## Second Cotton Festival Is Big Success

Hedley's second annual Cotton Festival last Friday and Saturday was a big success both financially and entertainingly.

Beginning with the kickoff breakfast, many events filled Friday's program, including Ma and Pa Kettle, the kiddies parade, the livestock show, a concert by the Hedley Band, the R. O. T. C. drill team from Canyon, and lots of western music.

The feature of Friday morning was the kiddies parade, with many attractive youngsters and clever stunts. First place winners included Rusty Mosley, Susan Cox, Joan and Judy Leggitt, and the Owl Cafe. Second place winners were Nancy Shaw, Pamela Kay Jones and Pat Leggitt, and third places went to David Moore, Bobby Joe Wiggins and Mike Chesser. Complete information on this list of prize winners was not available.

A highlight of the Festival was the coronation ceremony Friday night when Queen Joan Youree was crowned by Lions District Governor Joe R. Phillips of Amarillo. Princesses Noriene Gibson and Joan Kirkland were also honored, as well as the entire group of queen candidates. James W. Evans and State Senator Andy Rogers acted as emcees for the occasion. A program directed by Miss Myrtle Reeves and a novelty act by R. B. Parkinson of Amarillo furnished fine entertainment for the event.

Special features of Saturday included the grand parade, which was one of the best to be seen in this area, the Kwahadi Indian dancers, who made a big hit with their outstanding performance, the All Girl Mounted Quadrille of Amarillo, and a fine talk by Congressman Walter Rogers.

In the parade awards, Memphis took first, Clarendon second and Hedley third in the band division, among the floats West Texas Utilities took first, Hedley Theatre second, Garden Club third and Hedley PTA fourth; Hickey Motor Co won first for implement dealers, Estlack Machinery Co. second and Stone Machinery Co. third; in the novelties division Moffitt Hardware took first, Susan Cox second and the 1917 Chevrolet third. Grand prize winner was West Texas Utilities Co.

The Festival closed Saturday night with every concession showing a nice profit.
