"Operation Democracy Day" Is Proclaimed

Friday, December 7, will be "Operation Democracy Day" in Hedley.

Mayor Henry Moore issued a proclamation today calling on all citizens to take part in the third annual state-wide observance sponsored by the American Legion as a part of its campaign to wipe out the neglect and complacency which keeps many citizens from exercising their voting privileges and taking an active part in government affairs.

Governor Allan Shivers had previously joined the American Legion in appealing to the people of Texas to celebrate the tenth anniversary date of the attack on Pearl Harbor Day by holding constructive programs dedicated to making ourselves better citizens, Mayor Moore said.

"I congratulate the Legion upon its leadership in an active campaign to arouse citizens to the danger of failing to exercise our voting privileges," he said.

In proclaiming December 7 as "Operation Democracy Day," Mayor Moore cited the success of the 1949 and 1950 state-wide Legion programs designed to show citizens the danger of neglecting civic responsibilities.

"I urge our citizens, our churches, our schools and civic organizations to join our American Legion Post in pledging ourselves to help halt communist aggression by being good citizens at home," the Mayor said in his proclamation. "Good citizens who vote in all elections and take part in community affairs --are the bulwark of our Democracy."
