





Money was scarce and there was no employment to be had except on the ranches and the railroad. Sweet potatoes, kerand cornbread were standard articles of diet. Wild game, which was very plentiful, helped to solve the pioneers' food problems. In 1907 the town was moved to the present site, and was named in honor of a Mr. Hedley, a resident of the town. The townsite was bought by R. H. Janes and W. E. Reeves, who was at that time president of the Rowe state Bank. Other business firms in Hedley at that time included




