Next Sunday, May 15 , is Soil Stewardship Sưnday. Many miṇisters throughout the country will devote their sermons on this day to God's plan for man's stewardship of the land. The observance of this day in the local churches is sponsored by the Donley Soil Conservation District. It is sponsored nation wide by the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

Last year the N a tional Association of Soil Conservation Districts agreed to assume responsibility for encouraging nation-wide participation in this program.
Booklets, containing exoerpts from sermons delivered in various parts of the nation on the theme of soil stewardship, have been developed and made available to ministers for their use in preparing soil stewardship messages. Vance Gray, Ashtola, County Farm Bureau Service Agent, and Henry Moore, President of the Donley County Farm Bureau, are discussing plans regarding Farm Bureau Insurance.

Announcement of a $50 \%$ dividend by the Southern Farm Bureau Casuaity Insurance Company means a savings of $\$ 1,049.45$ to farmers of Donley County, according to President Henry Moore of the local County Farm Bureau.
The farm leader said that 65 Farm Bureau members in the county would receive dividend payments. The amount each receives will be half of the amount of his premiums paid during the one year period ending March 31, 1955. Dividends wlll be paid in semi-annual payments, as policies oome up for renewal.
This is the second year that Farm Bureau members in Texas have received $50 \%$ dividends on their auto insurance premiums. Vance Gray, service agent for the County Farm Bureau, said that the dividends were made possible because farmers and ranchers were found to be preferred risks.
Since the Southern Farm Bursau Casualty Co. began provid ing low-cost insurance for Farm Bureau members in Texas, the premium rates for auto insurance for all farmers have decreased 20 \% he said. The company was able to declare a dividend again this year in spite of the fact that the premium rate to farmers living on the farm was lowered by $15 \%$ a year ago, he added.
The 50 per cent dividend, effective Aprid 1, totals $\$ 1,600,000$ for the entire state. Some 57,000 polscybolders in Texas will reap this savings.

Mission La Bahia, a few miles from Goliad, will ever remain a -shirine of all Texans. It was built in 1749, and formed the nucleus of the settlement of Goliad, one of the three Spanish outposts in Texas, the other two being Nacogdoches and Bexar, now San Antonio.
