Queen Contest

The annual Lions Club Queen contest will be held at the Hedley Theatre on Monday night, April 4th. This contest is open to any girl who is single, 16 years of age or over, and a student in either Lelia Lake, Quail, or Hedley high schools. The contestants will appear on the stage of the theatre that night between shows in evening dress. The girls will be judged on beauty, personality and poise. The winner will represent the Hedley Club at the district convention at Lubbock April 24, 25, and 26. This year's district contest will be on television.

The sanctuary of the First Baptist Church was the setting last Saturday evening for the marriage of Miss Wanda Lee Moore to Leon Youree of Amarillo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Youree, of Richmond, Calif.

The impressive double ring service was read by Rev. J. S. Tipton, pastor of the church, at the twilight hour.

The altar setting was lighted by white tapers in branched candelabras. Decorations included tall floor baskets of white gladiolas and arrangements of stands of ferns. A low altar, covered with a white satin flounce, on which rested a large Bible, white satin covered, and a matching kneeling bench completed the arrangements. The bridal aisle was marked with white satin bows and small white wedding bells.

A prelude of wedding music was rendered by Miss Nancy Nash, pianist. She also accompanied Miss Noriene Gibson who rendered the wedding solo, "All My Heart." The traditional wedding marches were played by the pianist and "The Lord's Prayer" was softly played during the ceremony and was repeated for the benediction.

Escorted to the altar and given in marriage by her father, the bride was attired in a waltz length dress of white antique taffeta, made on princess lines with insets of lace and featuring a full skirt with panels of lace. 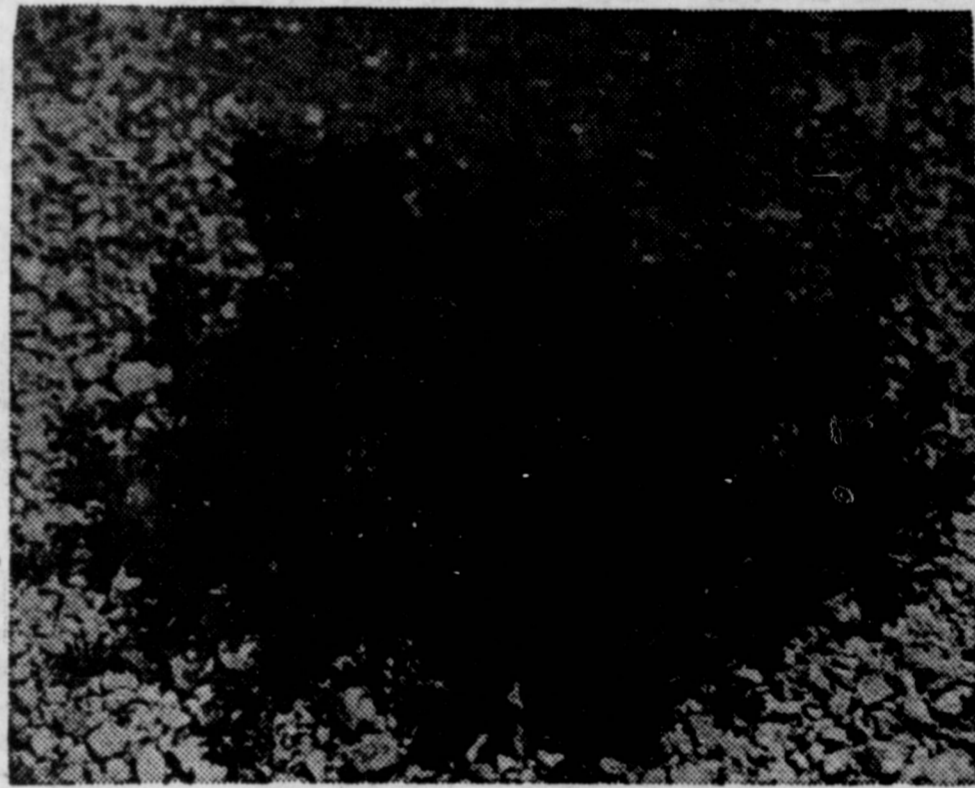
