Rayburn L. Smith, secretary treasurer of the National Farm Loan Association in Clarendon, announces that the Federal Land Bank of Houston is starting on its 40th year of operations this month. Since organization in 1917 the bank has made 145,000 long term mortgage loans for more than \$625 million to farmers and ranahers in Texas. The Land Bank is owned entirely by 13 national farm loan associations over the state. All loans are made through these associations which are fully owned by their more than 36,000 member borrowers.

In 1955 the Land Bank loaned more money than in any other good will. year of its history, according to Sterling C. Evans, bank president when it loaned over 58 million dollars. Present volume of loans outstanding exceeds \$172 million. The use of grasses on land subject to extensive wind or water erosiion is the most practical method of conserving such soils. Permanent tame pastures would be profitable on many of our farms. They should be used on soils that are too steep, rocky or eroded for cultivation, also on land subject to frequent overflow and on soils subject to blowing to the extent that they can't be safely farmed. Grass plantings may also be used on all land to increase pasture acreage and livestock numbers.

The objective in establishing permanent pastures is, of course, to obtain as much forage per acre as possible throughout the year. and a mixture of grasses will do this best. Mixtures should be used that: 1. Grow the best for physical conditions of site and produce most forage. 2. Will last the longest under grazing and be more permanent. 3. Will grow well together. 4. Are adapted to the climate and rainfall.

Using this as a guide, it seems

best to use a mixture of our native Soil Conservation News perennial short, mid and tall grasses on mixed or sandy soils. These could include sand and little bluestem, switchgrass, Indiangrass, sideoats grama, blue grama, and sandlove grass.

A cover crop of sorghums or sudan should be grown previous to grass planting. The sorghum stubble left unplowed serves as a protection for grass seedlings. This mixture should be planted in February, March, or April.

The Donley Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service have available technical assistance and specialized equipment to aid in pasture planning, as well as in other conservation problems.
