Announce Examination For Rural Carrier

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Hedley, the examination to be held at Clarendon.

The examination will be open only to citizens or persons who owe allegiance to, the United States who are actually residing in the territory served by the post office where the vacancy exists, who have been actually residing there for one year next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form AN-1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles.

Form AN-1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the local post office or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington 25, D. C., prior to the close of business on December 13, 1951. The date of

On a standard daily route of 30 miles, the salary of a rural carrier is \$158, with \$20.00 per year additional for each mile or major fraction in excess thereof. Rural carriers whose services are satisfactory receive regular promotions.

All rural carriers must furnish and maintain, at their own expense, sufficient vehicle equipment for the prompt handling of the mails. They are allowed an equipment maintenance of 9¢ per mile on the basis of the daily mileage scheduled (this amounts to \$823.50 per year for a 30 mile route).

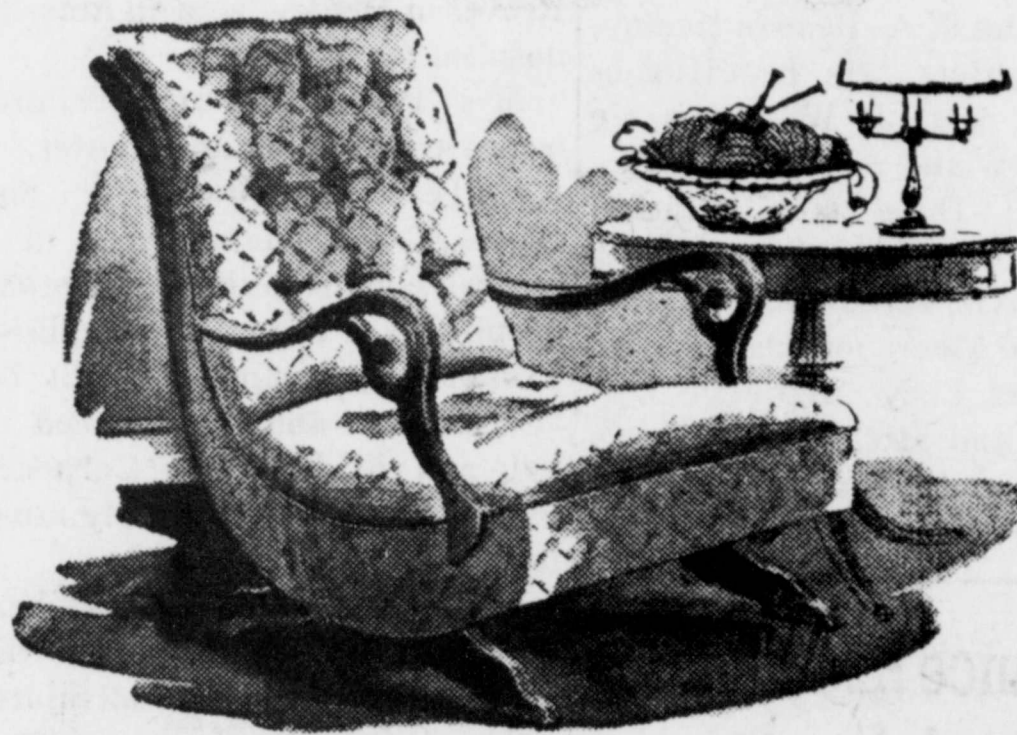

Creamed Turkey on Festive Rice

Goodness to the last bite! Rice with plump green peas and pimientos mixed with butter and molded into a beautiful mound — that spells beauty and eating satisfaction.

But in addition, Creamed Turkey on Festive Rice could be called a "mix and serve dish" so simple is the preparation. The creamed turkey topping can be made ahead of time and heated at the last minute when the meal is ready to serve. A minute to arrange on the platter and a dish with beauty and goodness is ready to serve.

**INGREDIENTS FOR
CREAMED TURKEY**

- 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- ½ cup milk
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups cooked turkey, diced

**INGREDIENTS FOR
FESTIVE RICE**

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 4 cups cooked rice
- 1 cup cooked green peas
- 3 tablespoons diced pimiento

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: Put 1 cup of white rice, 1 teaspoon salt and 2 cups of cold water in a two quart saucepan. Cover with a tight fitting lid. Bring to a vigorous

boil. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and steam for 14 minutes or until all the water is absorbed, leaving the separate rice grains with their full nutritional value. This makes very firm rice grains. (If you prefer more tender rice grains, add ½ cup more water and increase the slow cooking time 4 or 5 minutes.) Remove the lid, permit the rice to steam dry to the desired consistency and the grains will be separate and fluffy. Never stir rice; lift gently with a fork. Keep left over rice in a covered bowl in the refrigerator. Makes 3 generous cups fluffy rice.

METHOD: Empty the can of soup into a saucepan. Add the milk. Beat in the egg yolk, add the turkey and heat, stirring constantly. Serve over a mound of the Festive Rice mixture. Or — for an extra touch, mold the Festive Rice in a ring mold and fill the center with the creamed turkey.

TO MAKE A RING: Melt the butter in a saucepan. Add the rice, green peas, and pimiento. Mix gently. Press the hot rice mixture into a greased ring mold. Unmold immediately, by gently shaking and tapping the mold to loosen the rice ring. Fill the ring with the creamed turkey. A rice ring can't fail since the rice is molded and unmolded while still hot and any breaks are quickly repaired. Makes seven servings.
