Court OKs Work Bid In Session

A bid for renovation of the ladies' restroom at the Court House, was accepted by County Commissioners at their regular session March 11.

The bid, from Sherrill Lumber Co. of Bovina, was in the amount of \$10,895.

Bills from the county's foster children, in the amounts of \$476 and \$1760 were approved. This money will be reimbursed to the county by the state at a later date.

A request for right-of-way across a county road with an electric line in Precinct 4 was received. Motion was approved unanimously to grant the request.

A letter from the University of Texas Medical Center Branch at Galveston, asking the court to help a county citizen on their medical expenses, was denied.

A request presented by Commissioner Tommy Williams, asking the court to help purchase a "Jaws of Life" machine for the Bovina Fire Department, was also turned down.

Hugh Moseley, Tax Assessor/Collector, met with the court to request permission to change a part-time employee to full-time status, was approved.

Soil conservation work was approved for six farms in Precinct 2 and eight in Precinct 4. The work is to be performed by county machinery when not in demand for use on the roads. Cost of such work is paid by the farmers.

Farms approved are: Larry Scott, Billy Baxter, Edwin Lide, C.N. Treinen, Lawrence Jameson and Tom Ware in Precinct 2; Clay Mimms, Ben Rejino, Jr., Mike Goodnaugh, Harrol Redwine, Elvis Powell, Fred M. Burch, Kirby Burch and C.W. Dale in Precinct 4.

Area Receives 2.5-Inch Rain

The spring season was ushered into the Bovina area last week by one of the nicest, and most general, rains the area has received in many a day.

The slow, mountain-shower type rain fell for the better parts of Tuesday and Wednesday, including most of the night on Tuesday.

A check with local farm observers indicated that most places received around two and one-half inches of rain during the period.

A check with farmers showed that the rain stretched from as far as the Bootleg area, through Rhea, which received a nice rain, southeastward through the Hub area, which likewise experienced a good total.

Attempts on Thursday to contact several farmers proved fruitless, due to the fact that (1) the telephone lines, having experienced wetness, were on the blink in some areas, and (2) some farmers, having their farmland wet to the limits, may have opted to go on their own personal "spring break."

The moisture should be ultra-beneficial to the area farmland, coming when the winter wheat crop was really needing a boost. Observers expect the wheat to really take off.

The rain should also provide a generous amount of pre-plant moisture for the row crops, when their planting time arrives.

"It's a million-dollar rain. It'll put us in good shape for planting corn and cotton," was the reaction by one area agriculture industry spokesman Thursday.

Muddy conditions may slow the planting of the area's sugar beets, potatoes, onions and other vegetables. However, the benefits from the moisture should more than offset any delays experienced.

Steps Taken On Highway

The State Highway Commission announced Wednesday a step forward in the process of widening U.S. Highway 60 in Parmer and Castro counties.

Meeting in Austin, the three-member commission authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) to begin right of way acquisition along the highway.

It is the first step by the commission toward making U.S. 60 a four-lane divided highway in both counties.

Currently, the road is two lanes through Parmer and Castro counties.

"What this means is that we can check our right of way maps and start the appraisal process," said Gary Bernethy, District Administrative Engineer with the SDHPT in Lubbock.

"We still need the authorization to begin work on the actual plan for the project, but we hope to get that okay sometime next year," Bernethy continued.

The state will pay 90 per cent of the right of way cost on the project. The other ten per cent will come from the individual counties.






Mrs. Mesman is in charge of a social to be held March 31 at 7:30 p.m. at her home.


