





FOREIGN AID: The House is now considering the Mutual Security Act of 1951, or better named, The Foreign Aid Bill. The purposed program involves appropriation and expenditure of \$7,848,-750,000. The orginal request from the Executive branch of the Government was \$8,500.000,000.

This includes military assistance and economic assistance. You no doubt wonder how much of us as an individual has been called upon to pay for foreign aid. From July 1, 1940, through June 30, 1952, the amount is \$688.42 per person.




