NFLA Meeting

On hundred forty two members and guests gathered in the Clarendon Lions Club Building Wednesday evening, September 12 for the Donley County National Farm Loan Association's annual stockholders' meeting.

Aiva T. Simmons, president, was in charge of the meeting which was opened with an invocation by Rev. John A. English, followed by a welcome address by Director John R. Guilham. An interesting report on the year's operations by the directors was given by Mr. Simmons.

Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary-Treasurer, reported on the financial condition and the loan activity. Especial attention was given to the uses being made of the member-owned credit facilities. He stated that whereas formerly a Federal Land Bank loan was usually for the purchase of land, a good portion of loans last year were for improvements such as remodeling and building of houses, barns, fences and for other agricultural purposes.

Speaker of the evening was Dr. C. J. Whitfield, who is head of the Amarillo Experiment Station, and an eminent authority on Soil Conservation. His remarks were timely and much enjoyed by all present.

Musical entertainment was furnished by Miss Moss, Mrs. Bevers and Miss Patricia Usrey of Hedley. A number of encores proved the audience appreciation of their performance. Especially enjoyed was Miss Usrey's rendition of a novelty arrangement of Shorten's "Bread."

After the meeting adjourned, refreshments were served and much visiting was done by friends and neighbors. Plans are already under way for next year's meeting.

COTTON AND WHEAT ACREAGES

If you have not reported your cotton and wheat acreage please come by the office when you are in town and do so. We want to keep your farm record sheets up to date.

1952 DEEP PLOWING

Have you forgotten to make application for deep plowing under the 1952 program? Remember that September is the only month that you can make application and if there has been deep plowing on your farm in the past you are not eligible for assistance under the 1952 program in Donley County.

WHEAT LOANS

There have been four wheat loans made in this county. They were for E. L. Littlefield, Ernest Lamb, R. A. Lehman and G. A. Myers for 3047.66 bushels.

WINTER LEGUMES AND RYE

If you want to seed Austrian Winter Peas or Hairy Vetch as a cover crop come by the office and get an approval. The assistance is \$0.05 per pound for Austrian Winter Peas and \$0.12 per pound for Hairy Vetch.

When applying superphosphate to these cover crops of winter legumes, 200 pounds to the acre must be applied.

The Rye must be seeded at 60 pounds to the acre when seeded with a regular drill and the assistance is \$2.00 per acre, or Rye can be seeded between rows of cotton and grain sorghum with the row seeder that Soil Conservation Service has with the assistance of \$1 per acre. This way only 30 pounds to the acre has to be seeded.

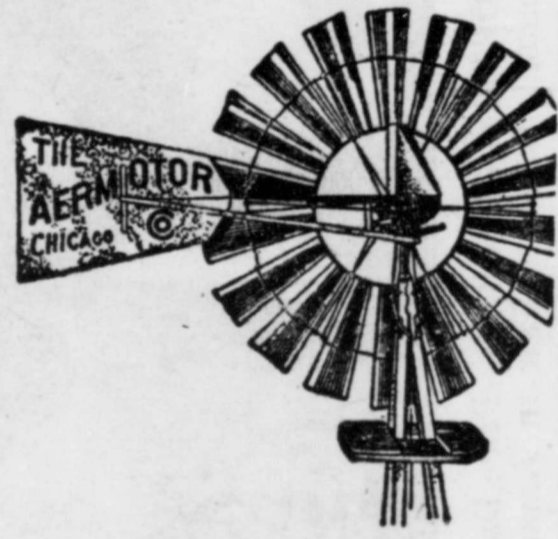

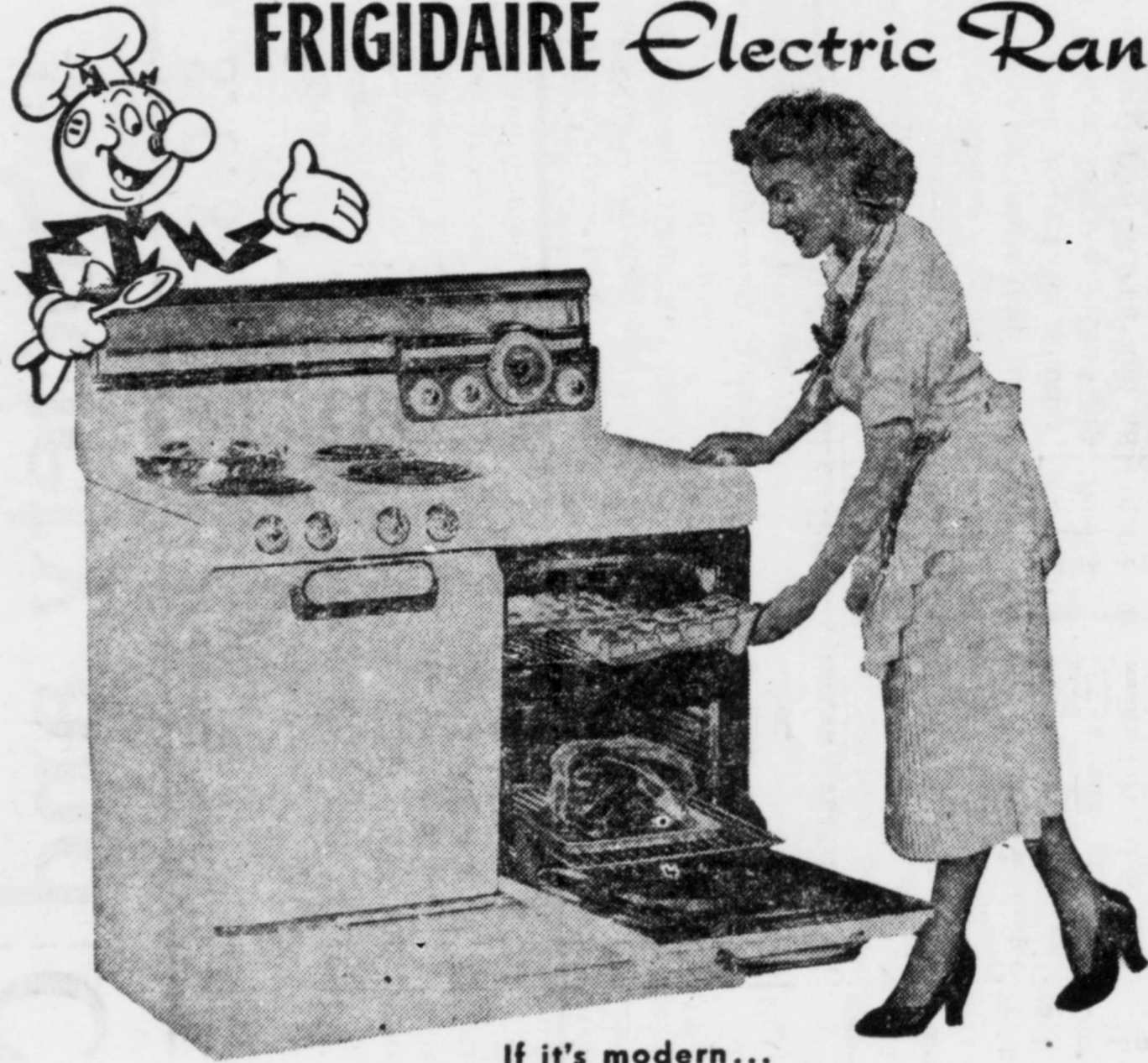

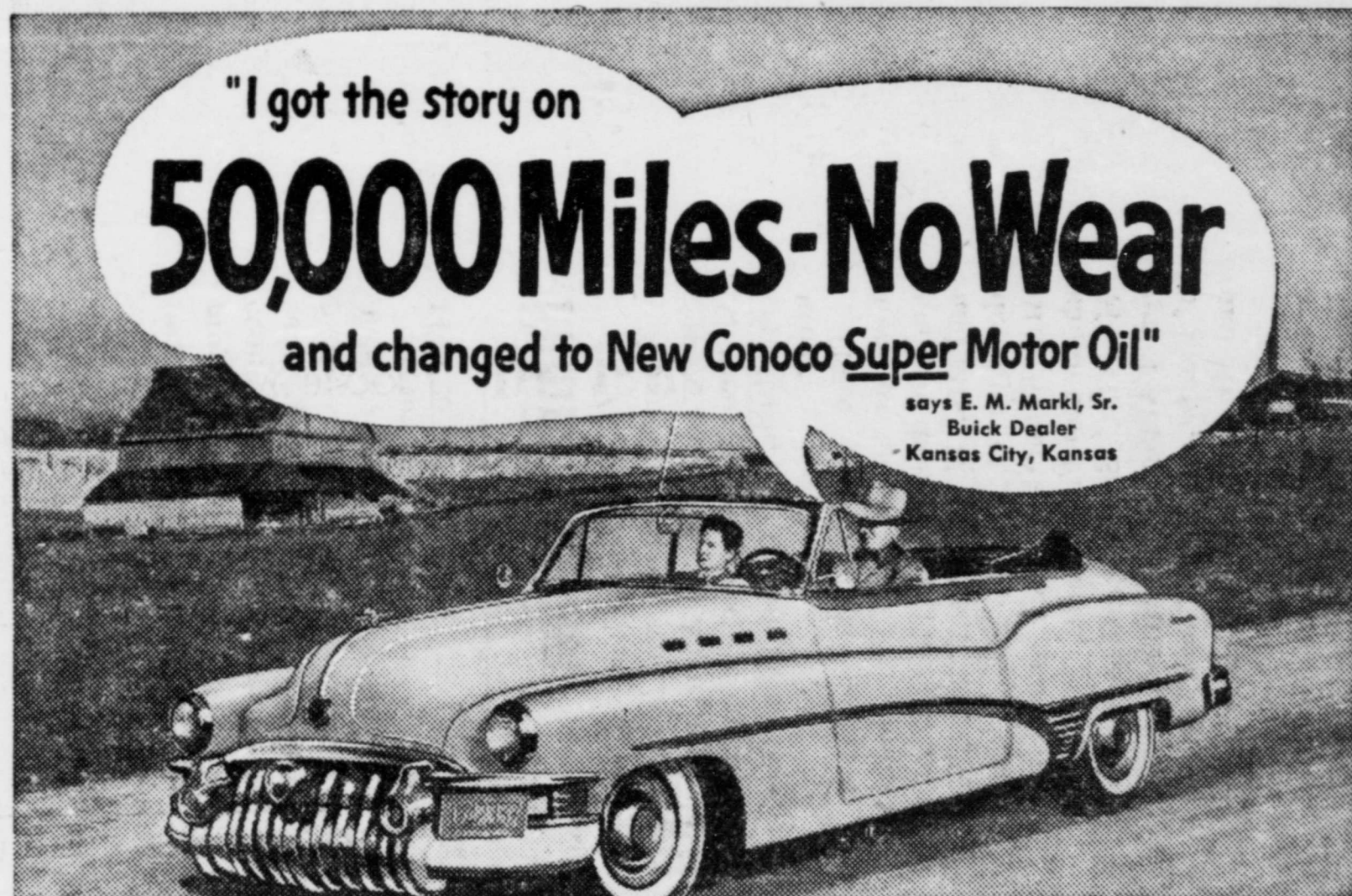

The row seeder the District purchased recently is becoming quite popular with many farmers who have used it or seen it operate. This is the implement designed for planting cover crops in the middles of cotton or sorghums without damaging the growing crops.

Some of the farmers having used this seeder are L. E. Blankenship, Ted Maddox, Oscar Moore, Kerm t Evans, Joe Kennedy, and Edwin Eanes. These men are all highly enthusiastic about this drill as well as the virtues of this practice of seeding cotton and feed land to winter cover crops.

With our large acreage in cotton this year we are almost certain to have severe blowing on this land next spring unless precautionary measures are taken. Chiselling on the heavier soils and deep plowing of the sandier soils have proved effective in most cases; however, a good turf of a growing cover crop on the land offers the best protection of all.

In addition to the row seeder, the District has the following equipment for rent to farmers: eight grass drills (also suitable for seeding alfalfa), two combination fertilizer-grain drills, one brush beater, one tractor and sprayer, and one sweep plow. Anyone wishing to use any of this equipment should contact the SCS office.

DON'T let disease reduce your wheat yields

Here is a study in contrasts for every wheat grower. The sickly head of wheat at the left of this picture has been the victim of covered smut. The two larger heads, from practically the same stand, show what the "runt" could have been, if it had not fallen victim to smut.

The smut-infested and healthy wheat grew in adjoining fields, under the same conditions of soil, water and sunshine. The two healthy heads, however, were grown from seed that was treated against smut before it was sown. The grower had his seed wheat treated with a fungus-killing dust that killed the

smut spores and prevented them from infecting the growing wheat plants. The "runt" head did not have the benefit of treatment.

Fortunately, not all wheat is blighted by smut. Losses from this fungus disease are high enough, however, to more than justify fungicidal dusting of all seed wheat. Its small cost of one to five cents per acre is very cheap insurance against crop disappointments that can take many dollars out of the wheat grower's pocket.

Talk with your County Agent. He can direct you to a nearby seed cleaning and treating machine.

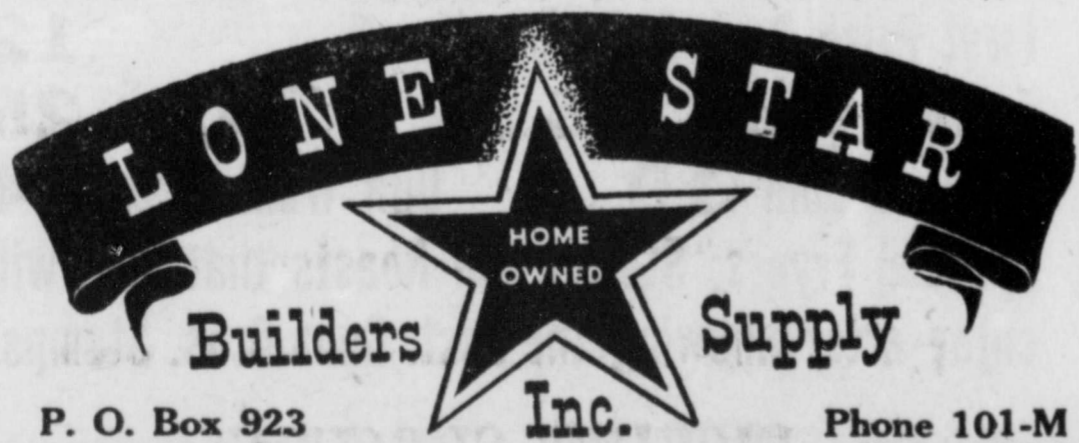
