BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE

Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics. "Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.
"Section 2. Every person subject


