City Ordinance

An Ordinance requiring all persons owning or occupying premises, within the corporate limits of the city of Hedley, Texas, and within 150 feet of any public sewer, to make permanent sanitary connections with same, and controlling the disposal of waste water; declaring certain privies or box closets, within 150 feet of any public sewer, a nuisance, and regulating those privies or box closets that are not within 150 feet of such public sewer, and defining penalty therefor.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEDLEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: All owners or occupants of premises in the City of Hedley, Texas, having privies or box closets on such premises, must, if within 150 feet of any public sewer, make permanent sanitary connections with said public sewer and shall not dispose of any waste water except into such sewer. Where no sewer exists and privies or box closets are used they are required to have and keep under such privy or box closet a barrel, box or other water-tight receptacle over ground, in which, lime, ashes, pulverized dust, or some one of the approved disinfectant solutions shall be used in such manner as not to create a nuisance; said box or other receptacle shall be emptied when full, or at any time when its condition shall become unsanitary; no pit or cesspool shall be allowed to form, and such box closet shall have hinged lids of wood or a wire gauze door, so contrived and constructed as to prevent the ingress or egress of flies or other disease-breeding insects.

SECTION 2: Any owner or occupant of any premises, or any person violating any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of perpetrating a nuisance and as such shall be subject to be abated in the manner provided in law.

SECTION 3: Any owner or occupant of any premises or any person violating any of the provisions hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$200.00.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the 4th day of May, A. D. 1952

Carl Dickson Dies

Funeral services for Carl Edward Dickson of Amarillo, who passed away Saturday morning in the Veterans Hospital there, were held Monday from Boxwell Bros. chapel by Chaplain Morris Lively. Burial was in Rowe cemetery here.

He was born at Hedley Feb. 8, 1907. He was a veteran of World War II and a member of the Baptist Church here. He was a painting contractor and had lived in Amarillo for the past 26 years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nancy Dickson, his father, W. T. Dickson of Hedley, and three brothers, Earl of Arnett, Okla., Burl of Conway and Murl.

A banquet was held Tuesday in the Lions Den for the boys and girls basketball teams. The mothers of the team were the sponsors.

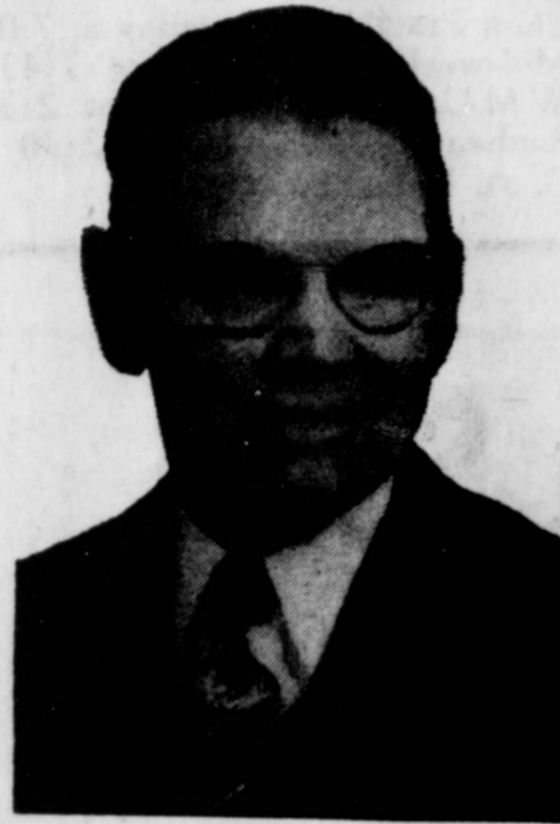
Speeches of appreciation were given by Mr. Davis, Mr. Baker and Mr. Smith.
