

## LEE LOPER, PRESIDENT OF CLYDE BANK TO RETIRE BY END OF 1971

CLYDE — Lee Loper, president of Peoples State Bank, announced last week that he will retire by the end of 1971. Loper has been president of the bank since it began operation in 1960.

Mr. Loper stated in a letter to the directors, "Retirement at this time means that we will be able to do some of the traveling that we have always wanted to do, while we still enjoy fairly good health. Should the board find a suitable replacement to fill the position of president prior to the year end, I will be happy to move my retirement date up."

Speaking for the board of directors, Weldon Edwards stated "that certainly it is with regret and reluctance that we accept Lee's retirement." Edwards also credited Loper as being primarily responsible for the bank's growth since it began in 1960.

Edwards said that Loper had advised him a short time ago of his retirement decision. He added the board asked Loper to reconsider, but this was Loper's final decision and the board respects his wishes.

Mr. Loper, 51, has lived in and around Callahan County since 1923, and is a native of Henderson County. He first joined the First National Bank in Baird in May, 1939. He entered the Marine Corps in September of 1942 and served in the Pacific. After his discharge in 1945, he returned to the Baird bank, and was appointed assistant

cashier in 1946.

He was appointed assistant national bank examiner with the Dallas Federal Reserve District in November, 1952, and served until 1955, when he was appointed cashier of the First State Bank in Abilene. Loper was at the Abilene bank until July 1959, and assisted in the organization of the Bank of Commerce in Abilene. He was elected vice president of that bank and served until joining the Clyde bank.

He and his wife, Betty, have two sons, Robert 24, who is employed at the Citizens National Bank in Lubbock, and Tommy, 20, a student at Texas Tech.

## BILL MOORE'S TAKE WINS AT BRADY JUBILEE RACE MEET

BAIRD — Mr. and Mrs. Bill Moore Sr. and daughter Barbara, attended the Brady July Jubilee and Race meet held at G. Rollie White Downs on July 3, 4 and 5. They also attended the Horseman's Barbecue held the night of July 2 at Simpson Lake.

The Moore's 3-year gelding, Short Speck, and their R.O.M. 9-year old gelding Heza Dandy I, ran in the American Quarter Horse approved races.

Short Speck ran a 300-yard race on July 3rd, and won over 8 other fine horses in a time of 15-84, and received an unofficial AAA rating. He has now been in the money four of his

five starts. The colt won his 2nd out at Lubbock in May to qualify for the Lubbock Downs Derby Consolation. He is trained at Lubbock by Leo Speer. The colt is by Speck Deck, a proven sire of Quarter running horses.

On July 4th, Heza Dandy I won a 2nd over a distance of 660 yards. Bill trains him here at Baird. Both horses were ridden by Vick Sanders of Abilene.

Bill and Betty plan to enter Short Speck in a Derby at Sallisaw, Okla., in October, meanwhile he is being rested here at Baird, and later will be returned to Lubbock to be conditioned for the upcoming Derby.

Bill holds membership in the American Quarter Horse Assn., and various racing groups. The Moores have raced horses the past five years in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. They also own Gicry Be Good, a 3-year old mare, and a 3-year old mare, Jay Hawker Bar. They plan to retain these for broodmares.

## DONALD GROCE AWARDED NAVY CROSS FOR HEROISM

CORPUS CHRISTI — The

Navy Cross, highest Navy combat award and second only to the Congressional Medal of Honor, was presented to Navy Chief Boatswain's Mate Donald B. Groce of Baird, for extraordinary heroism while engaged in Vietnam combat last September.

Rear Admiral Billy D. Holder, Chief of Naval Air Advanced Training, made the presentation to Chief Petty Officer Groce during Midshipmen Sunset Parade ceremonies, held at the NAS Seawall Parade Grounds, Corpus Christi.

The 32-year-old Chief Groce is presently assigned to the NAS Special Services Division while undergoing treatment at the U.

S. Naval Hospital for wounds sustained in the action.

According to the citation accompanying the medal from the Secretary of the Navy, Groce was serving as advisor to a Vietnamese Navy boat, when the vessel was ambushed in Republic of Vietnam waters by enemy forces on Sept. 4th.

During the enemy attack, Groce was injured, but despite his injuries he made his way back to his battle station and resumed his duties of advising and assisting the Vietnamese boat captain in the counterattack. Shrapnel from another enemy rocket again wounded him, but disregarding his many wounds, he continued to fight to shouted encouragement to the other crew members.

Chief Petty Officer Groce's exemplary professionalism, bravery, and courageous devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest tradition of the U. S. Naval Service.

His service record reflects other awards he has earned - three Bronze Star awards with Combat "V" device, five Purple Hearts, Combat Action Ribbon, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross, both Battalion level and Brigade level, Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Unit Commendation, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" device, Vietnam Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal and the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal.

Chief Groce is married to the former Miss Bessie Pearl Tollett of Baird. They have one child.

Groce's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Bruce L. Groce of Midland.

## MODIFICATIONS RECEIVED On HOG CHOLERA QUARANTINE

BAIRD — Announcements concerning the Texas Hog Cholera Quarantine Modification has been received recently by the County Extension Office. Callahan County is no longer under the Federal Hog Cholera Quarantine and the following regulations will apply to movement and holding of all swine in Callahan County until further notice.

No restrictions on movement within the state, except when hogs are moved they must be held at the premise of the purchaser for 30 days and no movement from such premise, except for slaughter, shall be allowed

for the period of the quarantine. If swine are healthy at the end of the 30 days, the quarantine automatically expires.

No certificate is necessary for movement of swine.

The 30 day quarantine is important for two reasons. If a hog is in one place for 30 days, it will give the disease plenty of time to become evident that the animal was infected. To move swine from the premise before the 30 day quarantine period expires except for slaughter is a violation of the law and violators are subject to a fine.

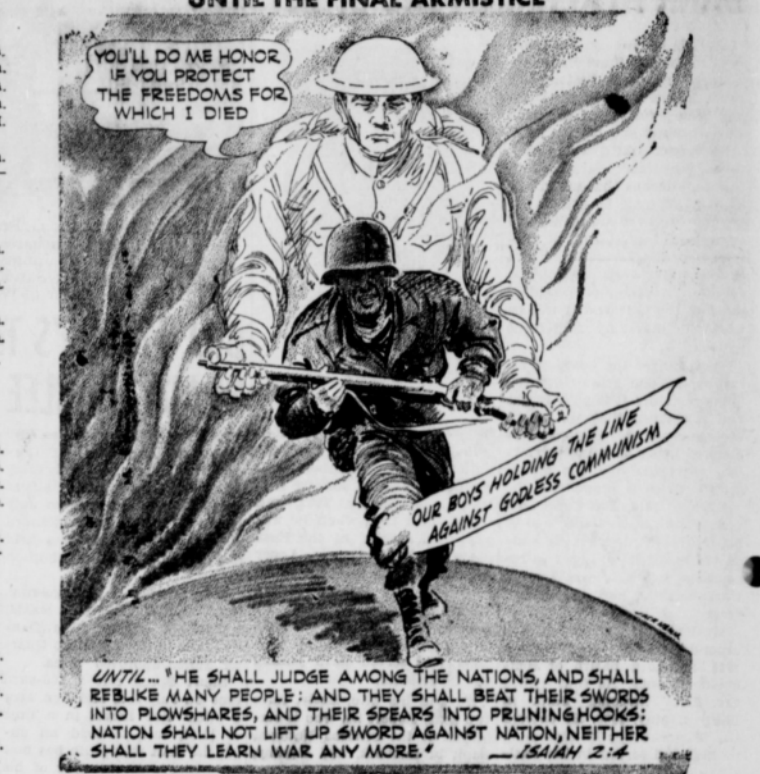

**AUSTIN** — Back to school time isn't too far off for more than two million young Texans, and State Board of Education has approved a record \$302.4 million statewide available school fund allotment.  
 Board set \$121.90 as the state allocation for each pupil in public schools this year. Figure is based on the average daily attendance during 1970-71, or 2,479,400, although actual enrollment was over 2.7 million.  
 Local school district may use their allocation to help pay annual operating expenses, including teacher salaries. Available school fund draws investment earnings from the \$825 million permanent school fund.

In other preparations for the upcoming school year, Board of Education also:  
 Approved an \$887,500 contract with Southwest Educational Development Laboratory for a bilingual teaching program tailored for four-year-old children of Mexican-American farm workers. Ten bilingual specialists will work with 100 youngsters in McAllen and Hereford to develop an experimental project next school year and field test it in 1972-73.  
 Approved a new accreditation plan to provide computer data to warn of developing weak points in school systems. Data will provide scientific analysis of information needed to decide which schools should be visited by accreditation teams. Such teams visit about 200 of more than 1,100 Texas school districts each year.

Entered an agreement to link Texas Education Agency and U. S. Office of Education in a \$1.8 million program to evaluate new special education pilot projects expected to have national impact on the teaching of handicapped children.  
 Allocated \$23.2 million to buy new textbooks.  
**DISEASE SPREADS** — A sleeping sickness-like disease spread among horses (and in a few humans) in the South Texas-Rio Grande Valley area.

U. S. Agriculture Department which originally had scheduled an experimental vaccine against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis in 13 counties, later released it statewide and slapped an embargo on Texas horses.  
 Later, a state Animal Health Commission order halted movement within state or out of state of horses not vaccinated at least 14 days earlier.  
 Several persons were hospitalized in Brownsville with VEE symptoms. Cases in horses increased sharply, though laboratory confirmation lagged behind discovery of symptoms.

Disease, described as "flu-like" among humans, is deadly to horses, and concern was expressed for the equine population. Emergency situation stopped all rodeos, horse shows, race meets and other activities involving horses.  
**TEXTBOOKS AVAILABLE FOR REVIEW** — Textbooks considered or 1972-73 school adoption can be looked over by interested citizens at 20 regional education service centers over the state.  
 Texas Education Agency, the largest single buyer of textbooks in the world, has \$23.2 million available for the next school year. New books cost an average \$8.10 for each of 2.7 million pupils. Proposed new textbooks can be reviewed at Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Houston, Beaumont, Huntsville, Kilgore, Mount Pleasant, Wichita Falls, Richardson, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, Abilene, San Angelo, Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso and San Antonio education service centers.

**1.5 MILLION NEW VOTERS?** — Texas may have 1.5 million new voters in 1972 largely as a result of 18-21 year olds becoming eligible for all elections, according to a state senator's forecast.  
 New law goes into effect September 1 which permits registration of a Texas voter for a three year period instead of annually as at present. Registration will also be open year.

around except for a 30-day cut-off before any election.  
 Dallas Sen. Mike McKool, author of the new registration law, sees youngsters as accounting for a large part of the 1.5 million increase in eligibility rolls and predicts they will vote as well as any age group.

**AG OPINIONS** — All Texas counties must adopt the jury wheel system and terminate selection of jury panels through use of commissions, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.  
 New state law providing for waiver of indictment in non-death penalty cases is constitutional, Martin said in another opinion.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:  
 Commissioner of Bureau of Labor Statistics has no authority to promulgate rules and regulations limiting the number of boxing and wrestling promoters in cities within certain population brackets.  
 Bridge between Corpus Christi Bay and Gulf of Mexico adjacent to Mustang Island when accepted by Texas Highway Department becomes part of the state highway system.  
 Comptroller of Public Accounts may issue a warrant to a contractor or seller of supplies and/or services purchased through State Board of Control without seller's certification of correctness of invoice (correcting an earlier opinion.)

Governor is authorized to make six appointments to Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators -- two initial appointees to serve until Jan. 31, 1973, two until 1975 and two until 1977.  
**APPOINTMENTS** — Gov. Preston Smith named E. Byron Crosier of Cleburne as district judge of 18th judicial district, to succeed Judge John A. James Jr. whom he named Tenth Court of Civil Appeals chief justice.  
 Smith selected Rex Sullivan Jr. of Quanah district judge of the 46th judicial district, replacing Judge Tom Davis who resigned.  
 Charles D. Kirkham Jr. of Dallas, a native of Cleburne, was placed by the Governor on the Legislative Property Tax Committee, along with Sen. James Bates of Edinburg, Rep. Richard Slack of Pecos, Jack L. Hart of Midland and Carl S. Smith, Harris County tax assessor-collector.

Charles R. Barden, acting chief of the air control section of the Texas State Department of Health, was named to the advisory committee to Federal Environmental Protection Agency.  
**COURTS SPEAK** — District judge in Midland ordered the lawsuit attacking constitutionality of the new Texas House of Representatives redistricting transferred to Austin where it may be tried this month.  
 Texas libraries were refunded nearly \$500,000 as a result of the Attorney General's price-fixing suit against children's book publishers.  
 Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a Texas 1969 statute on possession of LSD, but a new challenge was filed here on changes in the law this year. Court again upheld sodomy statute.

**PASS BIDS IN** — A low bid of \$1.4 million on the long-delayed second phase construction of a water exchange pass across Mustang Island apparently was submitted by Brown and Root Construction Inc., of Houston.  
 Brown and Root bid, including construction of a two-lane bridge across a 100-foot wide channel on Park Road 53, was the lowest of five opened last week by Parks and Wildlife Department. Bids were studied before a recommendation on letting the contract.

**HUNTERS IRED** — A state proposal to turn Canadian River bottom into a wildlife refuge stirred protests of hunters from the Panhandle at a hearing here.  
 Panhandle hunters wanted no part of the Parks and Wildlife Commission's closing of state-owned river beds, streams

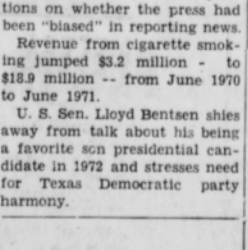

### THE LAW OF PARDON

Peter, preaching God's message on Pentecost, said, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Acts 2:38)

Paul said the saints at Colosse had been "Buried with him baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God who hath raised him from the dead. And you being dead in your sins and the uncircumcision of your flesh, hath he quickened together with him, having forgiven you all trespasses." (Col. 2:12,13) Being buried in baptism was one of the conditions of their forgiveness.

From these passages we see that faith, repentance and baptism constitute God's law of pardon to the alien. No man has the authority to offer pardon on any other terms. Any who feel that they have received pardon on any other terms have a feeling not based upon God's law. Have you been pardoned upon the terms which God has given?

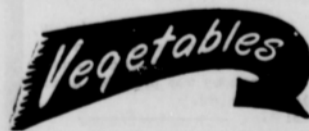

# HALF MILLION HORSES IN TEXAS THREATENED BY VEE DISEASE

Horses and horse diseases are subjects of great interest to Texans currently as a dread disease threatens the half a million in our State. And there is some concern accompanying the spread of the disease because the effects the virus could have on humans.

The horse disease is known by the tongue-twisting name of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis, or more commonly by the initials VEE. It spread up from South America -- apparently coming into Texas via flies or mosquitoes which are believed to be carriers.

There is a vaccine available which is being widely used by horse owners. The vaccine is still experimental, but it is the only known means of combating the disease in horses. Once contracted by horses, the disease is fatal in 85 to 90 percent of the cases.

The Department of Agriculture was naturally reluctant to make a mass release of a vaccine which had not been fully tested. However, horse owners argued that it was the only tool available. The government did release the vaccine for use by veterinarians only and on a voluntary basis by horse owners.

Early reports indicate that the vaccine seems to be working in those cases where it has been used. Some ranches have used the vaccine on hundreds of horses, and have prevented death losses while others who did not vaccinate lost horses.

There is great hope that the vaccine can stop the spread of the dread disease. There is also hope it will lessen the danger for humans.
