The guests were greeted at the door by Mr. and Mrs. Winfield Mosley and son Rusty. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bromley mingled with the guests and visited with the many old friends of the family.

In the receiving line were Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Mosley and the latter's sisters, Mrs. Cora Luttrell and Mrs. T. B. Morgan and her husband from Amarillo.

Mrs. Vestal Mosley and Mrs. Kathryn Rose of Pampa presided at the register. The guests were directed to the register by Mrs. C. R. Hunsucker from 2 to 4, and by Mrs. J. B. Masterson from 4 to 6.

Mrs. Bill Scales led the guests to the gifts from 2 to 4, and Mrs. Herlie Moreman from 4 to 6. The gifts were in charge of Miss Ellen Faye Land, assisted by Don Wilson of Pampa.

M. W. (Milt) Mosley was born in Arkansas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Mosley. He moved to North Carolina with his parents when very young. His mother was left a widow when he was 9 years old and he had to help support the family of four. He walked 2 to 3 miles to work for 50¢ per day. At the age of 16 he came to Enloe, Texas and six months later sent for his mother, sister and brother. In 1904 he met Allie Craddock and said it was love at first sight. He laughs and says "I kept dates 2 or 3 Sundays ahead so no other buckie had a chance, but she broke with me 2 or 3 times. The last time we made up we married soon and spent the 50 years together with lots of happiness as well as some sadness and sorrows."


Allie Craddock was born in Missouri, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Craddock. She came to Roxton, Texas with her parents at the age of 6 and lived there several years, then her father sold his farm and bought land at Enloe, Delta County, Texas.

They are the parents of five children, two deceased. Their oldest child, John Vestal of Pampa, passed away in June, 1941. Their youngest child, Allie Opal, passed away in 1914. Their living children are Mrs. Ruby Bromley of Clarendon, Winfield Mosley of Hedley and Raymond Mosley of Amarillo. They have ten grandchildren and six great-grandchildren, all of whom were present for the golden wedding except three grandsons.

Mr. and Mrs. Mosley moved to Midland in 1906, and in November 1907 came to Hedley. He had made 2 or 3 trips back to Enloe in 1907, and when the emigrant car was unloaded and he found a house in Hedley, his wife laid the law down, "no more running around."

Milt is a farmer. He always farmed on a big scale, raising cotton, cattle, hogs, and among the finest mules and horses. He always had fine stock to farm with and a fine team they drove to the surrey. But when the auto came along his wife says he doesn't care what kind of car they ride in as long as it stays in good running condition.

In 1927 it was very dry and Milt

and sons decided to put in a grocery and market, and made good. Then he decided to run for Sheriff and won over four others without a runoff. After six years in office in Clarendon he decided to return to the stock farm, where they remained until Mrs. Mosley's health failed and their doctor recommended a lower climate. They sold their stock and leased the farm and spent six months at Fort Worth, then came back to good old Hedley and bought a home and 15 acres adjoining town. They kept the farm leased and Milt began truck farming.

The latch string of hospitality is always out on the Mosley door. They have always been ready to lend a helping hand to anyone in sickness or need, and have raised several nieces and nephews, as well as a number of others who were not relations. They have always been active in city and county affairs. They are both members of the First Baptist Church, and Mrs. Mosley taught the young people's class while her health permitted. She has held many offices in the church, and has been president of the Hedley P. T. A. Her hobby is raising flowers.

Milt is a member of the Hedley Lions Club and of the Clarendon I. O. O. F. lodge. His principal hobbies now are fishing, playing dominoes and talking politics.


