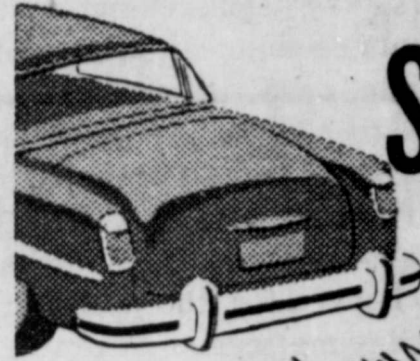

"Magna-Vision" To Be Tested at Theatre

With the advent of 3 dimensional movies, Cinenamascope, Cinerama, and a host of other novelty methods of projecting motion pictures the small town theatre owners have been seeking a new and more economical method to tide them over the radical change in movie projection. Such a system, termed Magna-vision will be tested this week end at the Hedley Theatre for two great films specially booked for the occasion. Saturday matinee and evening, Paramounts original 3 D picture, "Sangaree" will be shown on the new type screen. For Saturday's prevue, Sunday and Monday, United Artists have placed a road show engagement of the hilarious Broadway comedy, "The Moon is Blue." All seats for the latter will be 50¢ according to United Artists officials.

"Magna-vision" is in itself not true 3 D according to Theatreman Bob Harris. Instead it employs an illusion of depth created by a white halo surrounding the screen and the use of a different lens angle than standard. One advantage however is that the need for bothersome polaroid glasses has been eliminated. Next to Cinenascope itself, this is believed to be a vast improvement in so far as small screen theatres go. The new view will be augmented by auditorium sound created by speakers placed at the rear as well as the front of the Theatre tending to engulf the audience within the scene on the screen.

"We feel that we've found two wonderful pictures to try this on, in "Sangaree" and "The Moon is Blue," says Harris. "Sangaree" was originally produced in 3D and has some breathtaking sequences in it. The Moon is Blue has played to packed crowds throughout the country and while rated as an adult style picture is so loaded with hilarious comedy that it will easily pass for all family entertainment."

Sangaree will play at 2:00 PM and at 7:00 and 9:00 PM Saturday. The Moon is Blue will play a 10:30 PM prevue Saturday, 2:00 and 8:00 PM Sunday and at 7:00 and 9:00 PM Monday.
