NFLA Meeting

E. J. Hommel of Clarendon will represent the Donley County National Farm Loan Association at the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Federal Land Bank of Houston. The meeting will be held in Houston on February 23-24, according to Rayburn L. Smith, Secretary-Treasurer of the Association.

The purpose of the meeting is to give representatives from all of the national farm loan associations in Texas first hand reports on the business and financial condition of the Federal Land Bank of Houston from the bank's executive officers, and to give the association a part in planning its loan service to farmers and ranchers.

The Federal Land Bank's \$8,252,920 of capital stock is owned cooperatively by the national farm loan associations in direct proportion to the amount of stock each member has in his local NFLA. Stockholders attending the meeting will represent members who have 32,652 loans amounting to \$135,900,000.

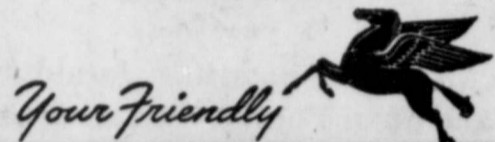

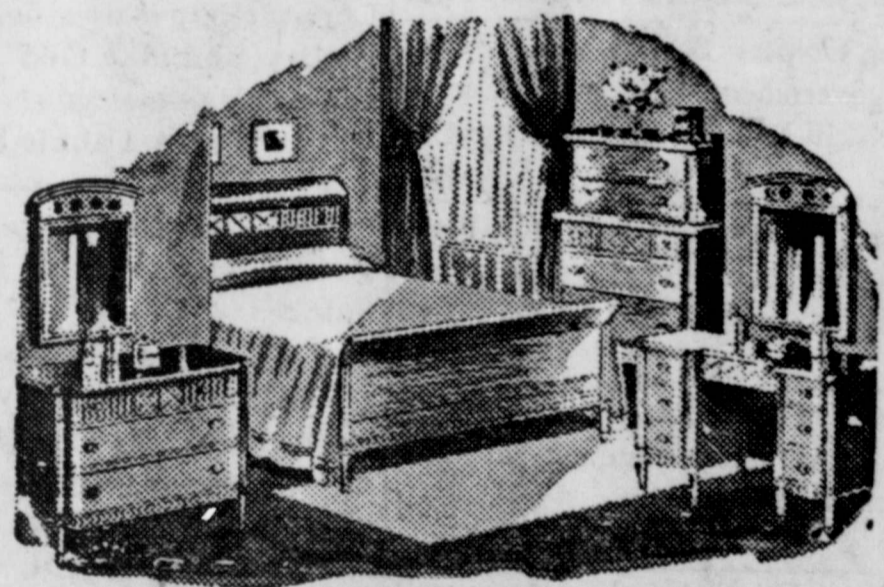

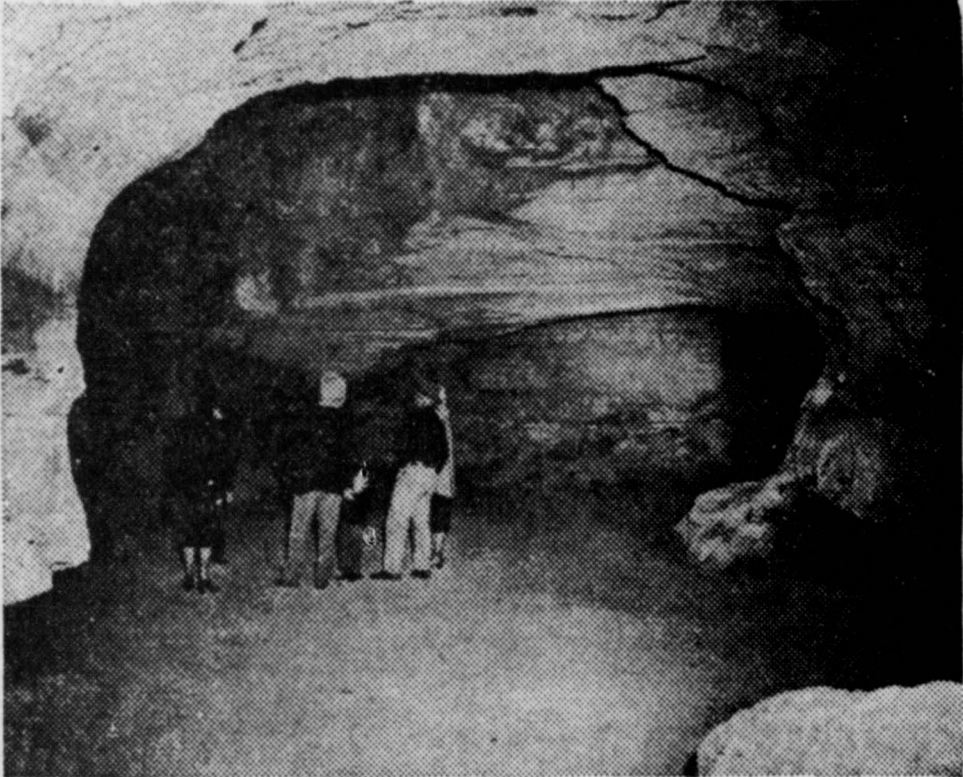
