Transfers Due by 31st

An amended policy on transfer of pupils has been adopted effective for the 1952-53 school year. The information concerning this policy is transmitted to you at this time in order that you may be familiar with the regulations as amended before transfers are considered by county boards during the month of August.

The policy provides the following types of transfers:

1. The transfer of pupils made on the basis of parental request filed before August 1 shall, with the approval of the Commissioner, qualify the child for Foundation Program benefits.

2. A scholastic residing in the district but whose name does not appear on the census roll may be transferred on the basis of parental request to the county board at any time prior to September 1. Confirmation by the Commissioner of the county board's action then qualifies this child for inclusion in average daily attendance totals and for transportation program payments.

3. Any resident scholastic of a district whose grade is not taught within the district may be transferred at any time during the current school year by the county school board, subject to approval by the Commissioner.

4. Under unusual circumstances involving hardship or unnecessary extension of bus routes, a scholastic may be transferred for Foundation Program benefits even though the grade is taught in the home district. Such transfer shall be approved for Foundation Program benefits only upon the receipt of a statement of approval from both the sending and receiving districts' local boards of education, and approval by the county board and the Commissioner of Education."

This policy was based upon a study of the legal provisions for making transfer and was established to provide a solution to situations involving children who were unduly penalized if some method of legalizing their attendance and qualifying them for transportation was not provided.
