DON'T LOOK NOW, and hopefully we're not jumping the gun on writing the epitaph to the end of the recession, but signs on every hand are pointing toward a more stable economy.

Hopefully, the gradual swing to a more positive economic situation will continue as the weeks and months go by.

The announcement this past week by Ford Motor Company that its profits for the quarter which ended June 30 were at their highest level since 1979 was another positive factor in the recovery.

Earlier, on Tuesday, General Motors had announced a similar profit statement, a \$1.04 billion profit which surpassed the \$962 million the corporation earned all of last year.

Chrysler Corporation, which survived extinction through an unprecedented government loan and some tight expert management at the top level, had reported a \$310 million profit for the period, its best for any quarter in the company's history.

So far in 1983, American auto manufacturers have made \$2.78 billion in profits, the best figure since the industry earned \$3.34 billion during the first half of 1979.

For the first half of 1983, Ford Motor Company earned \$753 million. This is quite a turn-around from the \$96.6 million in losses the company had sustained by the same date a year ago.

An analyst for the auto industry pointed out that the first quarter of 1979 marked the last "boom" for the industry, and it took 17 quarters for the auto makers to recover and get back to a "peak" position.

The automobile industry is usually a pretty good barometer by which to measure the nation's economy. When people have money, they make the major purchases which they feel they need. But when things are tight, people cut back on major cash outlays, which usually mean several months worth of financing.

The decline of interest rates nationwide has been a major factor in the resurgence of the automotive industry. The more favorable interest situation also has helped the country's sagging construction industry, which has been sadly crippled during the recession, mainly due to the high rates.

The building industry still needs help in the form of guaranteed long-term favorable rates, so that it may continue on the road to recovery.

When he took office in 1981, President Reagan promised to do all within his power to get the nation's economy on the right track, and he warned that it would take some time.

Runaway inflation had been the trend for most of the last four decades, and this takes some time to halt, or at least slow to a pace most people can live with.

The president has done his best to cut the fat out of government spending. But he has learned that when it comes to cutting, the bureaucracy is a tough nut to crack. Special interest groups in virtually every segment of the economy object when their particular government check is reduced.

Discoveries of over-spending (or over-charging) by the military could result in savings of millions of dollars, if the country's leaders can be persuaded to demand a reform in this area.

The president has had a lot of critics on his economic plan, but at this point, it appears to be working, if each of us will just give it the chance it needs.

Three Firemen Attend State Event

Three men from Bovina, Andy Garza, Corky Saenz and Arty Kunselman, attended the Texas A&M Fire Protection School held last week in College Station, and 2,500 Texas municipal firefighters, instructors and sales representatives were present to sharpen their firefighting knowledge.

The school is designed to encourage training and better fire protection techniques for Texas firefighters.

The firemen had both classroom and field training last week. They attended six hours of instruction a day plus a night class on Monday. They then took a final examination Friday. The examination covered theory from classroom and practical application from field training.

Basic field training includes how to properly hold a fire hose, prevent

smoke inhalation and forcibly enter a structure without causing damages. The more advanced classes dealt with electrical and structural fires and the chemicals used to prevent them.

The program is one of the best in the nation with visitors coming from all over the United States and abroad to observe the teaching methods and the efficiency with which the program is run. Volunteer instructors came from all over the nation to teach the newest firefighting techniques. Some of the men stayed in college dorms and about 1,000 stayed in motels.

The Fire Protection Training Division of Texas A&M conducts the firefighting school. It is one of 16 separate training divisions of the Texas Engineering Extension Service. The fire protection division sponsors three firefighting programs: municipal firefighting, industrial firefighting, and a special program for Spanish-speaking firefighters.

This is Andy Garza's eleventh year to attend the fireman's school. Being represented at the school helps the city's key fire insurance rate.

"Bull Run" Is Added To Slate

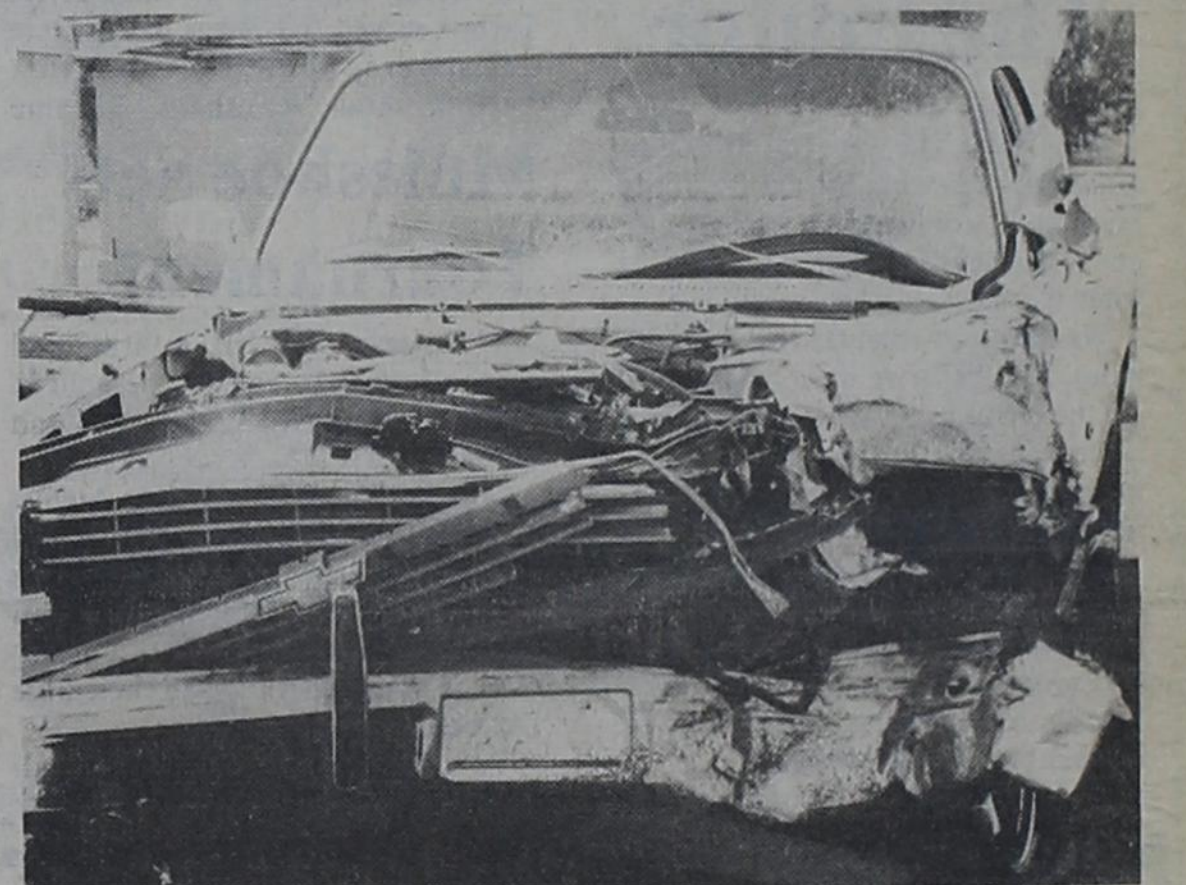
Wreck Ruins New Pickup; Read Spared

FOR TECH SCHOOL

\$100,000 Launches Center Drive

The first step toward launching a brain study center at Texas Tech Medical School was taken today when Malouf Abraham, independent oil and gas producer and real estate developer from Canadian, presented a check for \$100,155.14 to the Texas Tech Medical Foundation.

The brain study center will be a multiple-campus research and treatment center for neurological disorders.

The donation, presented at the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center at Amarillo, marks the beginning of a major fund drive to complete the center, expected to be one of the finest in the country.

Tech president Lauro Cavazos, MD, accepted the donation, made in honor of Elmer Tarbox, former Texas State Legislator and one-time Texas Tech football star.

The brain study center will include the Texas Tech Medical School centers at Amarillo, Lubbock, and El Paso.

Abraham attended Texas Tech in the early 1930s and served two terms in the State Legislature in the 1960s. He was selected by the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association as the 1981 Distinguished Alumnus.

Tarbox, in whose honor the gift was made, also is a former Tech student and served in the Texas House of Representatives with Abraham. He is a victim of

Letter To The Editor

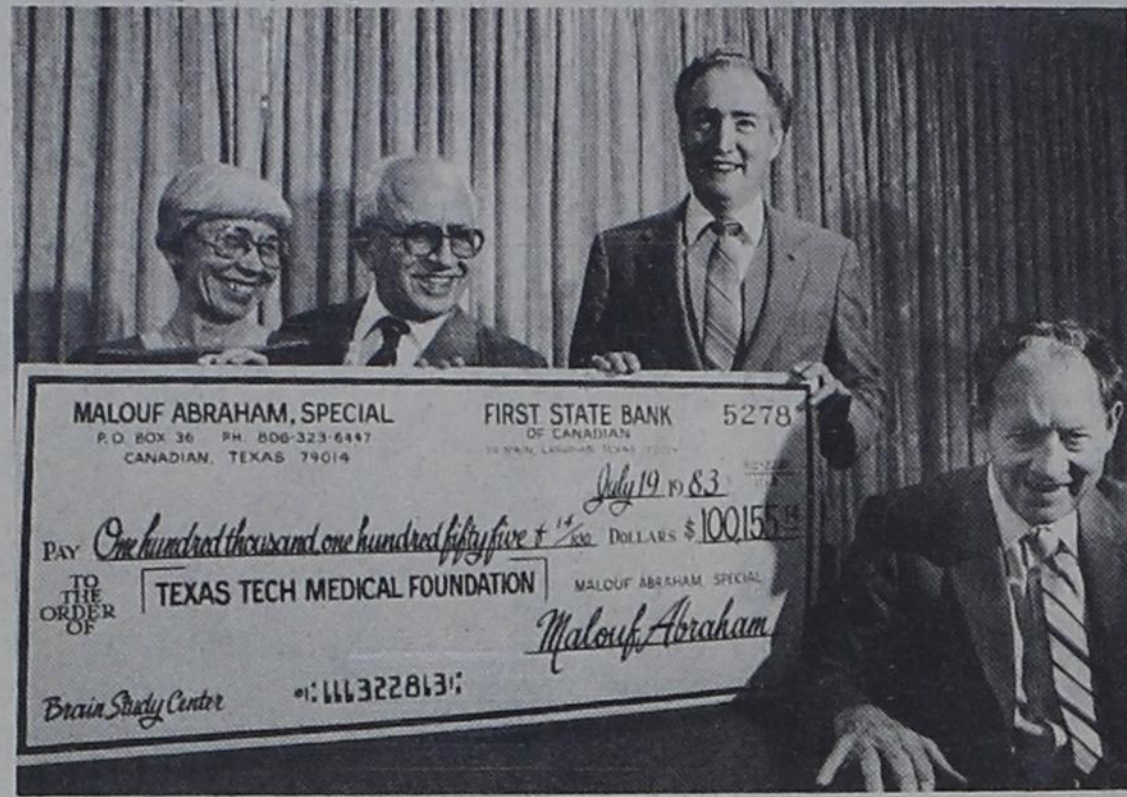
Dear Editor,

friends. Together they spearheaded the drive which resulted in creation by the State Legislature in 1971 of the Tarbox Parkinson's Disease Institute. The institute provides funds for a free clinic at the Lubbock campus of the medical school for victims of Parkinson's disease.

The brain study center will be a three-campus, computer-connected network of basic scientists and clinical researchers working together to advance research in the neurosciences and to improve the quality of care for persons throughout West Texas who suffer from brain disorders.

Recent surveys indicate the center can expect as many as 7,500 patient visits annually from the 107 counties in West Texas.

Medical specialists and basic scientists interested in the brain will share findings and experiences from all three Tech medical centers so that physicians will have immediately available all the latest scientific and computer techniques to diagnose and treat their patients. At the same time, neuroscientists will gain valuable first-hand experience with the ravages of brain disease.

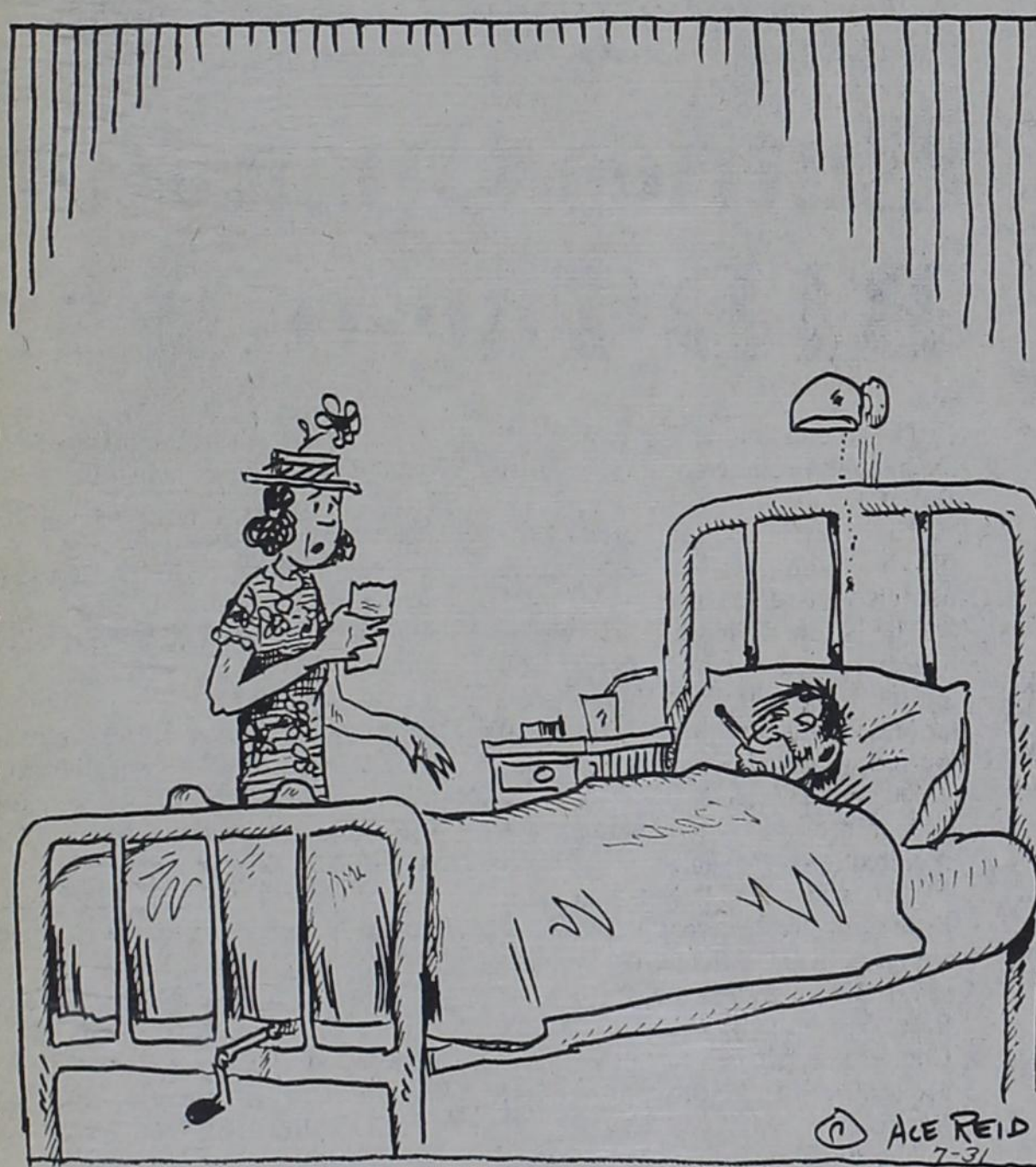

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Scooter's Scoops

We have been in the El Paso area in recent days making hauls from Carlsbad to Clint, Texas. Weather was cooler than usual and rain showers everyday.

The distance between Carlsbad and Clint is 182 miles and about half way between is a terrific little restaurant way out in this West Texas scrub land that is no bigger than an afterthought.

After visiting the people, eating there for several days, and reading the feature articles on the walls by a Dallas reporter and the El Paso Times, we thought we'd share their story.

May Carson, who was 40 years old at the time, came four years ago from Bakersfield, California with \$5,000 and purchased the 28-acre townsite of Cornudas for \$100,000. Her family helped some. She applied for loans and finally had all of the down payment except \$15,000.

A local rancher who had eaten at the restaurant several times, offered to loan her the money at 13 per cent which was the lowest interest rate available. They took his offer and finalized the deal. May is sole owner of the town of Cornudas, Texas, which has the restaurant, small motel and a trailer house on its location.

One of the neighboring ranchers provides the meat, which is so lean they have to butter the grills to keep it from sticking. Water in the area is scarce and most people have their storage tanks and haul water. Cornudas has a well but had to drill 900 feet to reach water. They have their own disposal unit, which is a large hole dug in the ground and every night they put garbage and trash in the hole and burn it. They have to burn it because at night the coyotes come and they will eat everything.

May's daughter, Terri, and her three children from California came six months ago to help May with the restaurant. Since then other members of the family have joined them: May's mother, sister, and brother.

Everyone works hard and May works 14 hours a day. The three small children have the job of

supplying and cleaning the restrooms.

The highway near Cornudas is heavily traveled by trucks and also tourists going to Carlsbad Caverns, which is only a short distance away.

They have about 300 people stopping daily, and once people have eaten there, they keep coming back. The food is excellent, their coffee and tea are free to truckers, and their prices are way below average. When May was asked why she didn't charge more, she replied, "I came to Texas just to make a living, not to get rich."

One night 27 people ate supper by candlelight at Cornudas when the electricity went off. This did not inconvenience the cook because the grills operate off of propane.

The tiny restaurant is very neat and clean inside and out. The grounds have a variety of cactus planted among an assortment of pretty rocks. The inside of the restaurant is very attractive with early day western relics decorating the walls and the windows are covered with burlap curtains. On the door is a sign with the usual meaning but worded a little differently, it reads, "Cover your hide, or stay outside."

The owners are not new at the restaurant business. They managed three A&W Restaurants in California.

One feels very relaxed and peaceful looking across this part of the country, with nothing but miles and miles of low-land shrubs, grass and cactus with an occasional rabbit, coyote, antelope or deer. The scenic view is edged with the pretty, misty blue, Guadalupe Mountains in the distance.

The family plans to expand the town some day. They hope to build a trailer park, gift shop, more motels and expand the restaurant.

These people are the type who care for people, and work hard for what they want so it's probable that the town of Cornudas will grow and their dreams become realities.

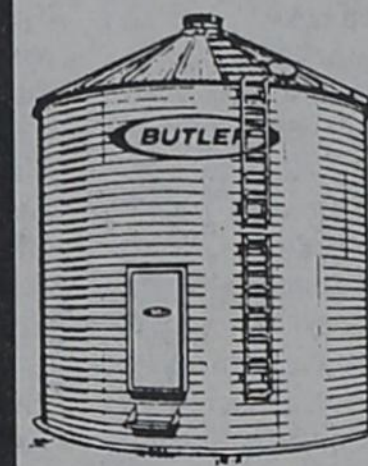

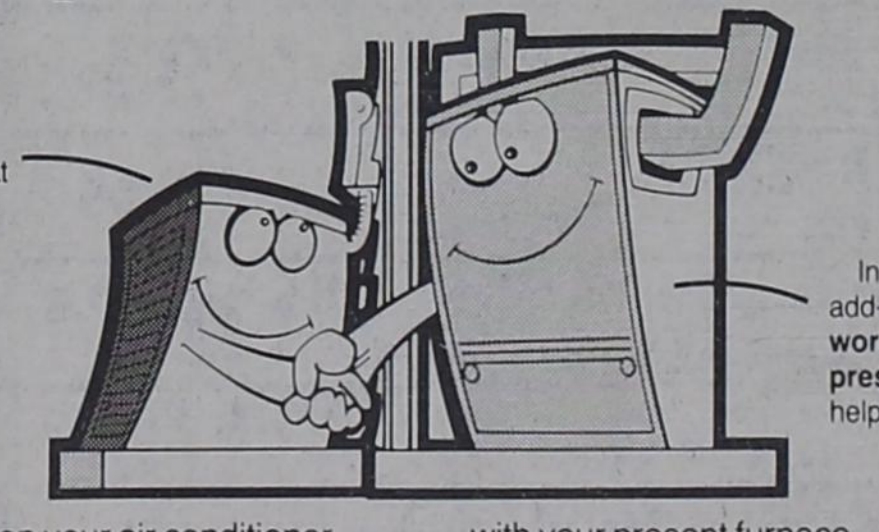
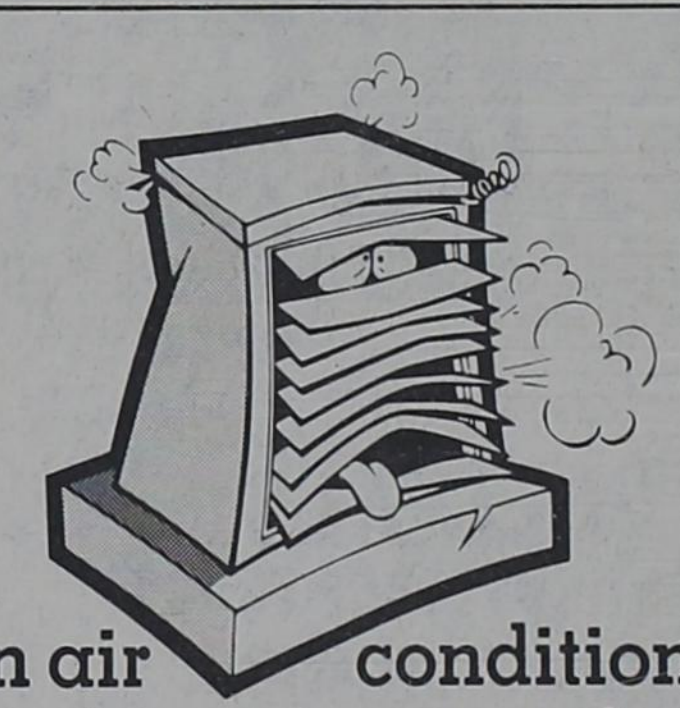
