

Congress, President Examine Influence on Foreign Policy

MANY NEWSPAPER and magazine articles have been written concerning the China lobby in this country, but according to those senators sponsoring a resolution for a full-scale congressional investigation into the ramifications of this global organization, with all its mystic, mysterious, oriental intrigue, the surface only has been scratched.

If the senate votes authority to the foreign relations committee for such a probe, it likely will take the form of a three-prong incursion into the devious machinations of a score of organizations: (1) those set up to foster the interests of the Red China or Communist regime; (2) those which have the backing of the Nationalist or Chiang Kai-shek clique in exile on Formosa, and (3) those organizations composed of Americans who have at one time or another sought to influence this country's foreign policy in the Far East.

If any of the many charges which have been made on the floor of the senate, in congressional committees and in the newspapers are true, then likely there will be red faces on both sides of the political fence and both within and without the government.

Despite this seemingly obvious fact, President Truman, through Secretary of State Dean Acheson, has given the "go" sign to such a probe and instructed all government agencies to cooperate fully with any congressional committee set up for such a purpose.

Secretary Acheson testifying before the Russell committee in the MacArthur ouster proceedings said: "... I am authorized and directed by the President to say to the joint committee that he has instructed the agencies of the executive branch having powers and duties in regard to this matter to get together all their material... so there can be an immediate appraisal of what is known in the executive branch... He has also authorized me and directed me to say that he will direct all these agencies of government to cooperate to the fullest extent with any committee or committees of the Congress which wish to go into this matter for the purpose of helping any investigation..."

Senators Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) and Brian McMahon (D-Conn.) are authors of the resolution calling for the probe, which is sufficiently broad in its provisions to include, not only an investigation of a China lobby but a lobby of any other foreign government seeking to influence the foreign policy of the United States. The resolution calls for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the job.

Money spent by these various groups runs into astronomical figures

and the charge has been made that money appropriated by this government for aid to the Chiang government in China has found its way into this country for the purpose of spreading propaganda to influence the spending of more American money in China.

The Two American groups, of which only one, the Committee to Defend America by Aiding Anti-Communist China, has filed with congress under the lobby law, and the American China Policy Association, headed by Alfred Kohlberg, New York importer of Chinese goods, will come under the spotlight of the proposed probe.

The first, the Committee to Defend America by Aiding Anti-Communist China, is headed by Frederick K. McKee, Pittsburgh industrialist and philanthropist, and has been active in foreign policy groups since before World War I. Included in the McKee groups, according to a survey by Congressional Quarterly, are David Dubinsky, president International Ladies Garment Workers; Matthew Woll, president AFL Free Trade Union Committee and Jay Lovestone, executive secretary of the AFL group. Other outstanding names which have been linked with the McKee organization are Gen. William J. Donovan (Wild Bill), former GOP New York gubernatorial candidate; Carroll Reese, former chairman GOP national committee; James A. Farley, former chairman Democratic national committee and Charles Edison, former New Jersey governor.

The organization headed by Kohlberg was recently in the public eye as the fountainhead of information used by Senator Joseph McCarthy in his smear campaign against Secretary of State Dean Acheson and others in the state department. Listed in the Kohlberg group are William Loeb, Manchester N.H., publisher, president of the organization; Max Eastman, author and roving editor of Readers Digest; Louis Waldman, one-time Socialist candidate for governor of New York; George Earle, former governor of Pennsylvania and former Representative Clare Booth Luce of Time, Life and Fortune publications. Both these organizations made substantial campaign contributions in the 1948 and 1950 campaigns to elect their friends, the most publicized, the Kohlberg contribution to Senator John Butler, who defeated Senator Millard Tydings of Maryland.

Ironically, the McKee committee contributed \$300 to the campaign of Senator Wayne Morse in Oregon, while Kohlberg in addition contributed \$1,000 to the fund of Senator Styles Bridges of New Hampshire. Chinese organizations active in this country will be discussed in a following article.

Make Application For Deep Plowing In Sept.

County and Community Committees along with several interested producers and contractors, met in the conference room at the County Agent's Office Friday, August 24th, to discuss the Deep Plowing Practice and to make plans for the 1952 program.

It was unanimously decided that the month of September would be set aside for taking applications for Deep Plowing. No approvals will be issued until the 1952 allotment of funds is received from the State Office; however, the committees want to be ready with the program when the money is available.

It was unanimously decided also that the Deep Plowing for 1952 will be applicable only to producers on farms where there has been no assistance earned on deep plowing in previous years. Remember these two important

facts: (1) To receive assistance on Deep Plowing of Sandy Cropland under the 1952 Program you must make application sometime during the month of September, (2) If you have had assistance on deep plowing before you need not apply for assistance under the 1952 program. This means plowing at any depth with PMA assistance.

U. S. D. A. READIES 1951 COTTONSEED PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM

Sometime ago the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced that it would support the price of cottonseed this year at \$65.50 per ton to farmers, basis grade 100.

At the same time, USDA said that it would buy cottonseed in areas where a purchase program might become necessary to keep prices at the support level. Purchases would be made at \$61.50 per ton, basis 100.

In addition to loans and purchases, USDA announced that it would buy cottonseed oil, meal and linters from crushers as another means of helping to keep cottonseed prices at the support level.

Under this part of the program USDA will make contracts with crushers, who in turn must pay ginners and farmers not less than \$65.00 per ton for cottonseed of a gin point. This will be on the basis of grade 100, with certified premiums and discounts for other grades.

To help work out details for the operation of this part of the cottonseed price support program, the Dallas commodity office of the Production and Marketing Administration is inviting members of the trade to serve on advisory committees.

There will be four committees—one each for crushers, crude and refined oil, proteins and linters.

New Seeder To Arrive This Week

The row seeder for planting cover crops in cotton middles will be delivered this week, according to information received from the State Board of Control which is the purchasing agent for the District.

This machine is the one described in a previous column and will plant three middles at a time with two rows ten inches apart in each middle. It has a height clearance of 38 inches and is equipped with fender guards to prevent damage to the growing plants. Rye, wheat hairy vetch, Austrian winter peas, and Alfalfa are some of the crops that can be seeded with this drill.

According to Carman Rhode, Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, a number of farmers have already expressed a desire to use this seeder for sowing cover crops in their cotton. Some of these are: Clyde Slavin, Ray Holland, Kermit Evans, John Richey, W. M. Snelson, and Pete Land. Other farmers wanting to try this drill should advise the Soil Conservation Service at once, Rhode said. A tight schedule will be worked out in an effort to get as many acres planted as possible in the limited time available. The rental rate has not been set by the District Supervisors yet, but it will likely be around 25 cents per acre.

The rye seed which the District purchased has been delivered and is for sale for \$2.85 per bushel

at one of the following stores: Clarendon Hatchery, Risley Feed Store, Thomas Feed Store, and Simpson Feed Store.

Though cotton is one of our best cash crops, it is also one of the hardest on the land. This is not because it uses an excessive amount of plant food, but because it leaves the land naked and unprotected against the forces of wind and water.

According to the best information available there is well over one-third of all cropland in Donley County in cotton this year. In some parts of the county this percentage will run much higher. Many farmers have nearly all their land in this crop.

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"SECTION 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for the Section 51f of Article III."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which ex-

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REPORT FROM WASHINGTON
 By CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS

FAITH OF FOUR FATHERS: Mrs. Rogers and I took the four oldest children to the Carter Barron Memorial Amphitheatre here in Washington, the other night to see the play "Faith of Our Fathers."

The amphitheatre is a beautiful open air theatre in Rock Creek Park that reminded me in many respects of the Red Rock Theatre near Denver, Colorado. Of course, it can't compare with the Red Rock Theatre from a natural standpoint.

However it is beautiful and the trees that form the back drop on the stage could never be matched by man-made objects for beauty.

THE KANSAS AND MISSOURI FLOODS: The Army prepared a motion picture of the devastation in the flooded areas of Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma, and named the picture "The Great Flood of 1951." I had the opportunity of viewing this picture the other evening, and the damage wrought is inconceivable.

It proves beyond doubt that there is no greater force than nature on a rampage. The destruction extended into every phase of American life in those communities—churches with four and five feet of stinking mud, homes swept away or so badly damaged that they had to be condemned for human habitation, brick buildings crushed like egg shells, steel railroad bridges crushed away as

ways ripped apart, great slabs of concrete and steel tossed about as a wind would blow playing cards section after section of farm lands covered in several feet of sand gravel and silt, complete orchards covered with mud and silt to the extent that only the tops of the once productive fruit trees appear on the surface as sage brush, cattle, hogs, and other livestock drowned by the hundreds.

People, thousands in number, were made homeless; great stocks of food were so damaged that they spoiled and rotted; sewer systems were clogged up and the danger of disease and epidemics was ever present. This devastation and the hardships occasioned by it will be felt for a long time in the economy of this nation.

Hunting Season On Doves Opens Noon September 1

Uncertainty shrouded hunting prospects as Texans prepared to open the northern zone mourning dove season at noon Sept. 1.

The Executive Secretary said the record breaking droughts was the principal factor in casting so much doubt about the general mourning dove situation.

"We are never certain about mourning doves especially early in the season," said the Executive Director. "The shooting generally is spotted during the first phase of the shooting."

"For one thing, doves may be abundant in one area for the first day or two and then more or less disappear in the flush areas only to re-appear elsewhere where the

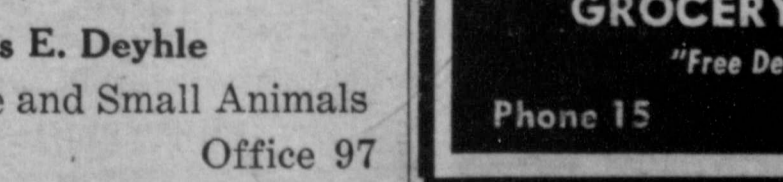

Better Use of Space
 THE problem of making better use of large spaces in kitchen cabinets is a common one. One way to solve it is to add some dividers. The ones illustrated are easily installed and inexpensive.

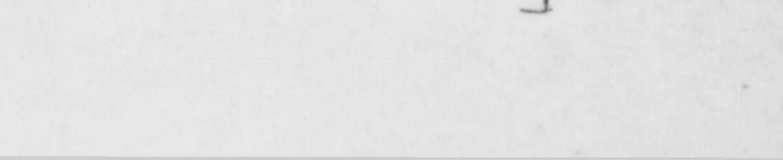
If the shelves are removable, take them out and cut saw grooves into which panels of Masonite 1/4-inch tempered hardboard may be slid. A common alternative is to install commercially available metal moldings to serve as slides for the hardboard dividers.

Note that circular segments are cut from the front edges of the dividers to provide easy access to each space. Homemakers will find the spaces useful for storing extra-size platters, cookbooks, large shallow pans and other odd-size pieces of kitchen equipment.

The exchanges amount to a gigantic auction which deals in securities just as other kinds of auctions deal in furniture, work of art, livestock or farm equipment. And the exchanges provide a two way auction market. Buyers compete against each other in bidding to buy; sellers compete in offers to sell, and going prices are known at all times.

The New York Stock Exchange, which is the nation's largest, is the market place for the shares of some 1200 American corporations. And when buyers and sellers deal in these it is not on a "pig in a poke" basis. Before the exchange accepts any security for listing, rigid and exact qualifications must be met. One is that there must be a sufficient number of shareholders to indicate wide interest in the security. Another is that pertinent information concerning the company, without which the investor could not judge the value of the stock, must be made available to the public.

No, there's nothing mysterious about the security exchanges, nothing that is known only to "insiders." At present, the exchanges serve some 15,000,000 individual owners of stocks—and these "capitalists," most of whom have average incomes and ordinary occupations, are a cross section of the American people.

 "The two chief sources of (Federal) revenue are now personal income and corporation taxes. Can they be hiked sharply without serious economic consequences? The business leaders doubt it. They point out that income tax rates, especially in the middle and upper brackets, are approaching the saturation point. The Treasury itself has estimated that a 100 per cent tax on all incomes above \$25,000—in other words, complete confiscation—would yield only \$700,000,000 more in revenue. A 100 per cent bite on all earnings above \$6,000—an obvious impracticability—would bring in \$6,400,000,000."

So wheat growers should not take this chance when they can be absolutely sure of not having bunt for only 1¢ to 5¢ per acre. This insurance may be had by treating the seed with a good disinfectant just as it leaves the cleaner or 24 hours or more before planting. Your County Agent can direct you to a cleaning and treating machine, or tell you how to do it yourself.

A six-point "priority" list of 1951-52 goals was adopted by Texas educators at a recent state planning conference at the University of Texas.

The list of "firsts" includes: A state-wide campaign for improvement in the teaching of reading.

Thorough reorganization of school accreditation procedures and policies to improve standards.

Enactment of a teacher certification code that will insure good teachers for the State's schools.

Focusing attention of the public on "inadequacies that are showing up in salary schedules for college and public school personnel due to increased costs of living."

Recodification of the state's school laws.

A long term improvement program for elementary education.

Local school board members helped to frame the state's education goals for next year. Willie Kocurek of Austin, president of

the Texas Association of School Boards, told the group that Texas' new "grass-roots" education program places more responsibility upon local school boards.

The Texas Association of School Boards recently added \$1,000 to funds granted the University of Texas for research and dissemination of information concerning duties and practices of Texas school boards. — Texas University News Service.

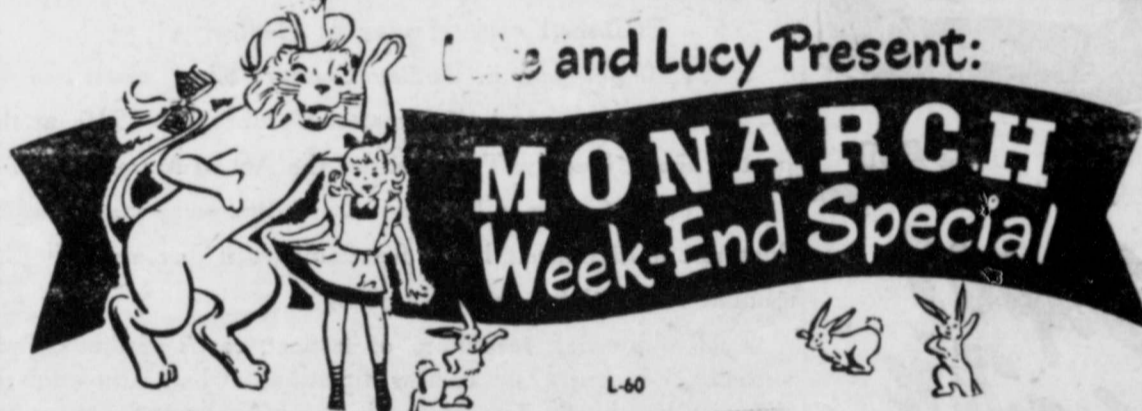
