In the heavy steer class, Troy Harrison took 2nd, Johnny Nash 3rd, Jack Moreman 4th, and Jack Quisenberry 6th. In the light-weight class Jack Moreman took 2nd, Johnny Nash 4th and Johnny Brumley 6th.

In the swine show Richard Stotts won 1st for Heavy Hampshires and 5th and 7th for Light Hampshires, Don Springer won 4th for Light Berkshires, and Richard Stotts won a prize as best showman.

Don Reeves showed the grand champion in the mutton class of the sheep show, taking 1st and 2nd. In the fine wool class Marvin Mullins won 1st and 6th, Don Reeves 2nd, Dale Morris 4th and David Morris 7th.

Fire Boys Entertained Mrs. Brown Honored

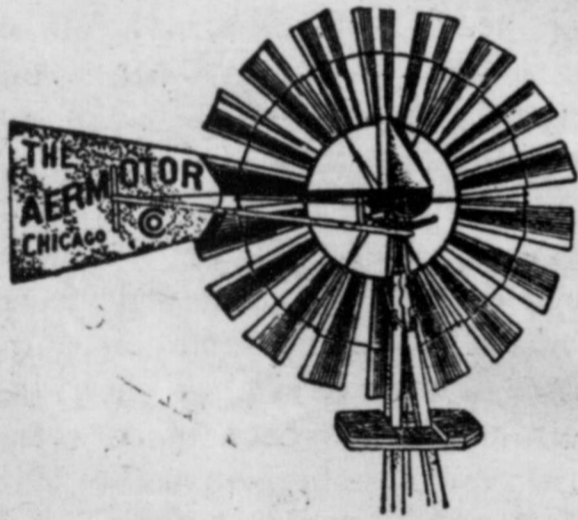
The Hedley fire boys enjoyed a fine feed Monday night given at the Hedley Cafe by W. E. Grimsley in appreciation of their run to his place recently.

Notice is hereby given, to whom concerned, that Edwin Eanes, the postoffice address of whom is Clarendon, Texas, on the 21st day of January 1953, filed his application in the office of the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in which he applies for a permit to appropriate of the unappropriated waters of the State of Texas, from Lake Creek, a tributary of the Salt Fork of the Red River, in Donley County, Texas, not to exceed 250 acre-feet of water per annum, for the irrigation of not to exceed 238.2 acres of land out of Sec. 106, Blk. E, D & P Ry. Company, Donley County, Texas, which land is more fully described in said application; the water to be diverted by means of a pumping plant. The proposed pumping plant is located at a point which bears East 390 feet and North 40 feet from the Southeast corner of Section 106, Block E, D & P Ry. Company, on the West bank of Lake Creek, in Donley County, Texas, and is distant in an easterly direction from Clarendon, Texas, about twelve (12) miles.
