Seventy farmers attended the cotton meeting held at the court house in Clarendon last Wednesday night, April 29. H. M. Breedlove, county agent in charge of the meeting, gave a report on the grasshopper situation in county and said that all farmers should keep a look out for outbreaks and poison as soon as they appear in hatching ed of Marvin Mullins, Kenneth area. Fred Elliott, cotton work Painter and Red Leeper. specialist, gave a talk on reduction of cotton acreage this year by farmers in order to head off controls in 1954. The secretary of agriculture is asking that all cotton farmers exactly how they placed. 
