Interscholastic League Organ Dedication

Hedley students have done well in Interscholastic League contests this year, the first time in several years that Hedley has competed.

Don Cox won first place with a cornet solo recently in the music contest at Canyon. Then on April 8 in the track meet at White Deer, Carroll Gilcrest took 4th in the 100 yd. dash, Blackie won 2nd in the 120 high hurdles, Carroll Gilcrest was 2nd and Bobby Beach 3rd in the 180 low hurdles, the team of Bobby Beach, Don Reeves, Leon Bevers and Carroll Gilcrest took 3rd in the 440 relay, the team of Don Reeves, Leon Bevers, Carroll Gilcrest and Blackie Johnson took 2nd in the mile relay, and Allen Cope took 4th in the shot put.

In the junior high track Johnny Nash won 2nd in the 100 yd. dash, the broad jump and the shot put, Johnny Nash took 2nd and John Stephens 4th in the 50 yd. dash, the team of John Stephens, Paul Younger, Jimmy Waddell and Johnny Nash took 4th in the 440 relay, John Stephens took 1st and Johnny Nash 3rd in the high jump and Dewayne Meador won 2nd, John Stephens 3rd and Jimmy Waddell 4th in chinning.

In the tennis matches at Groom April 15 Billy Meador won 1st in boys' singles and Leon Bevers and Terry Bailey 1st in boys' doubles. Joy Wood took 2nd in girls singles, and Nancy Hinds and Betty Sanders 2nd in girls doubles.

In the literary events at Groom Saturday Reatha Ranson won 4th in senior girls declamation, Nancy Hinds 2nd in elementary girls declamation, Leonard Mullins 4th in elementary boys declamation, Jerry Grimsley tied for 3rd in story telling, Jon Leggitt and Patsy Alexander tied for 3rd in 5th and 6th spelling, Nancy Hinds and Billy Wayne Moore took 4th in 7th and 8th spelling, David Boliver and Peggy Mullins won 1st in high school spelling.

On April 22 the boys tennis doubles team of Leon Bevers and Terry Bailey will play at the regional meet at Lubbock and Billy Meador will enter the singles.

On Saturday the mile relay team of Don Reeves, Leon Bevers, Carroll Gilcrest and Blackie Johnson will enter the track meet, and Gilcrest will also compete in the 180 low hurdles.

Notaries Must File

Secretary of State A. M. Mul-
 drow has announced that he will
 reappoint all persons who now
 hold Notary Public Commissions
 and that all such persons must
 qualify by filing an oath and bond
 with the County Clerk of their
 residence between June 1, 1955.
 The law specifically requires
 County Clerks to approve Notary
 Bonds and individuals should not
 send money or requests for com-
 missions direct to the Secretary of
 State. All Notary matters can
 only be received by the Secretary
 of State after the County Clerk
 acts thereon.

Any person who has not hereto-
 fore been a Notary Public should
 apply to his County Clerk between
 May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if
 he desires to have this application
 given prompt attention in the
 State Department, as the rush of
 reappointing all old Notaries may
 slow up the ordinary process of
 making new appointments and is-
 suing commissions.

Secretary of State Muldrow
 said, "Each person applying for a
 commission as a Notary Public
 must be at least 21 years of age
 and a resident of the County for
 which he is appointed; exact names
 and permanent addresses should
 be given to the County Clerk in
 applying for a commission, as lo-
 cation of the Notary may be ne-
 cessary long after he has notariz-
 ed a particular instrument."

Emergency Grain Aid

Donley County has been redesi-
 gnated for the Emergency Grain
 Feed Aid. Applications for feed
 may be accepted through April 29.

The total amount of feed grain
 for which applicant may qualify
 will be the feed required to carry
 his basic livestock through May
 15, 1955. The feed on hand and
 amount approved on the last loan
 will be taken into consideration.

This does not, however, apply
 to hay as the previous program
 did. Make application at the
 Farmers Home Administration of-
 fice in Clarendon.
