Owls Win First In Memphis Tournament

The Memphis Tournament saw quite a bit of action from Hedley last week.

The Owlets started the games off by bowing to Memphis 74 to 30. The girls were strictly out-classed for their size. Their pivot man was a tall 6 foot even, and that's mighty good on anyone's team. High point honors went to Jo Ann Bolin who sank 20 points, Sanders got 5, Hunsucker 3, and White 2.

The Owls went through their starter by defeating Estelline 55 to 49. With some good dependable subs, the Owls finally outscored Estelline. Early in the 3rd quarter the Owls found they were without the services of Don Reeves Cope, and Bevers, but with smooth ball handling the boys put the game on ice. The score by quarters was 18 to 8, 37 to 21, 43 to 36, and 55 to 49. High point honors went to Bevers who ducked 22, Bill Reeves 15, Don Reeves 8, Cope 6, Bailey 2, and Merle Owens 2.

The girls came back into the tournament to out score Quitaque 24 to 20. The score by quarters was 5 to 8, 8 to 12, 16 to 18, and 24 to 20. High point honors went to Jo Ann Bolin who received 13, Sanders and White ducked 5 each, with Hunsucker sinking 1 free shot.

The boys came back to find themselves up against the foe of Memphis. With terrific ball-handling and every boy on the squad shooting for 1st place honors they tucked Memphis away under a 25 point margin. The final buzzer found Hedley the winner by a score of 55 to 30. High point honors went to Don Reeves with 19 points, followed closely by Bevers with 17, Bill Reeves got 8, Bailey 6, and Cope 5. The score by quarters found Hedley leading all the way: 13 to 4, 25 to 18, 44 to 21, and 55 to 30.

After putting Quitaque away, the Hedley girls met Lelia Lake to decide the Consolation champion. Coach Martin says it was one of our best games we played. We had the ball most of the game, but Lelia Lake still out-pointed us to take home the trophy. High point honors went to Hunsucker who sank 14, closely followed by Sanders with 10, Bolin 6, White 2 and

Wynn 1. The score by quarters was 10 to 9, 13 to 18, 20 to 29, and 33 to 43.

Saturday night the Owls took on Lelia Lake to determine which would take home the 1st place championship trophy.

The Owls went into the game with the desire to get their hands on that trophy, and they did just that. The Owls were in complete charge of the ball game the instant the ball went into the air for the center jump. They put Lelia Lake away with a 25 point mist over their heads by a score of 64 to 39. Any fan would have seen smart ball handling and passing with exceptionally good plays being executed.

When the final buzzer went off the Memphis gym was filled with jumping and cheering for these boys who won a mighty deserving victory for the 1st place championship. After the crowds were finally settled down the trophies were awarded and individual awards were given. Don Reeves and Leon Bevers received the highest honor of any tournament by being selected to the all tournament team of 5 players which was selected by the coaches of the schools represented in the tournament.

Equally representing Hedley was Jean Sanders who was selected to the all tournament girls team consisting of 6 players.

The boys this year have brought home 3 trophies which have been placed in the trophy case at the high school. These trophies are Consolation won at Mobeetie tournament, 1st place Hedley tournament and 1st place Memphis tournament. The next trophy the boys have their eye on is the District Tournament at Groom Feb 10, 11, 12.

Hedley will have their next home basketball game Tuesday, Jan. 18, when the boys and girls take on Claude in a double header.
