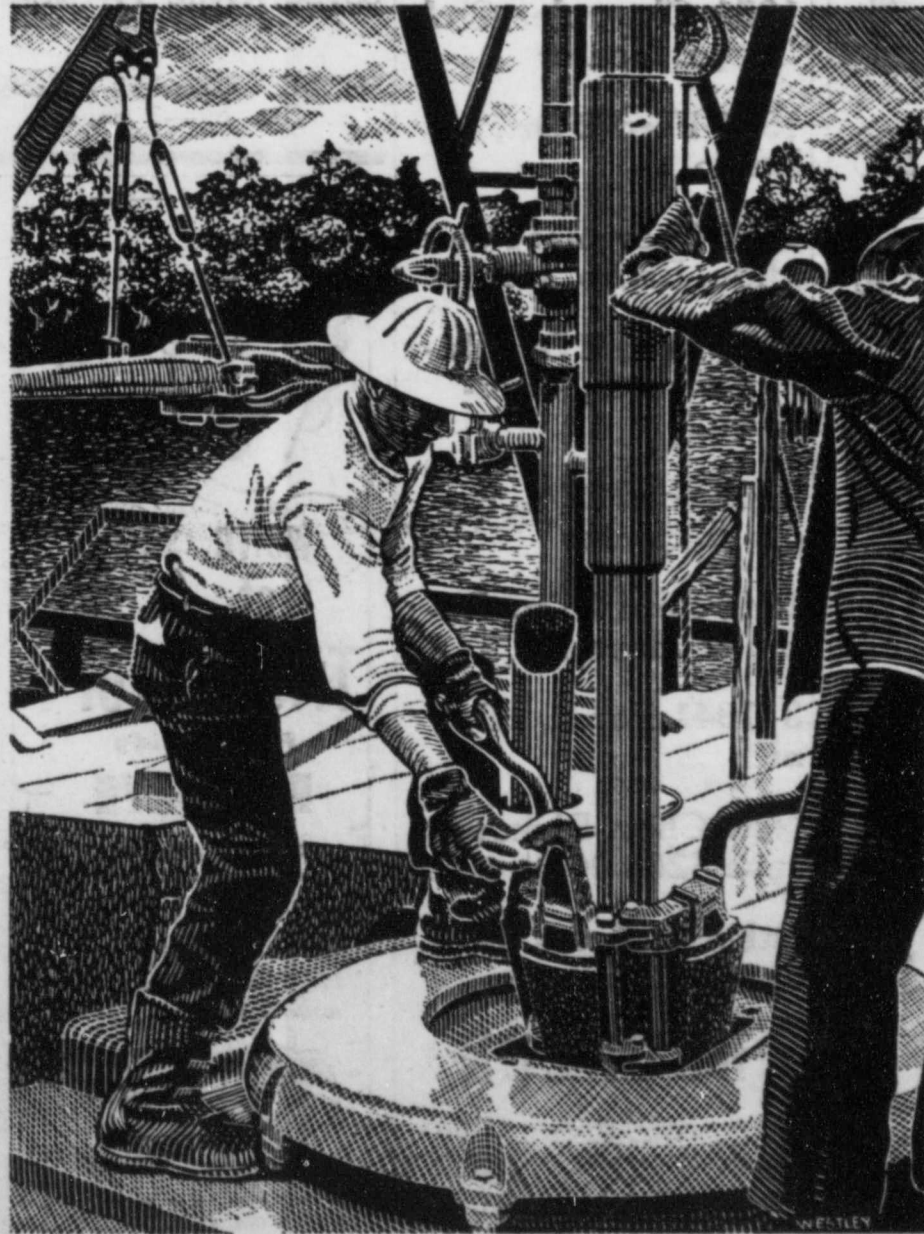

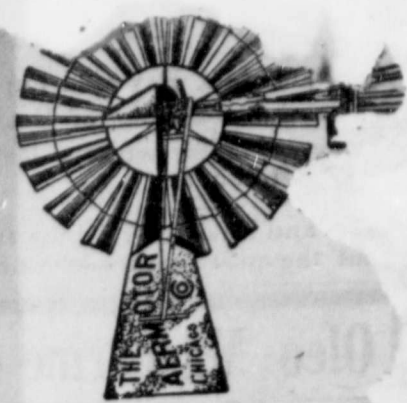
