In 1854 Sam Houston gave the Alabama and Coushatti Indians two square miles of land in the Big Thicket in Polk Co. near Livingston These Indians were Scouts for Andrew Jackson, Lee and Sam Houston. Today the government has increased the acreage to 4000 and there are 425 Indians here. It is supported by the state and federal government, but Texas is asking full control.
