NEW POSTAL RATES GO INTO EFFECT SUNDAY MAY 16

The United States Postal Service announces new postage rates effective May 16, 1971. First Class mail will go from 6c to 8c per ounce to a maximum of 12 ounces. Thirteen ounces and over will go into the Priority Rate which will also increase in postage rates. Post cards will go from 5c to 6c each, airmail

cards from 8c to 9c, and airmail letters from 10c per ounce to 11c per ounce. Airmail letters go into the Priority Rate at 9 ounces.

In addition to increases in first-class rates, second and third class will also go up on May 16. The transient rate for newspapers which the public mails will be 6c for first 2 ounces, and 1c for each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce. Bulk mailing of second class will go up proportionately.

No change in rates are planned for parcel post. However, the book rate which is classified as fourth class will be increased.

All proposed increases are of a temporary nature, pending final authorization by proper authorities.

Any further information or inquiry should be directed to the personnel of the local post office. All postal employees will be glad to assist any customers in the matter of postal increases.

Four Constitutional Amendments Proposed for State Election May 18

One of the most pressing matters before the 62nd Legislature when it convened on Jan. 5th, was the provision of sufficient funds to meet state welfare needs. Restricted by a constitutional ceiling on welfare spending from state funds, the legislature found it necessary to propose a constitutional amendment for immediate consideration by the Texas electorate to make possible the welfare recipients to continue their monthly payments.

The Legislature acted promptly in proposing an amendment which would remove the ceiling from welfare expenditures for three classes of recipients — the needy aged, the needy blind and the needy disabled. A new ceiling of \$55 million would be established by the amendment for the fourth class of recipients — the needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. This amendment is listed on the ballot as No. 3.

Date for the election on the proposed amendments, was set for May 18, 1971, since that date would allow sufficient time following adoption of the proposal to provide the funds essential to carry on the welfare program.

Five House Members In Washington Seeking Drought Relief for Farmers

AUSTIN — The five House members sent to Washington to confer with Federal officials concerning possible drought relief for farmers and ranchers, returned Thursday and presented their report to House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher.

Rep. Oscar Carrillo Sr., of Benavides, chairman of the committee, told Mutscher some hope was in sight under present means of obtaining low-interest Federal loans. However, he expressed disappointment that the President has not issued a drought disaster declaration and that the loan requirement of a pauper's oath has not been waived.

Other House members making the three-day trip were Representatives Honore Ligarde of Laredo, Tom Holmes of Granbury, Joe Hanna of Breckenridge and John Poerner of Hondo.

The committee met with James Smith, administrator of the Farmers Home Administra-

tion, who briefed the members on present assistance available in obtaining loans.

Carrillo told Mutscher he is convinced after the visit that farmers and ranchers are not adequately informed as to the types of loans presently available. He said the Farmers Home Administration has agreed to work with the Texas House members in setting up meetings throughout the state to make loan information available.

Mutscher said he was "pleased and gratified" by the work of the committee.

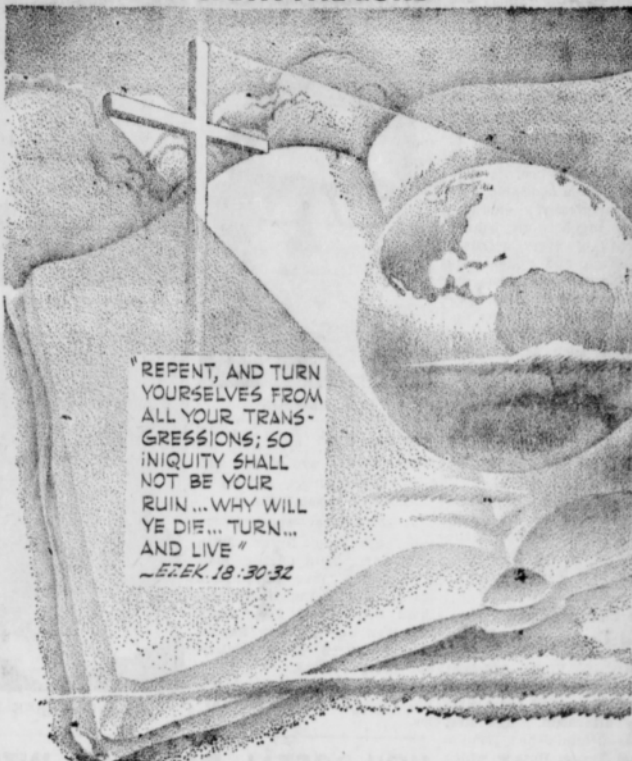

Haying and Grazing Privileges Offered for 11 Additional Counties

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that Haying and Grazing privileges on cropland taken out of production under the Cropland Adjustment Program were offered in 11 additional counties in Texas where the severe drought has greatly reduced the availability of pasture forage. They are Bandera, Baylor, Callahan, Castro, Denton, Gaines, Hale, Hartley, Martin, Ochiltree and Roberts. Although some light rains have fallen over some areas of

Texas the drought has continued. Range conditions are generally from 5 to 20 percent of normal for this time of the year. Wheat and oat crops are furnishing practically no grazing and a considerable acreage of wheat has been abandoned. The usable forage on the CAP acreage will provide some relief and help prevent liquidation of livestock herds, Burleson said.

There are now a total of 144 Texas counties eligible for haying and grazing privileges, including 8 still eligible from a designation in 1970.

WHY DID CHRIST DIE?

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son" (John 3:16). God not only gave His Son, but He gave Him to DIE. The New Testament mentions His death more than one hundred seventy-five times.

Christ died because of our sins. Peter said He "bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed." (1 Pet. 2:24) Paul said, "While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Rom. 5:8) "For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust." (1 Pet. 3:18) "Christ died for our sins." (1 Cor. 15:3) These passages all connect the death of Christ with salvation. No one can be saved upon the merits of his own goodness. He must reach the benefits of the death of Christ. (Rom. 6:3,4).

Christ died so that God could save man and still meet the requirements of justice. God created man in His own image. Man was pure and sinless. But, man sinned, separating himself from God. (Isa. 59:2). There was now a need for reconciliation. God could not just pardon man indiscriminately. One of the important points of pardon is that justice must be met. Paul tells us concerning Christ, "Whom God set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God; To declare, I say, at this time his righteousness: that he might be just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus." J. C. EARP REPORTS ON ASCS

Drouth - Grazing and Haying of Set-Aside Acreage — The County Committee has received approval to graze or cut hay from set-aside acreage through June 30, 1971. Unless rain is received soon it appears unlikely that any hay will be cut before June 30. There will be no charge for grazing your own livestock on your set-aside acreage. Set-aside acreage is that cropland that is required to be taken out of production by pro-

ducers, participating in the 1971 wheat, cotton and feed grain programs.

Grazing or haying of set-aside acres is free to enrolled producers but there are limits on what they can charge other producers. Maximum charges to other producers are (1) \$1.00 per acre per month for grazing and (2) \$30.00 per ton for hay.

Anyone desiring to use their set-aside acreage will be required to file Form ASCS-100 (Request to Graze or Harvest Hay) when a supply of the new forms become available. You may turn in NOW and sign the request at a later date.

Grazing CAP Acreage — As of this date permission to graze Cropland Adjustment Program acreage has been received. This is the long term program where permanent grass is established on the retired acreage.

Disaster Relief Programs — In addition to the above programs the county committee has requested funds for approved conservation measures to protect cropland due to drouth.

You can be assured the committee is keeping a close watch on drouth conditions in this county and the various programs that may be of assistance to our producers. When emergency programs are for the best interest of all producers the committee will not hesitate to act.

Quality of Set-Aside Acreage — Farmers enrolled in the feed grain, wheat or cotton programs are reminded that the acreage set aside under these programs should be as productive as the acreage normally used to grow the crops. In addition, the set-aside must be acreage that was either in nonconserving crops planted for harvest last year or was used as diverted acreage under last year's farm programs. If you have any doubt about whether your proposed set-aside acreage will meet these qualifications, please check with this office.

Peanut Transfer Date Extended to June 1 — The final date to transfer peanut allotment acreage has been extended to June 1, 1971. Producers who wanted to buy, sell, or lease peanut acreage but did not get it done by April 1, now have another chance.

It is necessary that a normal yield be set for both the transferring and receiving farms. Persons interested should come by and request yields be set so that the transfer can be completed by June 1.
