For the first time in fifty years, there will be an old fashioned picnic at Giles, Texas May 30. As always, all who knew Giles in an early day or, for any other reason, might enjoy the gathering on the bank of Buck Creek are invited to come and share in the festivities.

For several years Giles residents and neighbors had an annual picnic and celebration. May 30 became known as 'Giles Picnic Day' and folks came for miles around to enjoy the visiting and fellowship, the good food and baseball game.

Who Says "The West Ain't Wild Any More"

About two weeks ago a 12 year old bull buffalo named Charlie, with a yen to travel, wandered away from the Palo Duro State Park near Canyon. The 1,800 pound animal was finally corralled about 4 miles north of Quail the first of this week, and Sheriff John Rainey of Collingsworth County notified the park manager, Pete Cowart, to come and get him.

Following is an account by Scoutmaster Boaz Stotts and two of his Scouts of how they met up with Charlie on his trek of almost 100 miles.

Last Thursday evening Scoutmaster Boaz Stotts and Troop Quartermaster Bobby Grimsley of Troop No. 36 made a trip out to the F. A. Finch Ranch, 7 miles south of Hedley, to check on a camp site and leave some camping equipment which the troop would use the next day for an overnight hike. They picked up Scout Jerry Kinney at the ranch and made their round over the ranch to pick out a good location.

On their return trip to town, the three Scouts stopped with a sudden surprise. Standing in the road was a real live buffalo. They went back 1½ miles to the ranch to tell anyone that they could see about the buffalo, with hopes of finding someone who would help catch it. Mr Spalding went back with them to see the buffalo, but when they arrived the buffalo had disappeared.

The Scouts, rather disappointed, journeyed on up the road about a mile, and there they saw the buffalo again. They had hopes of driving him into town, but after driving him slowly for 3½ miles, he turned toward Blackie Ray's farm. About ¼ mile from the farm house the buffalo went into a heavy shelter belt. The Scouts drove up to the house to tell Mr. Ray about the buffalo, but again he disappeared. They believe that he had jumped the fence and gone down in the canyon beyond the shelter belt. The Scouts had to discontinue their buffalo hunt, as night was drawing near, but the boys still wonder where he came from and where he went.

Even though the buffalo had gone, they believe they can claim the honor of being the first three to drive a buffalo in this part of the country in a long, long time.
