An Editorial

The following editorial appeared in the Cleveland Plain Dealer:

The public power brigade in Congress is trying to get a bill passed that would commit the federal government to build a high power dam at Hell's Canyon on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon. Led by Senator Wayne Morse, they have raised the old familiar cry that it would be a "steal" if the government were to permit the Idaho Power Co., an investor-owned public utility, to build three small dams on the Snake River that would generate about the same amount of power.

Well, let's see who would be stealing from whom—

The estimated cost of the government dam, including transmission facilities and interest during construction, is \$465,470,000.

How much of this would be collected from Ohio taxpayers? The Council of State Chambers of Commerce has provided the answer—\$29,743,533. This is based on the fact that Ohioans pay 6.35 percent of the taxes collected by the federal government.

Does it make sense that Ohioans should be compelled to contribute nearly \$30,000,000 to generate cheap electricity for the Northwest? We think not. On the contrary, taxpayers of Ohio and the rest of the states would benefit if the private company were permitted to build the facilities and help ease the tax burden on everyone.

The overthrow by Cortez of the Aztec Empire in 1520, marked the beginning of Spanish Dominion over Mexico and the province of Texas. In 1685 La Salle landed in the vicinity of the present Lavaca Bay and founded a short-lived colony of a few hundred Frenchmen. France abandoned her claims to Texas after the war of 1719. In 1821 Spain's sovereignty over Mexico and Texas was overthrown and the red, green and white flag of the Mexicans flew under Texas skies. On April 21, 1836, General Sam Houston defeated Santa Anna at San Jacinto. This battle terminated the war and gained freedom for the Lone Star Republic. On December 29, 1845, Texas proudly took its place as the twenty-eighth State. The Southern Confederacy, 1861-1865.

News From Our County Agent

County Agent H. M. Breedlove warns cotton farmers that now is the time to keep your eye on the crop for insects. Flea hoppers are already present in cotton fields and that is the small insects that sting the small square and you loose some cotton without actually seeing the damage being done. For flea hoppers use 3-5-40, toxaphene, toxaphene and DDT mix, or aldrin. Leaf worms and boll worms will make their apperance later, and then use toxaphene and DDT mix, BHC, 3-5-40 mix, or aldrin. Any of the above poisons are also good for the garden web worm that is now showing up in

some cotton fields. Breedlove says that if insects start to appear in the crops, early control will save you a lot of crop loss, as they are easier to kill in the early stages. He urges that anyone needing help to control cotton insects to be sure to call him at once.
