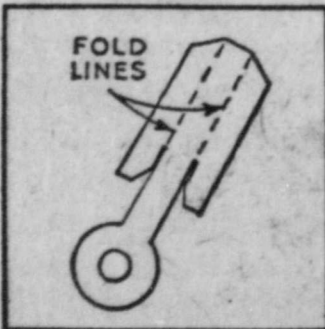

HOW TO MAKE ORNAMENT HANGERS



Emergency hangers for Christmas-tree ornaments can be made from lightweight cardboard. Cut and fold the cardboard as indicated in the drawing and then insert the hanger in the ornament. A wire or string through the eye of the hanger will fasten it to the tree. Cardboard with a waxed finish is best for this purpose. The eyes of these hangers may be strengthened with the little circles used as notebook-ring reinforcements.

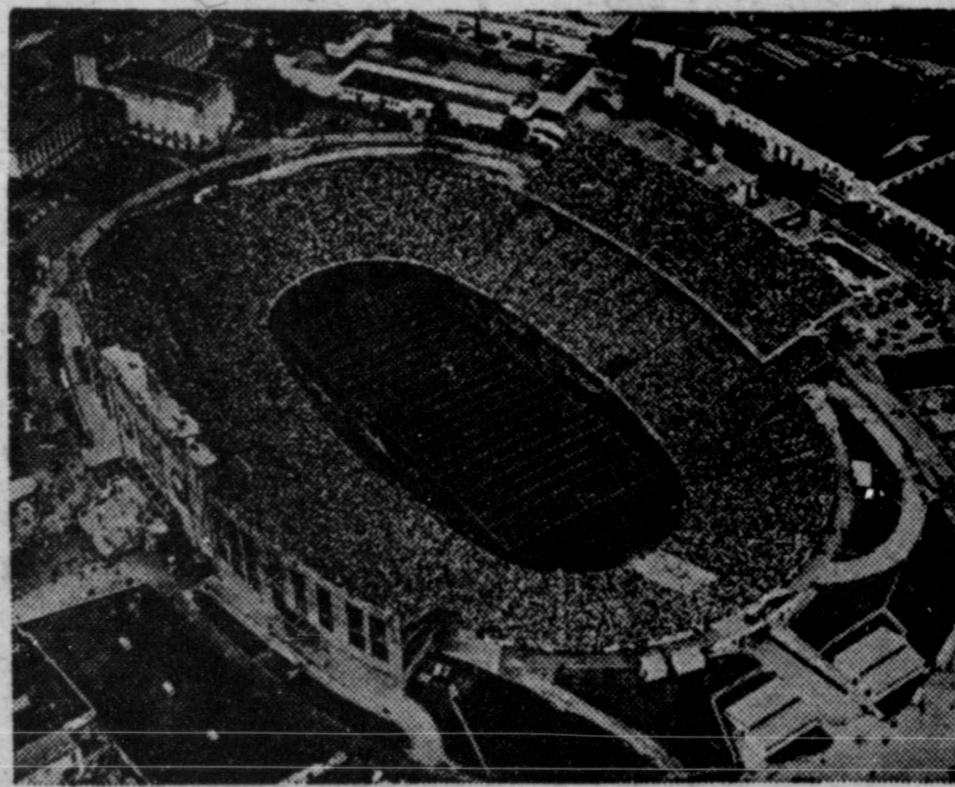
