ONE OF OUR readers submitted an article from the AARP Bulletin which everyone should take time to consider.

Taxpayers in the 65 to 69-year age group have been complaining, and rightly so, due to an "earnings limit" imposed on them that reduces Social Security benefits by \$1 for every \$2 of earnings above \$8,400 per year for taxpayers in that age bracket.

AARP (The American Association of Retired Persons) strongly opposes the earnings limit. In a column last November, AARP Executive Director Jack Carlson called the earnings limit a "harmful device that discourages older persons from staying at work, and ultimately makes no sense at all."

However, Health and Human Services Secretary Otis Bowen has appealed to President Reagan, himself an older worker, to push for repeal of the earnings law.

"The law imposes an unreasonable 50 per cent tax on the earnings of the elderly, and discourages productive labor," Secretary Bowen said in his memo to the president.

Social Security Commissioner Dorcas R. Hardy has also urged repeal of the earnings limit.

In his memorandum, Secretary Bowen conceded that his proposal could have substantial short-term costs, since benefits would rise for recipients with outside earnings. But over the long run, he said, the change would contribute to the reduction of the federal deficit because elderly people would work more, and thus pay more taxes.

The double-whammy on the earnings of people in the 65-69 age group is scored by our reader, who points out that this group is the one defined as "notch babies," and have already been discriminated against by Social Security.

"Surely this can be eliminated. If the United States has \$8 million to build a school in France for people who immigrated there 20 years ago, why can't we 65 to 69 taxpayers be treated fairly in the United States?" our source asks.

There are a lot of voters in this age bracket, it was pointed out, and all of those who feel the earnings limit should be struck down are urged to contact their congressmen and make their wishes known.

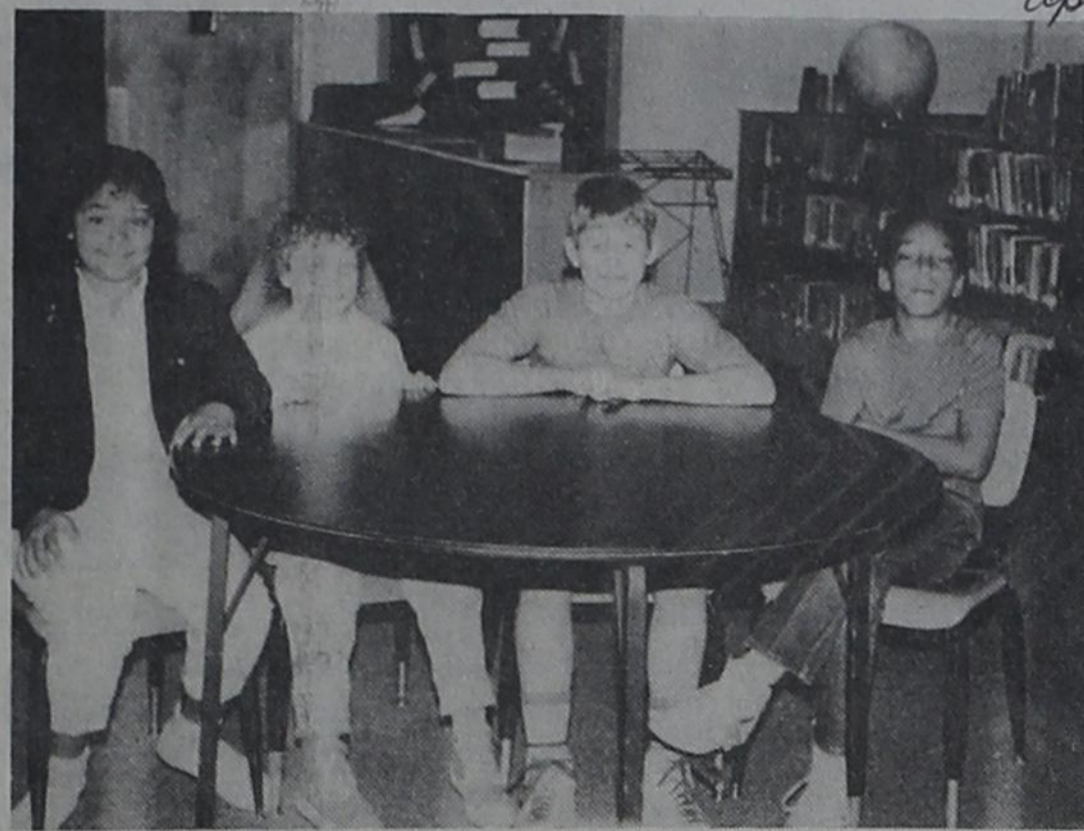
When we picked up the Hispanic paper, our thoughts were that it would challenge to us personally, to see if we could recall enough of our Spanish to interpret the news.

## Absentee Registration Starts Slated For Board Pre-K'garten

Two positions, those being the positions of Don Teague and Steve Sherrill, are expiring on the Bovina School Board. They will be filled at an election May 7. The polling place will be at the school.

Absentee voting by personal appearance began Monday, April 18. These ballots may be cast at Ridgelea Elementary School between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. May 3 will be the last day to cast an absentee ballot.

Those seeking the two positions are: Don Teague, Larry Mitchell, Billy Lynn Marshall, Larry Hodnett, Wayne McClaran and Terri Sorley.

HB 72 required 20 hours of training for school board members with six hours of renewal each year. Listed below is the status of the present board members with regard to this training: Norma Whitten, 30 3/4 hours; Don Teague, 24 3/4 hours; Steve Sherrill, 15 hours; Mike Beauchamp, 18 hours; Dickie Steelman, 13 hours; Jon Lin Riddle, two hours; and Dickie Clayton, two hours.

The law requires that this information be published annually prior to election time.

Pre-kindergarten classes will be offered during the 1988-89 school year if 15 or more eligible children enroll for the program.

To be eligible for enrollment in pre-kindergarten class, a child must be at least four years of age and must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language or be from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level. Pre-kindergarten registration will be at Ridgelea School from 3-4 p.m. on April 27.

Children who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1988, will be eligible to attend kindergarten classes during the 1988-89 school year. Registration of these students will be from 3-4 p.m. on April 27 at Ridgelea School.

Those students who will be in kindergarten or pre-kindergarten will need to have a birth certificate and immunization records present at the time of registration.

# Williams, Phillips Are Demo Winners

Bovina had an average turnout of 169 voters for the Democratic runoff last Tuesday.

Rex Williams won the Democratic runoff for County Sheriff, over John Armstrong, 641 votes to 415. Williams received 60.7 per cent of the votes to 39.3 per cent for Armstrong.

Bovina voters virtually split down the middle on the two candidates, who hailed from communities on either side of the local area. Armstrong won the Bovina box with 87 votes, 51.5 per cent, to 82 for Williams, 48.5 per cent.

Williams was given big margins in his home precinct, Friona, where he received 467 of the 494 votes cast in the sheriff's race. This was a whopping 94.5 per cent of the votes.

Williams also carried the Lazbuddie precinct handily, with 53 votes to seven for Armstrong, 88.3 per cent.

Combining the Friona and Lazbuddie precincts, Williams tallied 520 votes to 34 for Armstrong, or 93.9 per cent.

Armstrong won his home box of Farwell by 279-27, getting 91.2 per cent of Precinct 3's votes. He also won the absentee box, 15-12.

Williams said he was surprised by the margin, and by the good turnout in Precinct 1.

"This was my first experience in a runoff, but (County Clerk) Bonnie Warren Howard said it was a good turnout for a runoff in the county," Williams said. \*\*\*\*\*

In the race for the state senate, 31st district, Bovina and Parmer County gave a big boost to Mel Phillips, who won the nomination over Bryan Poff.

The Bovina precinct went for Phillips, 116 votes, 70.7 per cent, to 48 for Poff, 29.3 per cent.

Phillips carried every box in the county, also winning with 80.2 per cent at Friona, 385-95; 75.5 per cent at Lazbuddie, 40-13, and 64.9 per cent at Farwell, 176-95. His county totals were 737 votes, 74.1 per cent, to 258, 25.9 per cent.

"We exceeded our expectations. And Parmer County has a special place with us," Phillips said when contacted Wednesday morning.

"I would like to thank all of the folks who helped us win the nomination, especially county chairman Hollis Horton," Phillips said. He also indicated that he felt that a big key to his win was the support and endorsement that he

had received from the weekly newspapers across the district.

"I also would like to thank all of the people who took off from their work to spend time working in our behalf," Phillips said.

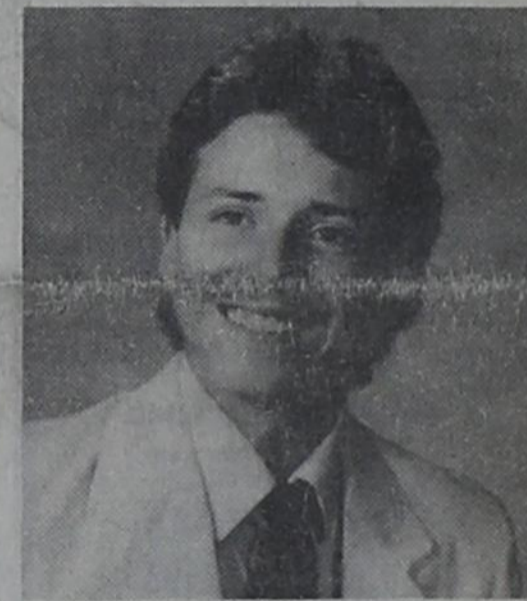
He said that he felt that the question that voters should ponder in November is which candidate can be the most effective in the state senate.

"I feel that I can be more effective, with 24 other Democratic senators. If my opponent wins, he will have only six Republican senators with which to work," Phillips said. \*\*\*\*\*

In the Republican runoff, voters went overwhelmingly for Beau

## Letter To The Editor



To The Editor:

Thank you, Katherine Seewald, for your accurate perception of the trouble at W.T.S.U. I received two degrees from W.T. and did graduate work in five of the large universities. Before retirement, I taught 19 years in the school of business--18 of them in accounting. Therefore, I feel qualified to express my opinion. My views are those of the many here who dare not speak. We have a high class faculty of dedicated, professional scholars who have made this University what it is. They are hurt and angry to see it destroyed.

Change is inevitable, and the faculty can and will accept it. They ask for their input of ideas, since they are the ones with the knowledge. No one man can make intelligent Machiavellian decisions about all the areas of learning here. The administration says W.T. should be operated as a corporation. Heaven forbid that

we turn out corporate raiders; Juggernaut tactics have driven the faculty to its first revolt against the administration.

I challenge Dr. Roach to publish his reorganization plan so the public can see how he is crowding departments in fewer buildings to save electricity and demolishing needed buildings. One department was moved, its \$46,000 work of equipment is sitting on the students' desks because there is no place to put it. It cannot be used because there are no electrical outlets in the room. But it saves electricity!

Why should nursing and agriculture be in the same department with a dean who is a biology teacher? He is a fine scholarly gentleman, but does he know anything about nursing or agriculture? Big is not better. My department head was an accounting teacher across the hall. We had many short exchanges of information. We knew our students personally and knew when to offer the different advanced courses. This saved money for W.T., and I know of no student who failed to get his degree on time because a needed course was not offered. Now this closeness is gone.

I want to make four recommendations:

**First**—Employ an independent firm of C.P.A.'s to audit the records and publish truths. Did Pickens give us \$600,000 cash or a much over-valued oil well? No one knows where that money is.

**Second**—Fire Dr. Roach. In 1986, 87% of the faculty voted a no confidence. Many asked him to resign. His answer was arrogance and vindictiveness. He fired teachers who disagreed with him. Many of our young teachers left us. Some are counting their years until retirement. He has lost the respect and confidence of the faculty.

He should publish his "master plan" for tearing down good buildings and building more. Why is he now asking for bids to demolish one good dormitory and planning to build another in three years? Old Main was built about 1914, but it is probably the best building on campus. It needs extensive repairs, but should a part of the \$5 million be spent on a palatial office for Dr. Roach? Is it true your office will be two stories high? Does that save space and utility costs?

It's rumored that Roach spent about \$60,000 on his office in another building and bought silver flatware so he would not have to eat with the same quality hardware he asks the faculty to use. Did you remove 14 department heads, cutting their salaries \$1,000 each and give each of the present deans a \$10,000 raise in salary? Where have your saved money?

**Third**—Get rid of T. Boone Pickens. He uses W.T. in two ways. His goal is to give the school to Amarillo or rename it with Amarillo's name. He uses W.T. as a ploy for personal aggrandizement. It is anathema to people here that he tacked his name onto the School of Business. A recent magazine published by the University had lengthy articles about Boone and Bea with three pictures of them. Self adulation usually backfires.

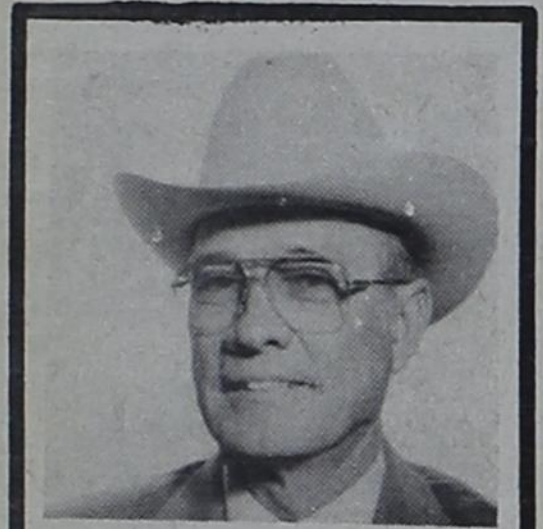
**Fourth**—Get rid of the rubber stamp Board of Regents. Their answer to the problems was to vote unanimously to support Roach and to extend his contract three years. The last three regents to be appointed were quoted in the Amarillo paper as to their views in combining W.T. and Amarillo College. They did not say no. That is sheer stupidity. A.C. is a good school. I have had many of their students in advanced accounting classes, and they were well prepared. I am sure their other departments are equally fine. Our purposes differ. A.C. can serve needs we cannot. I am glad they have the freedom to offer classes in poodle grooming and gift wrapping. They take care of needs we cannot.

This Board has made no effort to see the problem here. They have insulted the intelligence of the faculty. Their answer has been a Juggernaut display of power.

W.T. is not just the present student body and faculty. It belongs to the thousands who have attended school here or supported us in any way.

I am asking all of you to help us. A cosmetic patch up won't work. I wish to publicly thank Sybil Harrington for the many millions she has given W.T. and the museum here. She has remained a gracious lady, loved and respected by all of us.

Help us to throw off our yoke so we can begin a constructive program to restore our honor.

# Jr. Boys Shine At Lazbuddie Meet

The Bovina Junior High boys track team had a fine track meet at Lazbuddie on April 15. Not only did they score 197 points, but they also came home with every first place trophy or plaque offered in the boys' division.

Besides being the team champion, the Colt track team also won the sprint relay and the mile relay and came home with the high point individual boy award.

The Colts began amassing their points in the field events by scoring 68 points in just four events. Izzy Marrufo placed first in the long jump with a mark of 15-10, well below his season best of 17-1.

Angel Espinoza placed second in the long jump at 14-9½ and Hugo Renteria was fourth with a 14-6 jump. Others competing in the long jump were Darren Hromas, 13-1¾, Rusty Venable, 13-5 and Andy Stormes, 13-7½.

Corey Kirkpatrick began his quest for high point individual honors by finishing second on the high jump with a personal best leap of 5-6. Izzy Marrufo placed fifth with a jump of 5'. Jamie Graves and Rusty Venable cleared 4-8.

In the shot put, Bovina clearly dominated the event by sweeping first, second and third places. Kirkpatrick won the event with a toss of 42-11. Cain Neal was second, 39-2½ and Pedro Castillo was third, 35-5. Also entered in the event were Andy Stormes, 31-10, Shane Branson 22-1½ and Chris Wilson, 18-11½.

In the discus, Bovina scored 12 points on Pedro Castillo's second place finish (99-3) and Juan Reyna's fourth place finish (93-9).

In the running events, the Colts continued to add on the points. The 400 meter relay (P. Castillo, H. Renteria, I. Marrufo, C. Kirkpatrick) won first place with a time of 48.93. The "B" team's 400 relay (Branson, Pinkston, Venable, Stormes) ran a time of 57.19.

Bovina finished second and sixth in the 800 meter dash with Jesus Larrea running a time of 2:24.86 and Benji Castillo running a time of 2:29.41.

In the 110 meter high hurdles, Juan Reyna placed first with a time of 18.66. Hector Guevara and Angel Espinoza finished fourth and fifth, respectively, with times of 19.76 and 20.45. Also competing in the 110 meter hurdles was Rusty Venable (22.36) and Darren Hromas (24.32).

Hugo Renteria won the 100 meter dash under some unusual circumstances. He won his heat with a time of 13.02, but it turned out that the first place timer was the only one who had been ready, so no one else received a time. Therefore, the heat had to be run again.

Hugo again won his heat as well as the event with a time of 12.91. Placing second behind Hugo was Pedro Castillo with a time of 13.05. Also competing in the 100 meter dash was Kory Mitchell (13.43), J.D. Pinkston (14.31), Jamie Fuentes (14.6) and Chris Wilson (16.44).

Although competing on the Bovina "B" team, Andy Stormes placed second overall in the 400 meter dash with a time of 62.59. Jose Silva finished fifth with a time of 64.76 and Hector Guevara was seventh at 65.57. Also entered in

the 400 was Brandon Caldwell, 74.4.

In the 300 meter hurdles, Kirkpatrick was again outstanding as he ran away from the field with a first place time of 42.37. Also finishing third in the 300 meter hurdles was Jesus Larrea with a time of 48.5 and Juan Reyna was fourth with a time of 48.95. Until this meet, neither Jesus or Juan had ever run the 300 meter hurdles. Both young men did an outstanding job. Also running the 300 meter hurdles were Darren Hromas (63.65) and Shane Branson (63.87).

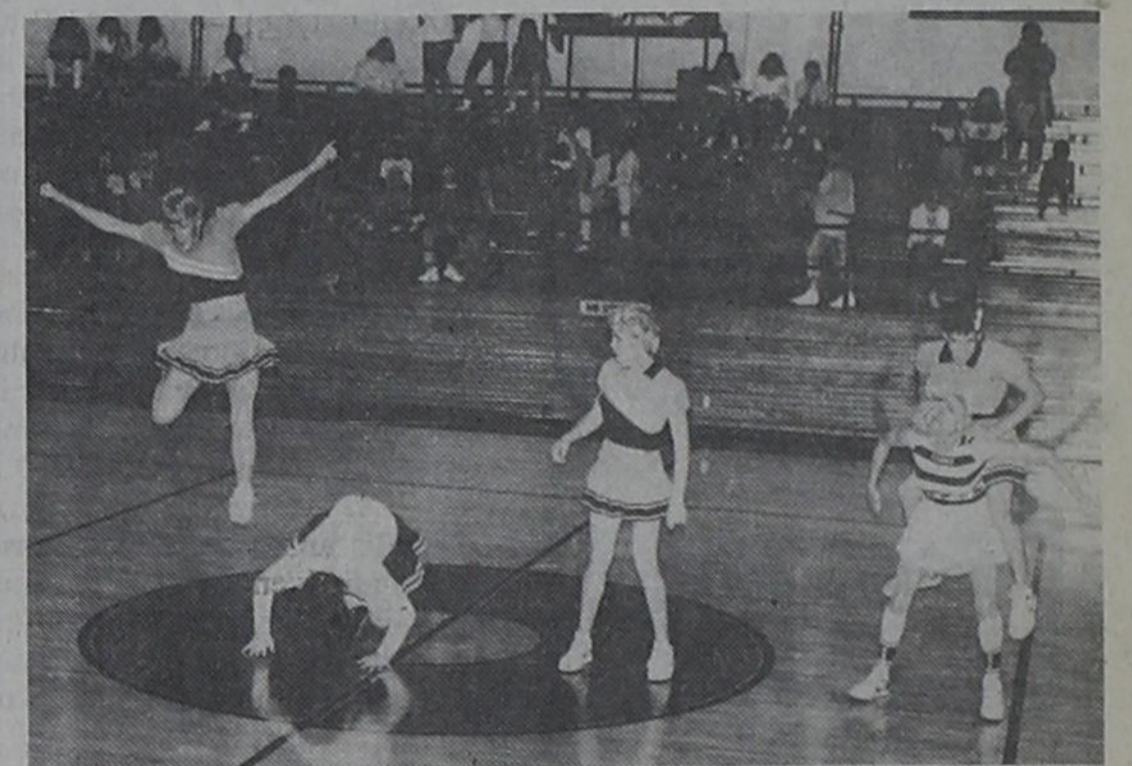

In the mile relay, the Colts finished off their point total by winning the event. The team of Marrufo, Renteria, Espinoza and Kirkpatrick, turned in a time of 3:53.88. The "B" team mile relay finished sixth overall with a time of 4:39.14. Members of the "B" team relay were Jamie Fuentes, J.D. Pinkston, Rusty Venable and Andy Stormes.

She transferred to Texas Tech University and received her bachelor's degree in home economics in May 1986.

While at Tech, Ms. White was active in student organizations and honor societies. She was recognized as the highest ranking senior student in the College of Home Economics at the 1986 graduation exercises.

In addition to her outstanding accomplishments as a student, she was president of the Home Economics Recruiters, vice president and program chairman of the Tech chapter of the American Home Economics Association, treasurer of Phi Upsilon Omicron-the home economics honorary fraternity, and was a member of Mortar Board.

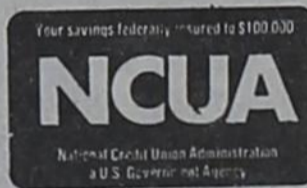

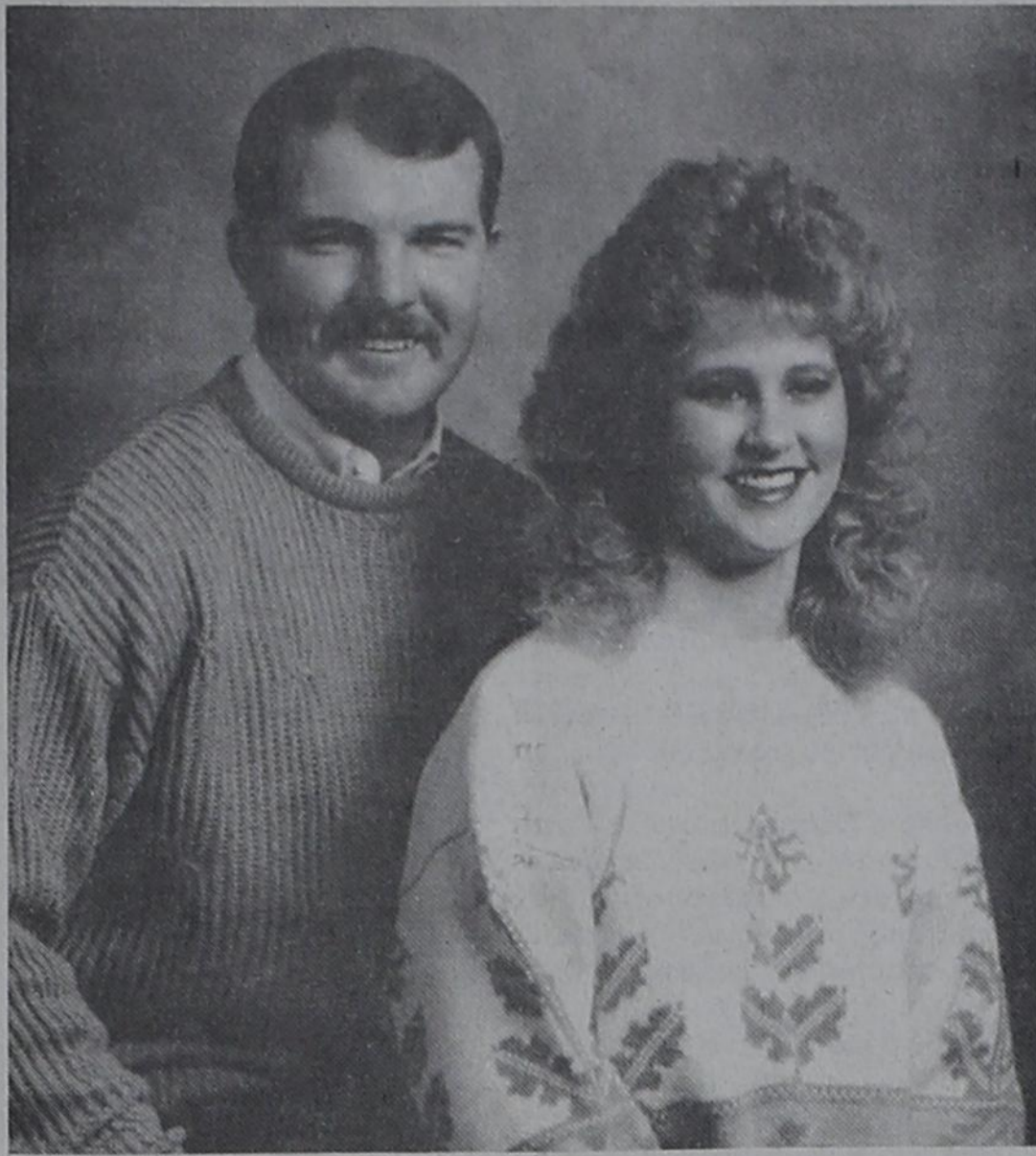
The ladies were then invited into the Mesmans' home and served coffee and doughnuts. They were also given a tour of the lovely home.

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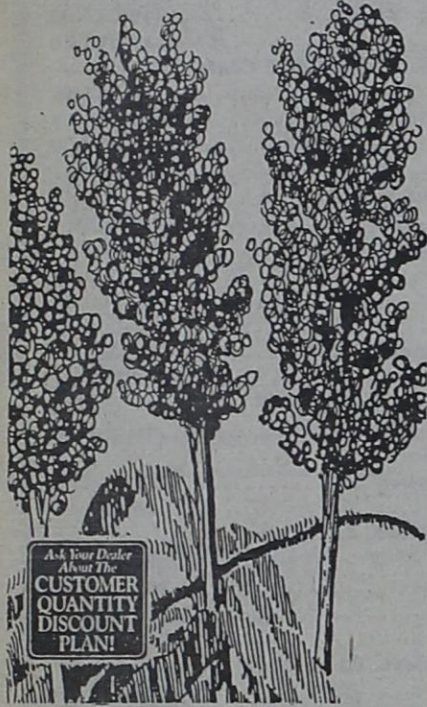

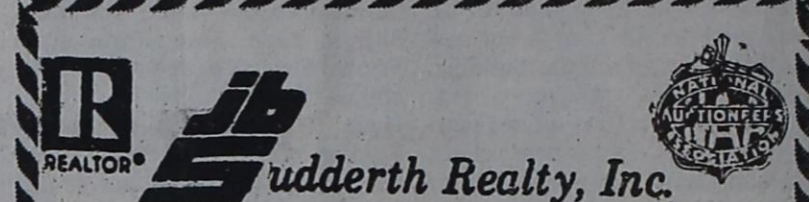
