Baseball News

The Hedley high baseball team, coached by J. D. Foster, is coming along nicely and improving as the season progresses.

In their five games so far, they lost to Memphis Mar. 13 by a score of 11 to 9, on Mar. 16 lost to Quail 11 to 10, on Mar. 23 lost to Turkey 13 to 10, on Mar. 27 won over Lakeview 16 to 4 and on Mar. 29 defeated Memphis 4 to 1. George Younger pitched the last game and held Memphis to 4 hits. Hedley scored 4 runs from 12 hits.

News From Our County Agent

Poultry raisers from Donley County and surrounding area are invited to attend two big poultry meetings in Donley County on April 17. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, says that two meetings on cage layer production of eggs will be held on that date; the first meeting to be held in Clarendon at the Mulkey Theatre starting at 9:00 a. m. and the other meeting to start at 2:00 p. m. in the Hedley Lions Club Hall.

Two top specialists in poultry production, Bob J. Griffin, poultry husbandman for Texas A&M Extension Service at College Station, and Kermit Schlamb, marketing specialist for the Extension Service, will be the speakers on the program. Breedlove says that all angles will be discussed including cost, size of operations, markets, feeds, care of flocks, and building of the units for cage layer production.

Farmers are asked to attend the meeting most convenient for them. Breedlove says that many farmers have requested this information and are interested in cage layer production of eggs as a supplemental income for the farm due to reduction in cotton acreages.

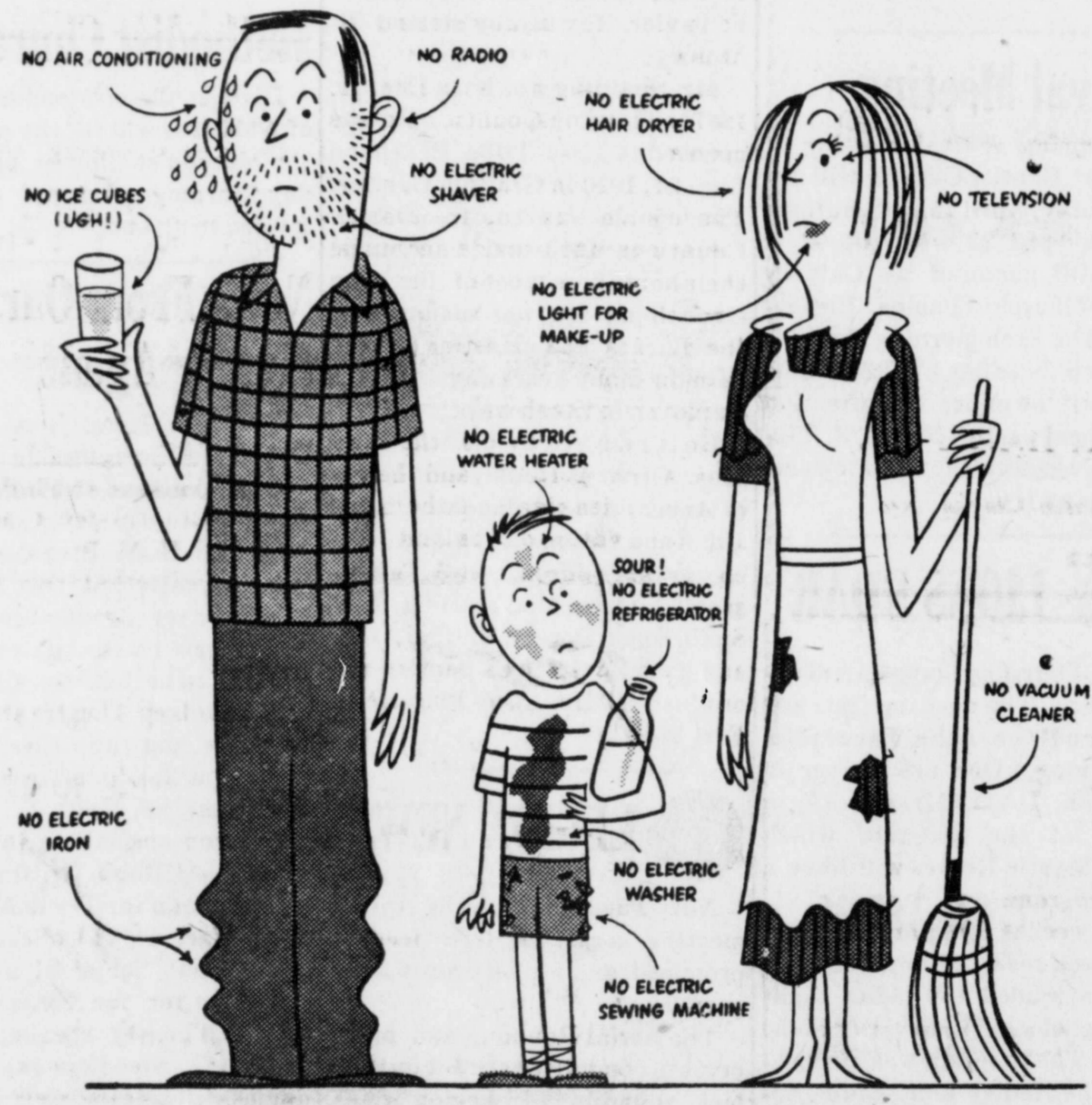

Soil Conservation News

There are still some farmers and ranchers in the Donley Soil Conservation District with the impression that to sign a cooperative agreement with the District means signing an agreement with an agency of the federal government. However this is not true, as Soil Conservation Districts are local units of government managed by farmers and ranchers themselves, and are a highly effective device through which the people and their government can team up to get the conservation job done, without the federal government becoming the dominating member of the team.

The major responsibility for carrying out a sound, vigorous program of soil and water conservation rests with the people who own and operate the land. A nationwide program, however urgent its need, cannot have force in our democracy unless it is accepted as the individual responsibility of the people.

The Soil Conservation Services' primary function in conservation operations is to provide technical assistance to farmers and ranchers through Soil Conservation Districts. The effectiveness of the work depends directly on the working relationships between the district and its leaders, the land owners and operators, and the various agencies created to help put soil conservation on the land.

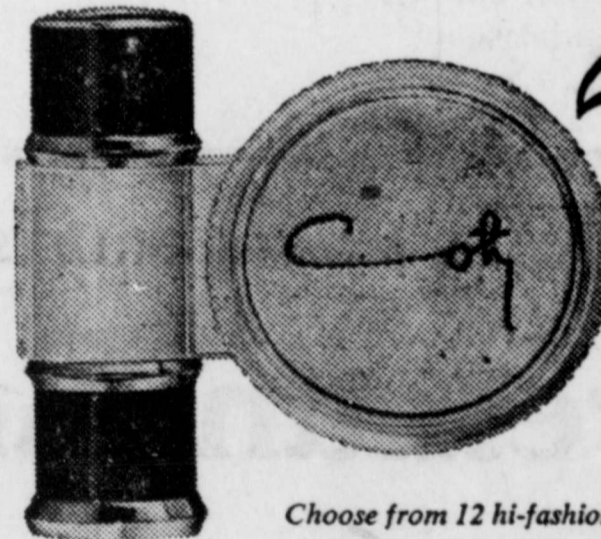


