## A. F. Page

The following article was taken from the Chillicothe Valley News for Aug. 27:

A. F. Page, 69, a resident of Abilene since 1923, suffered a heart attack and died at his home, 1417 Cedar Crest Dr., Monday. He had been in failing health but had worked Monday. He died before a doctor arrived.

Mr. Page was born July 11, 1884 in Monroe County, Ky., and came to Texas when a boy, residing near Chillicothe. He was married Nov. 26, 1908 at Tolbert to Mary E. McDonald by Minister W. A. Bentley, now of Abilene, who baptized the couple.

Mr. and Mrs. Page moved there from Chillicothe in 1923. He had been employed by the Plumbers and Steam Fitters Local there for the past 12 years. Previously he had been employed by the old Jennings Motor Co. and the old Big Four Motor Co. He had been a member of the Church of Christ since 1908.

He is survived by his wife; five sons, F. Mack Page of Mojave, Calif., A. F. Page Jr. of Houston, Lt. Leslie K. Page of Fort Bliss, El Paso, Robert E. Page of Portales, N. Mex., Stephen Lee Page of Abilene; five daughters, Mrs. R. M. Leach of Abilene, Mrs. Jerry Hampton of Ballinger, Mrs. Fred Fred F. Eichert Jr. of Albuquerque, Mrs. George Serocki of Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Mac Barte of Austin; two sisters, Mrs. R. E. Newman of Hedley, Miss Sallie Page of Chillicothe; and 19 grandchildren.

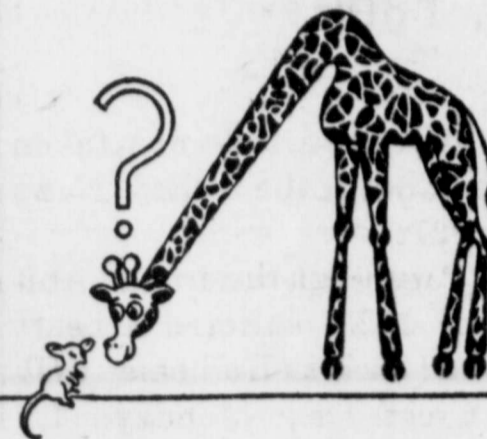

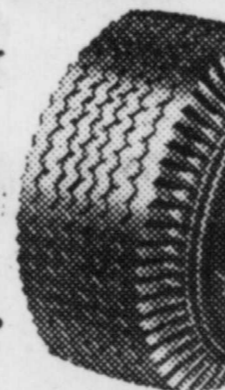

### Boll Worms

Boll worms are giving Donley County farmers trouble says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. The infestations in some parts of the county are very serious and poisoning is already under way. Two airplane spraying companies are now at work and farmers are using both ground dusting and spraying equipment. Breedlove says that for the control of boll worms that we can sure expect two sprayings on cotton and possibly three before they are under control. The poison being used is DDT-Toxaphene. Breedlove urges all farmers to keep a close check on their cotton and if you find as many as six or seven boll worms or signs of the boll worms to one hundred stalks it is time to start control. Anyone needing information is urged to call by the agents office for more information.
