Hedley Explorers Capture Kiowah

Sixteen members of Hedley Explorer Scout Post 36 along with 3 "adopted" explorers from Wellington, were the first to arrive and the last to leave the official Boy Scout Camp Kiowah this past week end. The Hedley group and their guests rolled into camp at 6 p. m. Friday night and immediately raised the post flag on the main flagpole thereby officially taking control.

Some 85 explorers all told worked tents, camp sites, swimming facilities and gear to prepare the camp for the Boy Scouts use this summer. While Hedley had the largest single unit, posts from Borger, Phillips, Oklahoma and Pampa were on hand too.

Scout executive Paul Bisenherz from Pampa complimented the Hedley group on their performance of duty and behavior at camp and as a result they were granted permission to take over the big lodge hall for Saturday afternoon and evening. Scout Field Man John Pound was in charge of the work details.

Hedley Post Committee Chairman Ross Springer and Committeeman Henry Moore along with Post Advisor Bob Harris supervised the boys for the 3 day trek. The boys also wished to thank Alva Simmons for the use of his pickup, and to Mrs. Moreman for helping to plan their menus and to all who added help prior to the trip.

Highlight of the adventure was when Committeeman Henry Moore treed a mama coon and sent Crew Leader Donald Gene Painter up after her. In the ensuing afiray, Mamma escaped the 20 howling boys below, but Messrs. Painter, Springer, Moore and Harris adopted four baby coons found in the tree. Appropriately named, Eeny, Meany, Miney, and Mo, the tiny coons were brought back to Hedley by the boys.

Canoeing, swimming, fishing and hiking along with rifle target practice made up the spare time activities of the boys.

Red Mountain to Play Hedley

Paramount Pictures Inc. announced this week the engagement of the Hedley Theatre next Tuesday and Wednesday for their biggest technicolor spectacle of the year, "Red Mountain," starring Alan Ladd, Lizabeth Scott, Arthur Kennedy and John Ireland. The action packed plot centers around world famous Captain Quantrell during the Civil War and brings in troubles with Indians, love matters and politics. The picture was filmed on location 11 miles from Gallup, N. Mex. Nine miles of modern highway had to be built into the hills to enable cameras, actors and props to be moved in. In some scenes, filming was done from hovering helicopters. One of the scenes called for Ladd to fire shots into the air to stampede a herd of horses. The idea was ok. but the horses weren't. All movie-land stock, they were used to blank cartridge fire and stood serenely by. Ladd fired round after round, but directors finally had to set off a charge of black powder just out of camera range. The horses being inexperienced with this more powerful blast, moved fast, and the picture rolled merrily on. It will play a two day only run at the Hedley, moving immediately to first run showings in Dallas and Houston

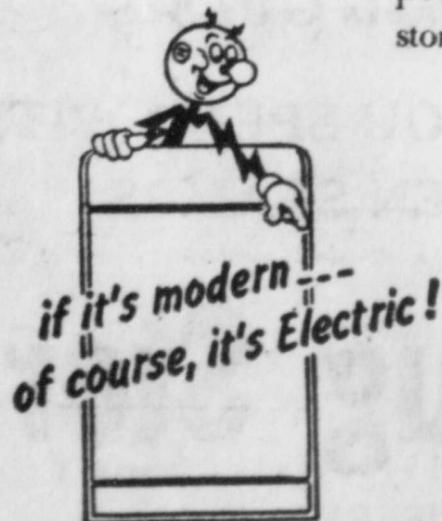

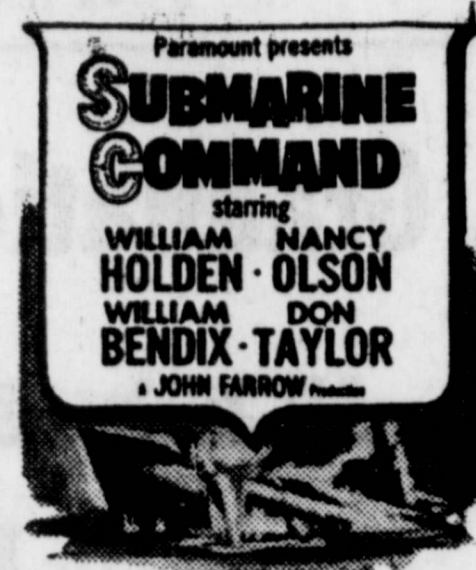

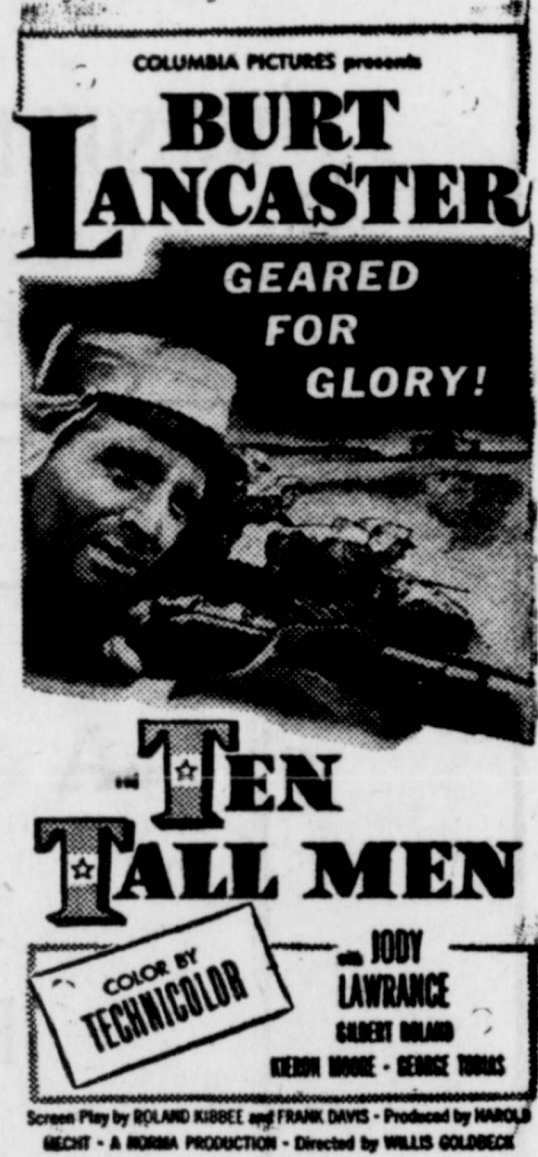
