Band Drive

A community project is being launched this week to raise funds to help secure a band instructor for the Hedley schools. Due to the scarcity of such teachers and to the salaries which they can command in most towns, it is necessary to offer a bonus, above the minimum salary paid by the school, for Hedley to have this service.

The school and community have a large investment in the uniforms and instruments, which are paid for, and this equipment needs to be in use.

The committee in charge of this drive is headed by Alva Simmons, and probably every citizen will be called on by some member. Remember how proud we have been of our Hedley Band, and let's give them a fresh start.

Cotton Meeting

Seventy farmers attended the cotton meeting held at the court house in Clarendon last Wednesday night, April 29. H. M. Breedlove, county agent in charge of the meeting, gave a report on the grasshopper situation in county and said that all farmers should keep a look out for outbreaks and poison as soon as they appear in hatching area. Fred Elliott, cotton work specialist, gave a talk on reduction of cotton acreage this year by farmers in order to head off controls in 1954. The secretary of agriculture is asking that all cotton farmers cut their acreage about 18% and possibly this could eliminate controls next year. He also showed slides on mechanized harvesting of cotton, cultivation, and seed treatment.

Neal Randolph, entomologist, gave a talk and showed slides on cotton insects and their control. Different types of poisons were discussed and the farmers were asked to look over their cotton crops each week for signs of insects. When insects appear in the cotton, farmers are asked to contact the county agent at once. Cotton insect poisons will be on hand in the county. Anyone wishing additional information on the above subjects should contact the county agent.

Hurshell Ellis Services Held

Funeral services for Hurshell James Ellis, former Hedleyan killed Jan. 31 in a plane crash on Okinawa, were conducted Monday from the First Baptist Church at Memphis by Rev. Fern Miller and Rev. Lloyd Hamilton. Burial was in the Memphis cemetery with Murphy-Spicer Funeral Home in charge.

Pallbearers were members of the Hedley American Legion post, Jerald Sims, Olon Plunk, R. A. Shaw, Robert Bailey, Booker Shaw and Bill Goode. Military rites were conducted by the post.

Hurshell, a gunner on a Navy bomber, was killed when his plane crashed on the north end of Okinawa. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Ellis of Hemet, Calif.

He was born at Plaska Nov. 5, 1931, and lived there with his parents until the family moved to Hedley in 1947. From here the family moved to Hemet in 1950.

Hurshell attended school in Memphis and Hedley. He enlisted in the Navy Oct. 16, 1950 and received training at San Diego, Calif.

He is survived by his parents, one brother, Marshall Leon Ellis in the Navy at Stockton, Calif., twin sisters, Earline and Ilene Ellis of Hemet, and another sister, Mrs. Billy Gene Tate of Hedley.

The body was accompanied to Memphis by the brother, Marshall Leon Ellis.

Explorers Building Emergency Trailer

A year long project by members of Explorer Scout Post 36 is rapidly nearing completion. Scouts are rebuilding an old house trailer into a mobile emergency service unit capable of being used also on Post camping trips as headquarters and cooking shack.

The trailer will be equipped with facilities for first aid, disaster relief, and able to serve large groups with hot soup, coffee, etc. It will carry 50 gallons of fresh water at all times, battery operated lighting facilities, and blankets, stretchers, and tools.

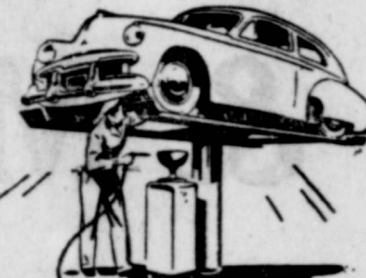
