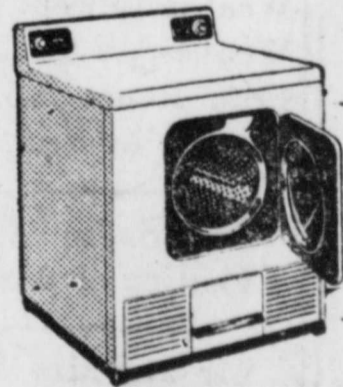

A convention type election will be held in accordance with the provisions of the State Soil Conservation Law, acts of the 47th Legislative. All persons 21 years of age holding title to farm or ranch land in subdivision No. 5 and who live in the Donley County Soil Conservation District are qualified to vote.

Soil Conservation Districts are divided into five subdivisions with a super-visor representing each subdivision. One supervisor is elected each year and serves for a five year term. The five super-isors are J. R. Porter, C. E. Bairfield, Joe Tollett, T. C. D'Spain, and W. P. Doherty.

Joe Tollett is the incumbent Supervisor of Subdivision No. 5 and he urges every qualified voter to be present at this election.
