The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Hamblen of Clarendon.

The impressive candlelight double ring service was read by Rev. Rowland Jenkins of Wellington.

The altar setting, centered with a wrought iron prayer bench, was backed by greenery and tall candleabra bearing white lighted tapers. Baskets of white gladiolas stands of ferns, and other floral and candle arrangements completed the altar decorations. The bridal aisle was marked with white satin bows, clustered with yellow mums, from which hung miniature wedding bells. Larger wedding bells attached to a yellow satin bow were suspended above the baptistry in a bed of greenery.

For the nuptial prelude Mrs. Johnnie Brumley, pianist, played several selections. She also accompanied Mrs. Marjorie Webb of Los Angeles, Calif., cousin of the bridegroom, who sang as the nuptial selections "All My Heart" and "Because;" and "The Lord's Prayer" as a benediction. For the processional and recessional the traditional wedding marches were used.

Miss Charlene Barnett and Deward Gibson, brother of the bride, lighted the candles. Miss Barnett also received the names of the guests for the bride's book. She wore a dress of pink linen. Her accessories and corsage were of blending hue.

Attending her cousin as maid of honor, Miss Mary Sue Brewer of Mobeetie wore a dress of yellow lace over satin, styled with fitted bodice attached to a bouffant skirt of ballerina length. She wore a matching headdress and carried a nosegay of yellow mums.

Misses Willie Emma Owens and Jean Bailey were bridesmaids. Their identical dresses were of blue dotted swiss made with a fitted bodice and full skirt of ballerina length. Each wore a narrow blue headband of flowers, blue mitts and corsages of gladiolas.

Artificial lighting in the grade school is to be modernized and all floors and blackboards have been refinished.
